Kathy Karlovic (Pathways and Transitions Leader) and Rebecca Sandlant (Year 12 Year Level Leader) have completed Year 12 VTAC presentations to parents and students. Thank you to Kathy, Rebecca and also to the parents who attended the VTAC presentation. This will place all involved at a definite advantage in understanding the procedures for applying for TAFE and university placements at the end of the year.

In the last newsletter, I spoke about teachers working with students to reflect on school reports and putting a plan for improvement in place and I'm hoping that all students, with the support of their parents, are actually reflecting on this to assist with their academic improvement. Based on semester one reports, I am pleased to see students progressing with their academic rigour and performance. A reminder to all students and parents that progression from one year level to the next is not automatic and is based on students showing a progression with their school work and meeting a prescribed level, an attendance rate of 100% (unless ill) and demonstrating the College values of Respect, Co-operation and Excellence.

Please don't forget that all students have the assistance of "Your Tutor" an online tutoring program, sponsored by Victoria University, which is available outside of school hours for student use. School pressure starts to build when you fall behind with your school work so I ask that students assist their anxiety

These are questions that VCE and VCAL students should be asking themselves throughout the year. However, these questions take on greater meaning/importance as we move closer to the end of our course of study. It is these questions that we will be asking and attempting to answer during the forthcoming Progress Reports and Parent/Teacher evening. I urge all parents/guardians to attend this day/evening in order to have these conversations with their children and their teachers. The Year 11 students have now all completed their Pathways and subject selection interviews and as a result should have made informed decisions regarding their program for next year. Much of their decision making process was aided by the fantastic work done by the Careers and Pathways team to provide our students with access to relevant people and information during the Careers Expo and associated events. A huge expression of thanks goes to that team for their tireless work and commitment to the students of our college.

Early this term the Year 11 students participated in the "Fit to Drive" program designed to give students (as potential drivers) an insight into the need to be extra vigilant and safe on the road. The program was conducted over a four hour period comprising of a series of group assemblies/presentations followed by smaller group workshops. The feedback from the students was very positive in terms of the benefits of the program and reinforces the view that young potential drivers need as much information and practical advice as possible in order to make them safer road users.

Last week the Year 11 and 12 Business Management classes spent a session engaged in a presentation on marketing strategies for small businesses. This session was run by one of the co-founders and directors of "Frank Body" (one of the fastest growing small businesses in Australia). The students gained a valuable insight into the world of small business and the ever changing nature of marketing and advertising through the use of "social media" as the tool of communication. A thoroughly enjoyable and informative session made all the more rewarding by some free samples of the "Frank Body" coffee scrubs.

On a closing note, I would like to remind all students of the need to be in the correct college uniform at all times and to wear it with pride. I would also like to stress the need to maintain an attendance rate of 100% unless ill, in order to have the best possible opportunity to complete all work and pass the year. Again, I also remind all of our VET students that attendance is compulsory and that all VET courses have a minimum number of hours as an attendance requirement as well as work completion requirements as prerequisites to satisfactorily completing those programs. In other words, if you don't attend for the minimum number of hours then you are "at risk" of not being able to pass.

There is still a long way to go before the end of the year however, time passes very quickly. We must therefore, at all times, be focused and keep an eye on the road ahead.

At Wyndham Central College students are required to have 100% attendance. At Year 12 it is especially important that a student does not miss class time. If your child is sick we ask for a medical certificate to be supplied. Please also contact your child's tutor teacher as well and we can organise for work to be sent home in the case of absences. I have asked all tutor teachers to follow up with families of students who have attendances we are concerned about.

Year 12 photos

On Tuesday the 4th of August in the auditorium the Year 12 students had their group photo taken. More information will be available soon if you wish to purchase one of these photos.

SEAS presentation

On the 10th of August Ms Karlovic organised for the students to participate in the SEAS presentation. Students learnt about the different opportunities that are available to apply for special consideration into different universities. Some of the opportunities applied to all students and others may require additional applications. Please be aware that a student may need supporting documents such as doctors reports, teacher statements etc. Students need to organise this information now. Please see Ms Karlovic if you have any specific questions.

VTAC applications

All students will be aware that it is the time of the year that they need to put in their VTAC applications for TAFE and University courses. There is a small cost associated with the applications that needs to be paid by the end of the term. Each year 12 student is required to make an appointment with Ms Karlovic to go through preferences to make sure they have covered all bases. Appointments can be made before school, lunchtime or after school. Students can also make appointments during class time as long as they have teacher approval to miss class.

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SmArts RMIT AND THE SMITH FAMILY

In what is now becoming a tradition, students at Wyndham Central College have again attended the SmArts program sponsored by the Smith Family and RMIT "I Belong" initiative. This program seeks to

expose students from under represented schools to provide them the opportunity for possible career paths within the Art and Design fields at RMIT: Building and Landscape Architecture, Industrial Design, Graphic Design and Media, to name a few. "I Belong" is a dynamic approach designed to inspire and build tertiary engagement for secondary students. Building on RMIT's (SNAP) partnerships, "I Belong" gives selected students the opportunity to witness and experience a University environment, motivating students to strive for achievement.



Students attended the program at RMIT for a total of 3 days (1 day per week). They participated in various hands-on workshops in a university environment. The workshops this year consisted of Stop Motion Animation, Photography, Drawing and Assemblage. Activities included students working individually with past and present students from the University to produce work for a final exhibition which was presented by the Smith Family and RMIT.



The exhibition highlighted the creative endeavours and achievements of our students within the workshops and was attended by the Regional Programs Manager, The Smith Family and staff, RMIT staff and students who participated in the program, Wyndham Central students and several proud parents.

Wyndham Central College has participated in this program since its inception 4 years ago and continues


A homework club for Year 12 EAL students will be held on each Monday after school from 3.20pm in R13. Cath Myers EAL Coordinator

CAREER NEWS

The Wyndham Central College Career Newsletter will be published fortnightly to keep students informed of events relating to their career pathways. It will include information regarding tertiary pathways – University & TAFE – as well as employment/industry pathways. The Careers Office, in the Student Services Centre, is a resource centre for our students with current institutional handbooks and brochures at their disposal. Students are invited to visit, browse and question. An open door policy exits to ensure students make informed decisions about future pathways. The Year 12 Pathways & Application Process has commenced. This is a condensed version of the newsletter. The full edition can be found on the College website via the Careers link.

PATHWAYS INTERVIEWS/PROGRAMS...

The initial Year 12 Pathways Interviews have been completed. Year 12's are now invited to stop by the Careers Centre to follow up on the discussions, research, etc. The VTAC Application Process and Other Pathways Application Process has commenced this term. Information was disseminated via assemblies for both students (on Wednesday 5 August) and parents (on Tuesday evening, 4 August, 7pm in our Auditorium) by Mrs Kathy Karlovic, the Pathways & Transitions Leader.

All Year 12 students have attended the Tertiary Information Service (TIS) Event on Tuesday 14 July, held at Victoria University, Footscray Park Campus. The TIS event is an introduction to the VTAC Application Process followed by a mini tertiary institutional expo.

All Year 9, 10 & 11 students are also invited to stop by the Careers Centre to book a pathways interview, visit the Careers Reference Centre, collect tertiary handbooks/brochures, etc.

The Careers Program, which officially commenced last term for these year levels with an Introductory Careers Assembly, was administered via their CAPs/MIPS classes. A letter was sent home to parents/guardians via students outlining the Careers Program. The purpose of this program for the Year 9, 10 & 11 students was to investigate career pathways and to select the appropriate electives or programs, either VCE or VCAL and subjects to study in Year 11 or 12, if the VCE program is selected. For the Year 11 students it is important for them to confirm that they have selected the correct program/subjects and to make an informed decision as to which subject they will not continue with the following year (in Year 12). Subject Selection Counselling for all Year 9, 10 & 11 students with their parents was held during Careers/Pathways Week on Thursday evening, 23rd July. Letters were sent home advising parents of the details. The Pathways week consisted of a Pathways Expo with an applied and academic focus, a Subject Expo highlighting the programs and subjects and subjects for our current Year 10 students.

The Careers Centre is open to all students throughout the school day. It is run via interview bookings to ensure students' needs are met. Students may also stop by – an open door policy – for a quick chat, followed by an appointment booking if necessary.

REMINDERS...

VTAC APPLICATIONS...

Don't forget to make a VTAC course application if you plan to study next year.

Applications are now open, and close for timely applicants on 30 September (cost \$29.00).

If you apply after this date the cost rises considerably.

Remember that you can change your application as many times as you wish at no extra charge, so you don't have to get it 'right' the first time you apply.

You will need to **register** as an applicant first; after that you can **apply** using the **ID number VTAC supplies** you with when you register.

Also apply if you plan to take a year off from study in 2016. You are able to **defer taking** up the offer of your place for a year in many cases.

You can apply for up to 12 courses, placing them in the order you most want them.

You will be offered a place in the highest course in your list for which you meet the requirements (eg ATAR).

NOTE: If you wish to apply for some Fine Arts specialisations at the University of Melbourne (VCA), applications close early (28 August).

They are: animation, dance, film and television and screenwriting.

SPECIAL ENTRY ACCESS SCHEMES (SEAS)...

Many institutions offer alternative entry schemes that take into account short and long-term disadvantage. The Special Entry Access Schemes (SEAS) allow selection officers to grant special consideration for course entry to applicants (you must still complete any selection requirements for the course). These are the four categories:

- 1 **Personal information and location** (all applicants are encouraged to apply for this Category as something in this category may apply to you)
- 2 Difficult circumstances
- 3 Disadvantaged financial background
- 4 Disability or medical condition

NOTE: It is only possible to complete a SEAS application once you have completed a VTAC course application. There is a summary of institutions accepting SEAS categories on page 42 of the VTAC Guide. In many cases you will have to provide evidence for your application for SEAS. The emphasis is on how you believe the matter you refer to in your SEAS application affected your results.
