Students on school premises Before School & After School

Please see below an extract from Wyndham Central College's Supervision and Duty of Care Policy

Students will be supervised for a minimum of 10 minutes before and after school. This supervision will include the following:

- Monitoring of entry or exit points and/or designated pick up and drop off areas
- Supervision of the arrival and departure of school contract buses

At Wyndham Central College supervision at the beginning of the school day will commence at **8.30am**. This supervision will include **Buses Location 1** and **Buses Location 2**.

Supervision at the end of the school day will be provided until 3.20pm for all students. This supervision will include Buses Location 1, Buses Location 2, Shaw's Road near the Gate Location 7 each until 3.30pm.

DET – Detention Duty until 3.40pm.

Other supervision may be required if students are needed for CAT/SAC resits until 4.15pm.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) drops off or otherwise arranges for a student to be on the school premises before supervision commences at the beginning of the day, the Principal or via the Assistant Principals or the Year Level Leading Teachers will, as soon as practicable, follow up with the parent, guardian and/or carer to:

- advise of the supervision arrangements before school, and
- request that the parent, guardian or carer make alternate arrangements.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) has failed to collect the student after school, the next steps may include some or all of the following:

- Attempting to contact the parents, guardians or carers
- Attempting to contact the emergency contacts
- Contacting the Victoria Police and/or the Department of Human Services (Child Protection) to arrange for the supervision, care and protection of the student.

Attendance

Please report all absences to the Attendance Officer, Maria Wilson by calling the College on 97414911 and selecting Option 1.

School Nurse

A reminder to ensure all <u>medical plans</u> for your children are up to date. Please feel free to contact Claudiathe School Nurse on 97414911 to discuss any medical needs. If students are unwell at school they are required to attend First Aid and the school nurse will then contact the family if it is deemed necessary. If your child calls you directly please tell them to go to First Aid for medical attention.

Buses

In the interest of student safety and the efficiency of the school buses, please do not park in the yellow painted kerb sections on the road (alongside the basketball courts) at the College during the hours of **8.45am - 9.15am and at 2.45pm-3:15pm.**

The school buses are experiencing increased difficulties turning at the end of the road delaying the service and the pickup of students, increasing the risk to student safety and the damage to motor vehicles.

Crossing Supervisor

In the interest of student safety and the efficiency of the school buses, the College has a Crossing Supervisor in the bus service road (Market Road Extension) near the College basketball courts. The supervisor will be responsible for controlling the traffic and supervising the crossing of students after school.

School Gates

The school day commences at 8.50am with tutor time and all students are expected to be in class at this time with all necessary equipment for Sessions 1 & 2.

The school gates are closed at 8.50 am to facilitate students arriving to class on time. Students must report to the administration area, after 8:50 am, to obtain a late pass. Consequences for lateness may apply. Your child should have a note to explain a known lateness.

Bike storage at school

It is important that all bikes are locked to the racks with a bike lock or padlock and chain. This message has been communicated to all students however we would appreciate it if you could remind your son/daughter of this requirement. A bike helmet is also a legal requirement. Please note: Skateboards and scooters are not allowed in the school grounds.

Environmental duty

To assist our school community in being aware of their environment all year levels are responsible for certain areas within the College and also take part in an environmental program to help reduce litter. Could you please encourage your child to be environmentally conscious within the community and use the rubbish bins provided.

Emergency Management Plan

The Wyndham Central College Emergency Management Plan is tested regularly to ensure the safety of all students, staff and school visitors in the event of an emergency situation. As part of this plan we conduct four emergency drills per year, two lock down drills and two fire drills and students are made aware of when a drill is about to commence.

School Lawyer

This is a reminder that Monique – the School Lawyer – can provide free legal advice to students and their parents. Monique can help parents if they have a legal matter that impacts on the student. For example, if a landlord is refusing to make important repairs to a rented property or is trying to evict your family in circumstances that seem unfair, Monique can provide legal advice. If you have debts that you are struggling to manage and are in financial hardship, Monique might be able to help you negotiate with the lender to go on a payment plan or waive part of the debt. If you are in a car accident and have any questions about insurance, Monique might also be able to assist with that. Everything said to Monique is confidential. The College will work on this data at a whole school level and with classroom teachers to continue to make improvements to the teaching and learning program.

There have been lots of activities and programs for students to get involved with this term. From lunch time clubs, to inter-school sports, talent shows and special guest presentation all tastes have been catered for. We are hoping to put together an evening event that showcases some of the talent and diversity we have at the College so stay tuned for future announcements.

I had the pleasure yesterday of spending the day at the Lady Northcote outdoor activity center with a group of year 8s who are working on an applied learning program. They were put through their paces and had to reach deep to overcome their fear of heights as they scaled 8 meter high ropes courses (which included a free-fall leap of faith), and ride on the 21 meter giant swing (glad it was them and not me). It's always such a privilege to work with students outside the school grounds and I'd like to say a big thank you to Mr. Allan Bernadi for putting the program together.

7B excursion to Science works

This is a well know and well researched method of supporting students to achieve success. It is known to increase student confidence and improve exam results. This will be vital for upcoming exams. Organisation is also important for success and students are required to ensure that they have a well organised binder that they bring to all classes. This ensures that they have all equipment and work is kept together. Please support your child to develop their Cornell notes and keep a well organised binder.

Road Smart

The Year 10 Cohort participated Road Smart program a road safety education and training program designed to build on the existing road knowledge, skills and behaviours of Year 10 students. The program aims to help lay down the foundations for safe driving among young drivers. A timely program, as many of our Year 10 students begin to prepare to apply for Learner Permits. 


Homework Clubs

Deakin Update

Further to the courses listed in the last newsletter, Deakin have amended additional courses.

Bachelor of Information Systems has been changed to <u>Bachelor of Analytics</u>. This course will teach students how to use technology to capture and use digital information effectively in organisational settings. Critically analysing an organisation's information in order to decide on the best business analytics software.

Also commencing in 2019 is a new combined course - <u>Bachelor of Exercise and Sport Science/Bachelor of Nutrition Science</u>. This combines exercise and nutrition to help the community optimise physical performance and nutrition, and contribute to the prevention of diet and physical activity related diseases. Graduates will be eligible for accreditation with Exercise and Sport Science Australia (ESSA) to become accredited exercise scientists.

Deakin has some campus changes next year:

- Associate Degree of Arts There will be no Cloud campus intake for 2019.
- Bachelor of Early Childhood Education This course will no longer be offered at the Waurn Ponds
 Campus, Warrnambool Campus from 2019. These students will instead need to enroll in the Cloud
 Campus and attend intensive classes.
- Bachelor of International Studies Is moving from Geelong Waurn Ponds Campus to the Waterfront Campus from Trimester 1, 2019.
- Bachelor of Science Will no longer be offered at the Warrnambool Campus from Trimester 1, 2019 but will continue to be offered at the Melbourne/Burwood Campus and Geelong/Waurn Ponds Campus.



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The discontinued courses at Deakin from 2019 are:

- Bachelor of Arts Chinese/Bachelor of Commerce.
- Bachelor of Psychology (Professional Streams).
 This course has been discontinued however, Deakin still offers majors through other undergraduate psychology courses.
- The Bachelor of Biological Science, (Burwood campus).

Don't forget, Deakin's Regional and Remote Entry Scheme is available to applicants who have completed their Year 12 studies in a school located in any non-metro area of Australia or from within the City of Greater Geelong. Eligible applicants may receive up to a 10 aggregate point adjustment towards their entry score for admission for the following courses:

Career Focus: Building & Construction

There are many areas of **Construction** to choose from, for example; Civil Construction (Road Infrastructure Worker and Road Worker), Construction Worker (Builder's Laborer and Concrete Worker), Builder (coordinating the construction of dwellings and other structures), Building Supervisor (overseeing construction projects for large companies) and Building Surveyor (Building Certifier and Building Inspector).



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You can also consider a specific building trade; Bricklayer, Brick Cleaner, Carpenter, Carpet Layer, Concreter, Electrician, Glazier, Insulation Installer, Tiler, Painter, Plumber or Plasterer. Many students become qualified in a building trade initially and later undertake further study to become a **Building & Construction Manager** or **Registered Builder**.

Overall the Australian Government has projected a 10% increase in employment in the construction industry within the next five years. Employment growth in the engineering construction sector, supported by continued infrastructure investment, is expected to be stronger than that in residential construction, which is expected to grow at a pace more in line with population growth. Seek have reported that Construction Management and Project Management specifically are currently in the top 10 highest paying occupations in Victoria.

Building and Construction Managers are responsible for design, development, construction and operation of civil engineering and large-scale residential and commercial building projects. They require skills in project planning, cost and quality management, construction techniques and materials, building law, building codes, industrial relations and personnel management.

If you intend to become a *Victoria-based Registered Building Practitioner*, after your training you will need to become licensed with the Victorian Building Authority (VBA). The VBA considers your qualifications as well as your skills and experience in a full assessment. In order to become a Victoria-based Registered Building Practitioner, you must be prescribed and accredited under the 2006 Education & Training Reform Act and first obtain one of the following:

- CPC40110 Diploma
- Associated Diploma
- Degree in Building & Construction (Building)

The VBA offers an option for building practitioners to register under a specific license class:

- Domestic Builder Unlimited (DB-U). This license allows the registered builder to carry out domestic work in their own capacity, or hire subcontractors to perform the work.
- Domestic Builder Manager (DB-M) This license holder may not perform any unsupervised building work, but may work under the supervision of a registered practitioner, or may hire registered practitioners to do the work.
- Domestic Builder Limited (DB-L) This license allows a building practitioner to arrange, manage or perform building work as authorised by the VBA.

To work as a Registered Builder or Construction Manager, it is helpful to have good communication and interpersonal skills, management and leadership skills, be efficient with planning, be well organized and have an aptitude for technical activities. To become qualified, you usually have to complete a VET



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qualification in Building and Construction or by studying Construction Management at university. As subjects and prerequisites vary between institutions, you should contact your chosen institution for further information. To gain entry into these courses, you usually need to gain your VCE.
