#### Students on school premises Before School & After School

#### Please see below an extract from Wyndham Central College's Supervision and Duty of Care Policy

Students will be supervised for a minimum of 10 minutes before and after school. This supervision will include the following:

- Monitoring of entry or exit points and/or designated pick up and drop off areas
- Supervision of the arrival and departure of school contract buses

At Wyndham Central College supervision at the beginning of the school day will commence at **8.30am**. This supervision will include **Buses Location 1** and **Buses Location 2**.

Supervision at the end of the school day will be provided until 3.20pm for all students. This supervision will include Buses Location 1, Buses Location 2, Shaw's Road near the Gate Location 7 each until 3.20. DET – Detention Duty until 3.40.

Other supervision may be required if students are needed for CAT/SAC resits until 4.15.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) drops off or otherwise arranges for a student to be on the school premises before supervision commences at the beginning of the day, the Principal or via the Assistant Principals or the Year Level Leading Teachers will, as soon as practicable, follow up with the parent, guardian and/or carer to:

- advise of the supervision arrangements before school, and
- request that the parent, guardian or carer make alternate arrangements.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) has failed to collect the student after school, the next steps may include some or all of the following:

- Attempting to contact the parents, guardians or carers
- Attempting to contact the emergency contacts
- Contacting the Victoria Police and/or the Department of Human Services (Child Protection) to arrange for the supervision, care and protection of the student.

#### School Nurse

#### Welcome to Claudia Jara our new School Nurse

Claudia commenced with Wyndham Central College on 12<sup>th</sup> March and is a trained nurse with many years' experience in medical clinics and dealing with emergency situations.

A reminder to ensure all <u>medical plans</u> for your children are up to date. Please feel free to contact Claudia on 9741 1911 to discuss any medical needs.

If students are unwell at school they are required to attend First Aid and the school nurse will then contact the family if it is deemed necessary. If your child calls you directly please tell them to go to the nurse for medical attention.

#### Buses

In the interest of student safety and the efficiency of the school buses, please do not park in the yellow painted kerb sections on the road (alongside the basketball courts) at the College during the hours of **8.45am - 9.15am and at 2.45pm-3:15pm**.

The school buses are experiencing increased difficulties turning at the end of the road delaying the service and the pickup of students, increasing the risk to student safety and the damage to motor vehicles.

#### **Crossing Supervisor**

In the interest of student safety and the efficiency of the school buses, the College has a Crossing Supervisor in the bus service road (Market Road Extension) near the College basketball courts. The supervisor will be responsible for controlling the traffic and supervising the crossing of students after school.

#### **School Gates**

The school day commences at 8.50am with tutor time and all students are expected to be in class at this time with all necessary equipment for Sessions 1 & 2.

The school gates are closed at 8.45am to facilitate students arriving to class on time. Students must report to the administration area, after 8:45 am, to obtain a late pass. Consequences for lateness may apply. Your child should have a note to explain a known lateness.

#### Bike storage at school

Please note that although the school bike racks are locked during the day it is still important that all bikes are locked to the racks with a bike lock or padlock and chain. This message has been communicated to all students however we would appreciate it if you could remind your son/daughter of this requirement. A bike helmet is also a legal requirement. Please note: Skateboards and scooters are not allowed in the school grounds.

#### **Environmental duty**

To assist our school community in being aware of their environment all year levels are responsible for certain areas within the College and also take part in an environmental program to help reduce litter. Could you please encourage your child to be environmentally conscious within the community and use the rubbish bins provided.

#### School Lawyer

This is a reminder that Monique – the School Lawyer – can provide free legal advice to students. Monique can help students if they get in trouble with the police and if students have any questions about going to court. If students think the police are treating them unfairly, Monique can also explain their options to make a complaint. Everything said to Monique is confidential and she cannot tell anyone about discussions with students (unless the student consents). The AVID Binders have been affective for students to be organised, and now that most of them have their laptops, they are exploring effective uses of ICT to support their learning.

The students recently received their reports and now we begin to work closely with students and their families to ensure they are achieving their best in their academic programs. Any parents of students deemed 'at risk' will be contacted to put strategies in place to support the student to ensure they are meeting College expectations.

This term we had the Swimming and Athletics Carnival. I am so proud of the Year 7 students at both of these events in following the College Values of Respect and Cooperation. On both occasions, the students behaved appropriately and participated in a range of events. Well Done!

Our first Meet & Greet BBQ this term was a success. With both parents and teachers in attendance, it was a fantastic opportunity for informal conversations to get to know one another. Over the course of the evening, we managed to obtain some data from parents and here is some interesting points to note.

By week 6 of term 1:

- 75% of parents surveyed have been contacted by their Tutor Teacher or classroom teacher.
- Over 80% had logged onto COMPASS and use it regularly.
- 75% of the parents felt their child was well prepared through transition programs as they progressed from Primary to Secondary Education.
- 100% of parents surveyed said their child enjoys attending Wyndham Central College.

As we progress into Term 2, there will be a range of events happening including NAPLAN and exams. It is important for parents to note that these times can be stressful for both parents and students and to provide the needed support for their child in being effectively prepared, especially for exams. It is hard to believe that we are already at the end of what has been a short yet busy Term 1. Students are consistently reminded to be on time, in uniform, with all their equipment and ready to learn. This is important in order for students to stay focused on their work and to achieve their academic goals.

Our overall emphasis in the middle school is on taking responsibility for behaviours, accepting the consequence and 'making it right'. List due dates for essays and work backwards to set mini deadlines for each stage

Prioritise each task to help achieve goals, to avoid being overwhelmed by what has to be done and then rushing at the end

Maintain a balance between study and recreational activities

Use a clear flat space for regular homework and study – not a bed or a couch

Organise your equipment

Keep your school work in an easily accessible spot

If possible, choose a space away from distractions, such as television and phones


#### **SPAIN TOUR 2019**

# ADMINISTRATION REQUIREMENTS

#### 2018 ARRANGMENTS - CAMPS, SPORTS AND EXCURSION FUND

The Victorian state government has once again offered extra funding to families who hold a Centrelink pension card or a Health Care card. \$225 towards the costs associated with camps, excursions and sporting events. These funds will be paid directly to the college and can only be used for the afore mentioned events.

The process has changed slightly this year. If you were in receipt of CSEF funds in 2017 there will be <u>NO</u> requirement to reapply unless you have a child who is starting Wyndham Central College for the first time in 2018. In this case please come to the office complete a form and present your card for copying we will submit your application which is validated by Centrelink directly. <u>A copy of your Health Care Card showing the card number must be submitted with all new applications</u>.

#### **Eligibility Date**

For concession card holders CSEF eligibility will be subject to the parent/legal guardian's concession card being successfully validated with Centrelink on the first day of either term one (29 January 2018) or term two (16 April 2018).

#### **2018 ARRANGMENTS FOR CENTREPAY OR PAYMENT PLANS**

Wyndham Central College offers Payment Plans or CentrePay options for families. If you currently have a CentrePay plan in place there is nothing more you need to do as this will continue. If you would like to discuss Payment Plan options please feel free to call us on 9741 4911 and make an appointment to discuss your needs with the Business Manager.

#### **VISITORS TO THE SCHOOL**

For the safety of staff and students, all visitors to the school must report to the front office (including parents) and log into Compass. In case of an emergency, we need to be aware of who is on site.

#### STUDENTS LEAVING SCHOOL EARLY

If your child needs to leave school early for an appointment, parents are required to send their child with a note in their planner advising the reason and time they need to leave. The student must take the note to their Year Level administration office in the morning to receive an early leaver's pass. This pass can then be shown to the teacher at the time they are leaving class and then also to the front office when they exit the school.

## What's App?

If you haven't already, it is worthwhile downloading the VTAC smartphone app. It lets you discover over 1,700 courses listed with VTAC offered at 57 universities, TAFE institutes and independent tertiary colleges in Victoria.

Its helpful functions include;

- Searching for courses by keyword or course code, filtering your results by institution, campus, area of interest, qualification type and application method.
- Entering your Year 12 study program into the prerequisite and course explorer, establishing a shortlist of courses.
- Enables you to create a VTAC account to check your ATAR and tertiary offer status.

#### **Industry Focus – Health (Paramedic/Ambulance Officer)**

It is worth considering this career if medicine and science is your chosen pathway.

Paramedics provide pre-hospital emergency health care and transport for injured, sick, infirm and aged persons to medical facilities and may perform the following tasks:

- Driving ambulances to sites of medical emergencies and accidents that may require the administration of advanced life support.
- Assessing and treating patients at the site and on the way to hospital.
- Administering pain-relieving drugs and replacing fluids, often by inserting cannulas via veins.
- Preparing patient care records and other written reports including a summary on injury/illness and the treatment provided.
- Lifting patients onto stretchers, loading stretchers into ambulances and transporting to hospital.
- Providing routine transport for patients requiring further or specialized treatment.
- Other duties such as; checking equipment and supplies daily.

Paramedics work in a range of weather conditions and are required to assist at a range of incidents, so they work in teams and shifts. They may be called to motor vehicle accidents and medical emergencies inside or outside of domestic premises, building sites and public areas. Specifically, this could include confined spaces i.e. under vehicles and buildings and hazardous accidents such as fires, chemical spills etc. They also work closely with other emergency workers such as firefighters, police and SES (State Emergency Service). Specialisations in this field include:

- Intensive Care Paramedic Attends life-threatening emergencies and gives intensive treatment to patients before arrival at hospital. (This requires additional training in the areas of anatomy/physiology, pathophysiology and pharmacology to be able to make medical decisions without consultation.
- Paramedic Clinical Instructor Provides training and support to paramedic interns.

Depending on your chosen specialist area, you can refer to the table below for bachelor degree options, which normally are a minimum of 3 years of full time study or equivalent. Upon completion, graduates are then eligible to apply to Ambulance Victoria as a graduate paramedic and complete a one-year practical




