Attitudes to School Survey

The "Attitudes to School" survey was also completed by students in all year levels and provides excellent feedback on how students perceive our educational programs and the school environment in which they learn. The data will be available midway through term 3.

Naplan

As parents of Year 7 and Year 9 students will be aware NAPLAN testing in Reading, Writing and Numeracy took place recently.

Your child's NAPLAN report will be issued in September this year and we will for them once we receive them. The same report format is used for every student in Australia.

NAPLAN tests are not pass/fail tests but are used at the classroom level as one of a number of important assessments used by teachers to measure student progress. Whilst teachers are continually monitoring the progress of students, the NAPLAN results provide important milestones to ensure that learning growth is taking place for each student and that as a school we are making the progress expected.

Uniform

At our assemblies students have been reminded of the expectation by School Council that ALL students are to be wearing the correct school uniform including the blazer. It is encouraged that all students will wear the blazer to assemblies. The nylon rain jacket is NOT part of the everyday uniform and is only to be worn on rainy days outside. Please support the College by checking the uniform of your son/daughter in the mornings before they leave home. This term all students are expected to be in full winter uniform. The waterproof PE jacket is NOT part of the everyday uniform and will be confiscated if worn instead of the blazer. Please do not allow your child to leave home with hoodies under their uniform and/or facial piercings. This sets unnecessary conflict between tutor teacher and student before the day begins. We wish every student to wear their uniform with pride.

Lockers

All students have been issued with a locker and they are expected to use the locker to store their bags/books and blazer during the day. No bags are to be taken into the classroom.

Exams

Exams for all year levels are rapidly approaching. Please use your wall charts at home to plan appropriate study time. If for some reason your child does not have a wall chart and you would like one please contact the college and ask to speak to your Year Level Leader.

AVID

If you would like further learning in the AVID program to assist your child at home, please contact Mrs Connie Faranda on 9741 4911. You can secure a time where you can have a one on one session on how best to help your child with their school work at home. Please take advantage of this program. The planner also contains vital information on our AVID program. Please sign your child's planner every week when going through your child's planners and AVID binders.

We continue to strive for the best at WCC and every day remind students of our school wide positive behaviours and our expectations of students to be "In class, on time, in uniform and ready to learn".

Buses

Please do not park in the yellow painted kerb sections on the road (outside the basketball courts) of the College during the hours of: **8.45am-9.15am and at 2.45pm-3:15pm.** This is due to the buses having increased difficulties turning at the end of the road delaying the service and the pickup of students.

School Gates

The first session of the day commences at 8.50am and all students are expected to be in class at this time. **The school gates are closed at 8.45am** to facilitate students arriving to class on time. Students must report to the administration area, after this time, to obtain a late pass and consequences for lateness may apply.

Bike storage at school

Please note that although the school bike racks are locked during the day it is still important that all bikes are locked to the racks with a bike lock or padlock and chain.

This message has been communicated to all students however we would appreciate it if you could remind your son/daughter of this requirement.

Please help us in this by completing the unexplained absence sheets should your child be away.

I continue to be amazed by so many of our children at middle school and commend the great work they do. It is unfortunate that a minority of students do not adhere to our school wide positive behaviours. WCC does not tolerate the use of physical force in resolving conflict and students using any physical force to resolve conflict may be issued with a suspension. Again please assist us to ensure we have a calm environment where students are happy and learning.

SENIOR YEARS REPORT

Senior year's examinations (Years 10, 11 and 12) commence shortly and I encourage all students to commence a revision and study plan for their exams and Tutor Teachers are happy to assist with this. Exam information letters and exam timetables have been sent home with students.

Year 11 and 12 students will only be required to attend school to sit their timetabled exam and are to remain home for exam study at all other times. Year 10 students will have normal classes during exams and are not permitted to leave school.

Any student who is absent during an exam must produce a medical certificate on their return to school to be able to re-sit the exam for a grade.

- Year 10-12 exam period is from Friday 3rd June– Thursday 9th June.
- The GAT Exam is on Tuesday 7th June from 10:00am 1:15pm in the College gymnasium (compulsory for all students studying a Year 12 subject).
- Friday 10th June is a student free day (Teacher Report Writing).
- Monday 13th June is the Queen's Birthday Public holiday.
- Formal VCE classes will recommence on Tuesday 14th June.
- VCAL classes, VET classes and Work-placement will continue as normal during the exam period.

Progress checks have just been completed by teachers and have been mailed to parents of senior years students who have outstanding class work and are at risk of not obtaining a satisfactory pass for a particular subject. If you do receive a progress check then please discuss this with your son/daughter and ensure that the necessary work is completed and submitted for assessment to the appropriate teacher.

We have now completed, with all students, the **Attitudes to School Survey** which provides our College with important data about the opinions of our students in relation to our College. I would like to thank all senior years students for their willing participation and co-operation with this survey and we look forward to receiving the collated data to further drive our College's improvement.

Year 10 students have just completed their work experience placement at a whole range of industries. This vital work placement forms part of the student's studies towards a Year 11 subject, Industry and Enterprise. In my discussions with the students, it was pleasing to hear that so many thoroughly enjoyed the experience, even picking up part time and casual work as a result. The next round of work placement commences on Monday the 10th of October and ends on Friday the 14th of October 2016 so my advice to students is don't miss out on your first choice and get in early with your agreements. 



- Are you fascinated by nature? You can discover more about living things with *biology* and *environmental science* or even *biotechnology* where you can learn about everything from farming to pharmacy products.
- Do you want to be at the **forefront of technology**? A career in **chemistry** allows you to test and produce anything from penicillin to polythene or if you'd like food for thought consider the potential of food science.
- Are you curious about the universe? Physics looks at the smallest sub-atomic particles and the
 forces of the universe but if you want to explore a new frontier of science, discover
 nanotechnology.
- Are you intrigued by the potential of numbers? Mathematics finds patterns and connections and

Tips for supporting your son/daughter during exams

The exam season can be a stressful time for both young people and their parents. It's common for young people to be irritable and maybe have trouble sleeping and eating during this time.

It's normal for parents to be anxious about how much their son or daughter is working and whether they'll get the results they need.

Parents can, however, play a key role in helping their son/daughter cope with exam stress.

- **Don't place unnecessary pressure** to gain certain grades. They may feel they've failed if they don't achieve what they thought was expected of them.
- Remain calm it's not you it's them! It's perfectly normal for parents to become
 anxious and worried for their child in the lead up to exams. Try not to transfer
 any additional anxiety onto them. Don't let your past experiences colour your
 expectations for them. Be calm and supportive.
- Ensure they take regular breaks, eat healthy snacks and exercise.
 Encourage them to join family meals, even if it's a busy revision day get away from the books for a while. Have plenty of healthy snacks in the fridge.
 Make sure everyone in the house starts the day on a good breakfast.
 Porridge, muesli and eggs are good slow-releasing energy foods.
- Look after yourself and relax. While it's important to be supportive and
 present for your child during this time, experience suggests that some time
 out for parents as important as it is for students.
- **Help them revise** by giving them the space and time to do so. Be relaxed about chores or untidiness and understand they might be moody.
- **Keep noise down** and distractions to a minimum during study time.
- Allow them to revise at night if that's what works best for them. However, do make sure that they get enough sleep to keep up energy levels in the day.
- Try to support your son/daughter rather than 'policing' them.
- Observe how your son/daughter is coping and managing their stress. If you
 notice they seem very stressed ask how you can help. Sometimes it's just
 enough for your son/daughter to talk things through. Actively listening can be
 enough to support them.
- Keep perspective exams are not the be-all and end-all. Your son/daughter isn't defined by their results.
