From the Principal's Desk

We have finished semester one on a very positive note with the finalization of examinations, common assessment tasks (CATs) and reports keeping both staff and students busy in the last few weeks. We begin semester two on Monday 18th June with all students 7-12 in the next two weeks of the current term focusing on new content, new units and new elective classes.

Over the course of this Semester I visited many classes from Years 7-12 and I observed students engaged in their learning with high

quality instruction provided by our teachers using our AVID instructional practices with each class using Writing, Inquiry, Collaboration, Organisation and Reading (W.I.C.O.R.) strategies, Cornell notes and Binders to support their learning. I ask that parents continue to work in partnership with the school by supporting your children in completing their three level questions and summaries each evening for homework, encouraging them to read from our new Wheelers eLibrary and ensuring that they have their binders, planners and laptops at school each day being 'ready to learn'.

I have also observed a large number of extra-curricular programs being offered at the College which enable all students to access teachers outside class time where they can gain further feedback and support to help them improve their work. Homework clubs, Collaborative Study Groups, CAT and SAC resists are having a positive impact on the student learning, results and pathway options. Other programs that we have organised for the students throughout this term include; excursions, incursions, student workshops, interschool and zone sports, music rehearsals, STEM programs, SRC conferences and forums, community projects, multicultural week, business management expo and much more. Such programs indicate our College certainly offers a learning environment where students can thrive and develop a sense of connectedness with their peers and teachers.

Reports are now being finalised and will be available on Compass shortly. Printed copies will be sent home with students in the last week of term. I encourage all parents and guardians to read through the reports and report letter, and spend some time reflecting and discussing with your children their achievements in semester one, and what they can do in Term 3 to support the setting of their improvement goals. Regardless of how good a report is I am always impressed with the high level of commitment from the students and staff in relation to our school motto 'Creating a Community of High Expectations' and their focus on improving and achieving.

At this stage of the year the school leadership team have already begun the planning for 2019. This starts with the students completing their Career Action Plans (CAPs) and their submission of the course straw polls.

Students on school premises Before School & After School

Please see below an extract from Wyndham Central College's Supervision and Duty of Care Policy

Students will be supervised for a minimum of 10 minutes before and after school. This supervision will include the following:

- Monitoring of entry or exit points and/or designated pick up and drop off areas
- Supervision of the arrival and departure of school contract buses

At Wyndham Central College supervision at the beginning of the school day will commence at **8.30am**. This supervision will include **Buses Location 1 and Buses Location 2**.

Supervision at the end of the school day will be provided until 3.20pm for all students. This supervision will include Buses Location 1, Buses Location 2, Shaw's Road near the Gate Location 7 each until 3.20. DET – Detention Duty until 3.40.

Other supervision may be required if students are needed for CAT/SAC resits until 4.15.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) drops off or otherwise arranges for a student to be on the school premises before supervision commences at the beginning of the day, the Principal or via the Assistant Principals or the Year Level Leading Teachers will, as soon as practicable, follow up with the parent, guardian and/or carer to:

- advise of the supervision arrangements before school, and
- request that the parent, guardian or carer make alternate arrangements.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) has failed to collect the student after school, the next steps may include some or all of the following:

- Attempting to contact the parents, guardians or carers
- Attempting to contact the emergency contacts
- Contacting the Victoria Police and/or the Department of Human Services (Child Protection) to arrange for the supervision, care and protection of the student.

Attendance

Please report all absences to the Attendance Officer, Maria Wilson by calling the College on 97414911 and selecting Option 1.

School Nurse

A reminder to ensure all <u>medical plans</u> for your children are up to date. Please feel free to contact Claudia on 97414911 to discuss any medical needs. If students are unwell at school they are required to attend First Aid and the school nurse will then contact the family if it is deemed necessary. If your child calls you directly please tell them to go to the nurse for medical attention.

Buses

In the interest of student safety and the efficiency of the school buses, please do not park in the yellow painted kerb sections on the road (alongside the basketball courts) at the College during the hours of **8.45am - 9.15am and at 2.45pm-3:15pm.**

The school buses are experiencing increased difficulties turning at the end of the road delaying the service and the pickup of students, increasing the risk to student safety and the damage to motor vehicles.

Crossing Supervisor

In the interest of student safety and the efficiency of the school buses, the College has a Crossing Supervisor in the bus service road (Market Road Extension) near the College basketball courts. The supervisor will be responsible for controlling the traffic and supervising the crossing of students after school.

School Gates

The school day commences at 8.50am with tutor time and all students are expected to be in class at this time with all necessary equipment for Sessions 1 & 2.

The school gates are closed at 8.45am to facilitate students arriving to class on time. Students must report to the administration area, after 8:45 am, to obtain a late pass. Consequences for lateness may apply. Your child should have a note to explain a known lateness.

Bike storage at school

Please note that although the school bike racks are locked during the day it is still important that all bikes are locked to the racks with a bike lock or padlock and chain. This message has been communicated to all students however we would appreciate it if you could remind your son/daughter of this requirement. A bike helmet is also a legal requirement. Please note: Skateboards and scooters are not allowed in the school grounds.

Environmental duty

To assist our school community in being aware of their environment all year levels are responsible for certain areas within the College and also take part in an environmental program to help reduce litter. Could you please encourage your child to be environmentally conscious within the community and use the rubbish bins provided.

School Lawyer

This is a reminder that Monique – the School Lawyer – can provide free legal advice to students and their parents. Monique can help parents if they have a legal matter that impacts on the student. For example, if a landlord is refusing to make important repairs to a rented property or is trying to evict your family in circumstances that seem unfair, Monique can provide legal advice. If you have debts that you are struggling to manage and are in financial hardship, Monique might be able to help you negotiate with the lender to go on a payment plan or waive part of the

debt. If you are in a car accident and have any questions about insurance, Monique might also be able to assist with that. Everything said to Monique is confidential. WOW what a term it has been!

Finally with NAPLAN and exams over, it is soon time to move into the new Semester. This will mean a changeover of the students' elective and language subjects. As we move into the second semester, the students will be continuing work on their Careers Action Plans during Tutor time, along with other topics exploring their social and emotional development. With the reports out, you may have some queries about your child's report. Please don't hesitate to contact your child's classroom teacher for further clarification.

In other news, on May 28th, I had the privilege to participate in the year 7s last 'dance off' for sport. The whole year level got together in the gym and we all learnt some new moves from the teachers at Dance Mob and busted out some of our best moves! It was a great experience.

Also, on Wednesday 27th June, students from year 7 and 8 will be participating in a 'Night at the Museum.' This is an opportunity for the students to show case their learning from topics learnt in Humanities, preparing an exhibit to present on the afternoon. Check COMPASS and notes sent home for more information about this event.

As I mentioned in the last newsletter, there has been some work happening with the year 7s around 'The 7 Habits of Highly Effective Teens.' We have begun to explore the first habit – 'Be Proactive.' This linked nicely with the students studying for the exams. This habit is all about students making proactive choices based on values – thinking before they act. I like the idea of students recognising that they can't control everything that happens to them, but they can control what they do about it. We referred to this in the analogy of a remote control – taking charge of the remote and not letting other people or things take control of us, but having control of ourselves through our thoughts and actions. This may be a good topic of conversation at home.

Some reminders to all families:

- Homework club is available for students to attend on a Monday and Wednesday afterschool
- In line with school policy, it is expected all students are attending Wyndham Central College in full school uniform. We acknowledge as winter is upon us, students are attempting to wear incorrect attire. There are plenty of options available for the students including the woolen jumper and blazer for these cooler days. The PE/Sport jacket is NOT a part of the full school uniform. This is only to be worn on days the student has sport.
- If your child is away or late for any reason, a note in their planner from their parent or guardian is essential. This helps alleviate the hassle of phone calls. COMPASS is also a great tool for parents to utilise to notify of any attendance changes. 'It's not OK to be away.'

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It has been a busy, yet productive, Term 2. The Year 9 students completed NAPLAN in mid-May and the cohort must be congratulated on the exemplary way in which they undertook the testing. Thanks you to the Year 9 teachers and Ms. Hawke and Mr. Conway for their work in organising the logistics of NAPALN at Year 9. I would also like to complement the students at Year 9 and 10 on the way they have approached the mid - year examinations this term.

Exams are an important component of the preparing students for success in the senior school and I can see that the students are recognising this and making efforts to improve. I encourage all parents to support their child to maintain a regular and effective home study program. At Wyndham Central College, the AVID system supports effective study with the use of the Cornell note taking system that requires students to review and revise their notes for each class on a regular basis using the 10-24-7 model. That is revising and reviewing their note 10 minutes, 24 hours and 7 days after first being exposed to the notes by their teacher.

I am proud to say that we received wonderful feedback regarding out Year 10 students who attended STRAIGHT TALK on 13th June from Smith Family who organised the event and from all mentors, community and business members, who worked with our students. In addition a member of the Department of Education, who was present of the day, provided glowing feedback about how our students engaged in the opportunity presented by this event. Congratulations to all the Year 10 students. Thank you to the tutor teachers and to Mr. Cook for organising this events and ensuring a successful day.

Reports will be distributed on Friday 22nd June, I encourage all students to carefully reflect on their Semester 1 report and to set goals for Semester 2 that will allow them to be successful. These goals must be revisited regularly and displayed in a prominent place as a reminder of what they are working towards achieving. Parents and guardians can support by talking to your child about their goals and how they are progressing on a regular basis.

The 2019 course selection process is well underway. The STRAWPOLLS are due on the 26th June. Parents please ensure that your child has completed this form and that you have signed it to show that you are aware what your child's subject selection for 2019. WCC has a thorough course selection process. Student work with their tutor teachers and with the Careers and Pathways team to complete the Careers Action Plan (CAP).

It has been great to hear so much positive feedback from students and their parents/guardians regarding their Tutor Teachers. Try-outs occur on:

15th July for Victoria U16's Trials, Power House Junior Rugby Club, Loft Reserve Altona.

22nd July Junior Gold Cup U15 Trials, Power House Junior Rugby Club, Loft Reserve Altona.



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Industry Focus - Arts Musician

Musicians can write, arrange, orchestrate, perform, record and conduct musical compositions. A musician may perform a variety of tasks depending on their area of specialisation. It is helpful to be have skills and flair with music i.e. a mastery of one or more styles of music such as classical, jazz or pop as well as self-confidence, motivation, dedication, determination, good concentration and communication skills and overall stamina for performance.

There are a variety of specialisations in the music industry and these can include:

- Music Arranger transcribers musical compositions or melodic lines to adapt and modify them for
 particular performance formats, such as orchestras, bands, choral groups or solo performance.
 People with these skills may proceed to a number of jobs, including music teacher, music director,
 conductor or record producer.
- **Music Critic** is employed by media publishers to report on the performing arts. Local areas usually have part-time critics who report regularly on performances and visiting artists in the local media.
- Musicologist interprets musical history and style. Musicologists generally work as lecturers.
- Performing Musician/Instrumentalist may play one or more instruments in recital performances. This may be in accompaniment only, or as a member of an orchestra, band or musical group, including chamber ensembles. Musicians spend a number of hours each day in private practice to prepare music for rehearsals and performance. They may record backing tracks and programme electronic devices to be used in performance. Musicians may need to listen to and analyse music in either written or recoded form to build their repertoire. They also need to prepare and maintain their instruments for peak performance. They may compose and write music and lyrics or combine and/or arrange music across a number of styles, including classical, pop, jazz, folk, country show music and various forms of dance music.
- Vocalist may work solo, with an accompanist or with bands, ensembles, orchestras or in concert opera. Work can be on a casual or permanent basis. Vocalists develop a repertoire and many specialize in a particular style or work on stage, radio or television. They may entertain as soloists, perform in a group or play an instrument. Vocalists need to train and develop their voice and capacity to sing, as well as develop presentation and performance skills. They need to be able to understand music and be able to work with bands and orchestras.
- Classical Musician is highly technical and develops a high level of ensemble skills. Classical
 musicians must develop the ability to adapt to the demands of international conductor and soloists.
 They develop knowledge of classical, opera and ballet repertoire, and may undertake additional
 training at music schools overseas.



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- **Composer** creates musical compositions for films, plays, television, concerts and operas. Composers may specialize in one type of music or in compositions of particular instruments. They may write lyrics to accompany the music.
- Music Conductor conducts instrumental groups such as symphony orchestras and large bands. Conductors may audition and select members of a group. They choose music to accommodate the groups abilities and to suit different types of performance events. Conductors become familiar with the complete musical score, conduct rehearsals, instruct players on their performances and try to make the best use of each instrumentalist's talents. They conduct performances in which they control factors such as balance, rhythm, dynamics and timing to create an effect consistent with their own interpretation of the score.
- Ethnomusicologist studies music in its cultural context and seeks to understand the relationship between musical cultures. They may work as composers, performers, lecturers or researchers. They usually work within an academic institution such as a university, exploring, studying, researching and writing scholarly articles on music or musicians. Fieldwork in various regions of the world may be required, where they record music from a particular area, ethnic group or performing group.
- **Jazz Musician** often recognised for their superior skills in improvisation. Their ensemble skills are similar to those required in chamber groups.

There is much scope in the music industry with work available across a number of areas. Many musicians are self-employed or engaged through agents. You can become a music or singing teacher and set up your own practice or be appointed to the staff at a primary or secondary school, conservatorium, private music school or university. There are careers available with the Australian Broadcasting Corporation, commercial radio and television stations and Australian Defence Force, as well as work in music librarianship, arts administration, music journalism, music and instrument sales, music and record publishing, music direction and musicological research. A few factors may affect employment in certain companies i.e. government funding and level of activity in the hospitality industry.

To become a musician, you usually have to complete formal training in a chosen musical field, although some musicians are self-taught. You may like to consider a VET qualification in music. Applicants may be required to attend an audition, interview or musicianship/music proficiency theory test. Alternatively, you can become a musician by studying music at university. To get into these courses you usually need to gain your VCE having completed certain prerequisite subjects. Please refer to your chosen course(s) and institution(s) for further entry requirements and latest information.
