Grade 6 students that applied for the Spanish Immersion Program will sit a test on Friday the 2nd of September during session 3.


We have had a two week visit from two Japanese schools, 17 students and 3 staff from Mito High School and Fukue High School from the 26th July to 8th August.

AVID - Semester 2 AVID FOCUS Year 7-10

This semester, students will continue to be supported, to maintain a well organised binder so that students are organised and prepared for learning in all their classes. Please be aware that if your child requires a new binder they can be purchased at the College for \$11. They are a new and improved blue binder with the school logo. Once they have paid at the office for a new binder they can collect their binder from the AVID PD Centre. If your child requires support with organising their binder, please remind them to come to the AVID PD Centre before school, recess or at lunch time on any day to receive support from Ms Faranda.

In addition, students will continue to be required to complete all steps of the Cornell notes taking system. Please support and encourage your child at home with completing the Cornell note steps using the 10- 24- 7 method. That is, reviewing and revising the day's notes every night, formulating questions the next night and creating summaries at the end of the week for each of their notes. In semester 2 students will be focusing on learning logs. Learning logs supports and consolidates learning by allowing students to respond to a prompt that helps them revisit, articulate and consolidate what they have learned and discover what they don't understand. Finding these gaps in knowledge is critical for students as they seek to take responsibility for their learning by asking questions about, and seeking help for areas of confusion or misunderstanding. Furthermore with the help of their teachers, students will improve their writing skills by completing regular learning logs.

Year 10 AVID Students Attend the Doxa UPP (University Pathway Program) Camp:

This is our experience

During the term break, 4 AVID students attended the Doxa UPP camp. The Doxa UPP camp gave students the opportunity to gain knowledge and a better understanding of their university/career pathways. We spent two and a half days at Doxa UPP camp in the city from the 28th of June to the 30th of June. When we first arrived at the camp site, we had the chance to meet new people and got to know students from other schools. The environment was very safe and friendly which encouraged us to socialise with everybody and contribute to group activities. We were then divided into different groups. Each group had a team leader and their responsibility was to make sure everyone was present and was feeling comfortable.

The group leaders were all current university students, and most of them were studying different courses at different universities which gave us a breath of experience. We assembled at 140 William Street (DLA Piper), where Lindsey, who was the main leader of this camp, presented about "what makes a good presentation?" As a group we came up with ideas relating to how good a presentation may look or sound like. Main points are like engagement, target audience, appearance, and confidence. (Elizabeth)

I have gained more of an idea what my next presentation would look like. Day two, we visited the KPMG and Monash University (Clayton). At KPMG we learnt about what they looked for and how students can determine these skills plus what they look for in an employer. At Monash University, we visited a CSIRO (Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organisation) lab and they also gave a brief presentation about who they are and what they do. On day three, James Freemantle from REDgum Communications, gave us a brief presentation about his university pathway and how he got to where he is today. James gave us advice on how to discover our talents, how to work on through tough situations, and how to help the community around you. This experience was "too good to be true", and I was lucky enough to have this opportunity which literally only comes once a year. Meeting new people and keeping in contact with them is very special. The main thing I would take away is that "just because one door closes, doesn't mean another won't open". (Jenny)

What I enjoyed while I was at Doxa UPP camp was the activities we undertook at the Treasury Gardens. I also enjoyed going and exploring universities and meeting new people who had similar career interests. Being with my group was both fun because we got to know each other more and it helped me be able to work as a team.

Visiting different companies was a really big help because they gave us great advice for our future career choices and advices to support us at school as well. My absolute favourite part was the dinner with the networkers because we got more of an insight in a variety of companies. We also got to ask questions about their university pathway and why they chose to head down that specific pathway. (Najma)

My Doxa UPP camp experience was amazing. The thing that I enjoyed most about the camp was being able to move out of my comfort zone and socialise with new people. They provided us amazing meals and we were able to go out as a group and have dinner in different restaurants. We were allocated teams and group colours that support our activities. Harvard Professor Visits Wyndham Central College

On Thursday 18th August, Wyndham Central College was delighted to host Harvard Professor Eric Mazur as part of National Science week. Professor Mazur simultaneously holds three Chairs at Harvard: he is both the Balkanski Professor of Physics and Applied Physics and was recently appointed as the Chair of the Graduate School of Education. His award-winning work in teaching science in an engaging and interactive way, known as "peer instruction", is recognised worldwide for driving dramatic improvements in students' learning outcomes (in some cases tripling student improvement outcomes). His Socratic approach to teaching is closely aligned with that of AVID. His teaching methodology has been covered in nearly 1,500 papers in peer-reviewed journals & in numerous books. Wyndham central College students who responded to an Expression of Interest to speak with Professor Mazur gathered in the AVID PD Centre last Thursday eagerly anticipating the arrival of such a renowned professor. These enthusiastic students had the opportunity to speak to Professor Mazur about what they were doing in science, VCE physics, AVID school-wide and the AVID Elective programmme. Students then had their chance to do what AVID students do best: ask questions. It was fascinating to hear Professor Mazur recount how he had been encouraged to follow his curiosity of science by his parents who encouraged his natural inquisitiveness. In addition, Professor Mazur spoke of how he had travelled to the USA to take a position at Harvard for one year but has stayed for much longer. We thank AVID Australia for providing Wyndham Central College with this wonderful opportunity and Professor Mazur for taking time form his busy schedule to visit Wyndham Central College.

- HOW CAN I ACCESS THE UNIVERSITY OF MELBOURNE? Students from a rural or isolated area or who have a disadvantaged financial background could be eligible for a guaranteed place at Melbourne by applying through ACCESS MELBOURNE – even if your ATAR is below the Clearly-in Rank.

> WHAT IS HAPPENING TO THE BERWICK CAMPUS OF MONASH?

Monash has announced that it is **closing** its campus at Berwick. The **good news** is that **it will taken over by Federation University** (pending government approvals).

Federation University is a combination of the former University of Ballarat and the former Gippsland campus of Monash University at Churchill.

Federation University will offer 15 degree programs at Berwick in 2017 in the fields of **business**, education, nursing, IT and science.

NOTE: Monash students enrolled at Berwick will **continue to be taught by Monash staff** and, subject to meeting the normal requirements, **graduate with a Monash degree**. Some Monash students may remain at Berwick in 2017, while others will transfer to Peninsula and Clayton campuses to complete their courses.

- MONASH GUARANTEE NEW CATEGORY As mentioned previously, Monash University offers guaranteed places in certain circumstances relating to where your school is located and to your financial circumstances. You will now be eligible for a guaranteed place at Monash if:
- 4 you live in a low socio-economic area or
- your school is a Monash **under-represented school** or
- you have experienced financial disadvantage or
- 4 you are an Indigenous Australian.

> MONASH SCHOLARSHIP


- > With Monash's scholarship programs, students can access a range of services and financial assistance.
- Merit scholarships are awarded based on academic achievement and have both financial and academic benefits. There is no application requirement as it is granted on the ATAR achieved, however, students must have Monash listed as at least one VTAC preference to be considered.
- Equity scholarships are intended for those who identify as Indigenous Australian or Torres Strait Islander, or are currently experiencing financial hardships or disadvantage. Students must submit an application for equity scholarships through VTAC, along with necessary supporting documentation. Applications close on 14 October. See: www.vtac.edu.au/scholarships. > MONASH PATHWAYS

Pathway courses allow students who **may not reach the required ATAR** or **meet prerequisites**, to **gain entry into Monash**.

The **Diploma of Tertiary Studies** (DoTS) and the **Diploma of Higher Education** (DoHE) are both equivalent to the first year of a university undergraduate degree and allow students to transition to the second year of their destination degree. Apply through VTAC. In addition, you must submit a Monash University Supplementary Information Form by 31 December.
