Be at school on time, in uniform and ready to learn

Students on school premises Before School & After School

Please see below an extract from Wyndham Central College's Supervision and Duty of Care Policy

Students will be supervised for a minimum of 10 minutes before and after school. This supervision will include the following:

- Monitoring of entry or exit points and/or designated pick up and drop off areas
- Supervision of the arrival and departure of school contract buses

At Wyndham Central College supervision at the beginning of the school day will commence at **8.30am**. This supervision will include **Buses Location 1 and Buses Location 2**.

Supervision at the end of the school day will be provided until 3.20pm for all students. This supervision will include Buses Location 1, Buses Location 2, Shaw's Road near the Gate Location 7 each until 3.20. DET – Detention Duty until 3.40.

Other supervision may be required if students are needed for CAT/SAC resits until 4.15.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) drops off or otherwise arranges for a student to be on the school premises before supervision commences at the beginning of the day, the Principal or via the Assistant Principals or the Year Level Leading Teachers will, as soon as practicable, follow up with the parent, guardian and/or carer to:

- advise of the supervision arrangements before school, and
- request that the parent, guardian or carer make alternate arrangements.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) has failed to collect the student after school, the next steps may include some or all of the following:

- Attempting to contact the parents, guardians or carers
- Attempting to contact the emergency contacts
- Contacting the Victoria Police and/or the Department of Human Services (Child Protection) to arrange for the supervision, care and protection of the student

School Nurse

A reminder to ensure all <u>medical plans</u> for your children are up to date. Please feel free to contact Catherine on 9741 1911 to discuss medical needs.

If students are unwell at school they are required to attend First Aid and the school nurse will then contact the family if it is deemed necessary. If your child calls you directly please tell them to go to the nurse for medical attention.

Thunderstorm Asthma

From October to December each year there is a high pollen count which students and parents need to be aware of, if they suffer from hayfever or asthma. With last year's Thunderstorm asthma epidemic, it is important to be aware of warnings, taking regular preventative medication and able to have easy access to anti-histamines and reliever medication.

Please ensure you have returned the student's Asthma or Allergy Action Plans to the school. If the student requires any medication that is not currently in the school sickbay, please submit medication to the front office along with completed consent form. Please contact the school nurse for additional information.

Buses

In the interest of student safety and the efficiency of the school buses, please do not park in the yellow painted kerb sections on the road (alongside the basketball courts) at the College during the hours of **8.45am - 9.15am and at 2.45pm-3:15pm.**

The school buses are experiencing increased difficulties turning at the end of the road delaying the service and the pickup of students, increasing the risk to student safety and the damage to motor vehicles. Thank you.

Crossing Supervisor

In the interest of student safety and the efficiency of the school buses, the College has a Crossing Supervisor in the bus service road (Market Road Extension) near the College basketball courts. The supervisor will be responsible for controlling the traffic and supervising the crossing of students.

School Gates

The school day commences at 8.50am with tutor time and all students are expected to be in class at this time with all necessary equipment for Sessions 1 & 2.

The school gates are closed at 8.45am to facilitate students arriving to class on time. Students must report to the administration area, after 8:45 am, to obtain a late pass. Consequences for lateness may apply. Your child should have a note to explain a known lateness.

Bike storage at school

Please note that although the school bike racks are locked during the day it is still important that all bikes are locked to the racks with a bike lock or padlock and chain. This message has been communicated to all students however we would appreciate it if you could remind your son/daughter of this requirement. A bike helmet is also a legal requirement. Please note: Skateboards and scooters are not allowed in the school grounds.

Environmental duty

To assist our school community in being aware of their environment all year levels are responsible for certain areas within the College and also take part in an environmental program to help reduce litter. Could you please encourage your child to be environmentally conscious within the community and use the rubbish bins provided.

School Lawyer Reminder

This is a reminder about Monique, the school lawyer, who can provide legal advice to students and families. Monique can help students with criminal matters, questions about going to court, fines (myki and public transport fines), legal issues about family violence, questions about employment law (like being discriminated against, bullied or underpaid at work), tenancy/housing matters as well as debt/consumer law issues. Many students are wearing this jacket in preference to the blazer. The blazer is a compulsory item for students and it is not acceptable to replace this with the PE jacket. Your Year Level Leader will ask the child to remove the PE jacket if worn at the incorrect times.

As the days get lighter and summer approaches please still ensure your child gets the necessary rest and sleep in preparation for each school day and optimum health. It is important that each day your child learns for their future so one day they are the ones receiving the Year 12 cards and celebrating their achievements.

YEAR 10 REPORT

Welcome back to Term 4 2017!

Reflecting back on Term 3 our Year Ten Students achieved many successes within the College and in our local community. During the term they attended the "Keys Please' presentation, spent the day at Deakin University and completed their second week of work experience. Each event was a great success and gave students the opportunities to learn new life skills that will become increasingly important as they enter their chosen pathway and become independent young adults.

Despite it being a very short term for our Year 10's, we have lots of activities and events coming up. We have an upcoming Celebratory Assembly in Week 4. Students will be running the assembly which will include musical performances, cultural performances, awards and plenty of other activities to acknowledge the growth and the journey that has occurred throughout this year.

Students will be undertaking a Study Skills Unit in their Tutorial time to ensure they are preparing for the upcoming exams, with the vision for students to practice these skills at home. Examples of study skills that are effective for revision include lotus diagrams, cue cards and trigger words. Have the conversation with your child about which study skills technique is best for each of their subjects and ask to see their revision. Give them time and space to revise uninterrupted and privately and test them on key words and vocabulary that are subject specific. Ensure there is minimal time spent on social media and 'on their phones' and encourage early nights and a nutritious diet over the exam period.

It's great to see that many of the Year 10 students already asking teachers for exam advice and starting to revise for their exams.

After the exam period, students will required to attend a re-enrolment interviews with their tutor teachers for 2018 and the STEP UP program into Year 11 later on in the term in Weeks 6, 7 and 8. This is an extremely important time of the year to ensure transition into the Senior Years goes smoothly.

You will receive information regarding these events very soon.

Finally, it was great to see so many parents at the Parent Teacher Days at the end of last term. The reports that were sent home have allowed students to reflect on their current progress and ask questions on what they need to do to achieve their greatest potential for each subject.


DEAKIN EXPERIENCE

That's a wrap for this years' carnival events, there will be more information on 2018's carnivals next year.





ADMINISTRATION REQUIREMENTS

2018 ARRANGMENTS - CAMPS, SPORTS AND EXCURSION FUND

The Victorian state government has once again offered extra funding to families who hold a Centrelink pension card or a Health Care card. \$225 towards the costs associated with camps, excursions and sporting events. These funds will be paid directly to the college and can only be used for the afore mentioned events.

The process has changed slightly this year. If you were in receipt of CSEF funds in 2017 there will be <u>NO</u> requirement to reapply unless you have a child who is starting Wyndham Central College for the first time in 2018. In this case please come to the office complete a form and present your card for copying we will submit your application which is validated by Centrelink directly <u>A copy of your Health Care Card showing the card number must be submitted with all new applications.</u>

For concession card holders CSEF eligibility will be subject to the parent/legal guardian's concession card being successfully validated with Centrelink on the first day of either term one (29 January 2018) or term two (16 April 2018).

YEAR 12 VICTORIAN TERTIARY ADMISSIONS CENTRE (VTAC) - timely applications closed on 28
 September. Applications can still be made, but now cost \$103

YEAR 12 AND VTAC...

- Late **course applications** can still be made, but now cost \$103 (till 3 November, 5pm). After that applications cost \$134 (till 8 December). The payment **deadline** for most applicants is **18 December** (4pm).
- Course preference changes can be made till 12 noon 20 December, except for the period 4 19 November.
 - They can also be made between Offer Rounds in January and February
- The first Offer Round of courses will be on 16 January, the second on 2 February.
- You are advised to accept your first offer of a tertiary place.
 Most applicants will only receive one offer.
 - Accepting an offer does not stop you from receiving a later offer for a course higher in your preference list.

I'M IN YEAR 12 - WHERE CAN I GET ASSISTANCE DURING 'CHANGE OF PREFERENCE' PERIOD?

The period after Year 12's receive their ATAR is known as **Change of Preference (COP)** - Friday 15 December till 12 noon on Wednesday 20 December. During this time tertiary institutions run **information sessions, COP Expos**, offer **phone assistance**, and will help you in any way they can. You can also obtain **assistance at school**. These institutions are offering the following (see online for more details).

Year 12's are encouraged to apply for scholarships on the VTAC website (the deadline has been extended to 12 noon on Monday 16 October). However, as previously noted, it is wise to look out for others such as:

- > \$5,000 yearly allowance

- Other **Monash scholarships Merit scholarships** are awarded based on academic achievement and have financial and academic benefits including membership of some of Monash's exclusive mentoring and leadership programs.
- Equity scholarships are for those who identify as Indigenous Australian or who are experiencing financial hardship or disadvantage. Applicants submit an application through VTAC (new closing date: 12noon, 16 Oct).

CHANGES TO DOCTOR OF MEDICINE (MD) AT MONASH...

This year there are only two VTAC Codes for this course rather than three. Students who apply for the CSP will also be automatically considered for a Bonded Medical Place (BMP) which now means there is no separate VTAC code for BMP. Applicants should note that deferrals will not be allowed except in exceptional circumstances.

- Complete a Diploma of Tertiary Studies at Monash University in either business, education or nursing (ATAR 50+) OR a Diploma of Higher Education (ATAR 65+)

- Complete a course at Monash College in Art & Design, Arts (Human Behaviour or Psychology streams),
 Business or Commerce, Engineering or Science; search Courses on VTAC website
- Complete a course at Deakin College in Commerce, Computing, Engineering, Health Sciences, Management, Media and Communication or Science
- Complete a **UniLink Diploma** at **Swinburne** (Arts and Communications, Business, Design, Engineering, Health Science, IT, Science)
- Complete a Diploma at La Trobe Melbourne in Biosciences, Business, Engineering, Health Sciences, IT or Mass Media Communications
- Complete a **Tertiary Preparation Course** at **RMIT** in engineering or science
- Consider studying a related university course with a lower ATAR
 If you do well you MAY be able to transfer to your desired course later

- Start with a VET (TAFE) course in a related field
 Two years of VET often equals one at university
- Complete a Tertiary Studies Diploma at Melbourne Polytechnic (Preston)
- Complete a Certificate IV in Liberal Arts a pathway into a range of degrees.
 Swinburne and Victoria Universities have this Certificate
- Consider a **country/rural campus**. ATAR's are often lower, usually due to lower demand, most have accommodation (apply ASAP)
- For **nursing** consider first completing **Division 2** at TAFE or a private provider- eg. Box Hill, Chisholm, Federation, Goulburn Ovens, Holmesglen, RMIT or Swinburne
- ACU has certificate/diploma courses that can lead to degrees (through ACUcom)
