UNIFORM

Just a few gentle reminders about uniform, all students should be in their summer uniform now, boys are still permitted to wear pants (as are girls) but all the girls should be wearing their summer dress (or shorts), not the winter skirt. If you child has a genuine reason to be out of uniform (i.e. shoes are broken and will be replaced on the weekend) they are required to bring a note for their Tutor Teacher who will issue them a pass. Students cannot get a pass for out of uniform pants, jumpers or jackets. The students look great when they are in full school uniform so we'd really appreciate your support in this.

Parking

Parking in the gravel area opposite the College (Galvin Park Oval) will not be accessible due to Wyndham City Council construction. In the interest of student safety and the efficiency of the school buses, please do not park in the yellow painted kerb sections on the road (alongside the basketball courts) at the College during the hours of **8.45am** - **9.15am** and at **2.45pm-3:15pm**.

The school buses are experiencing increased difficulties turning at the end of the road delaying the service and the pickup of students, increasing the risk to student safety and the damage to motor vehicles.

Students on school premises Before School & After School

Please see below an extract from Wyndham Central College's Supervision and Duty of Care Policy

Students will be supervised for a minimum of 10 minutes before and after school. This supervision will include the following:

- Monitoring of entry or exit points and/or designated pick up and drop off areas
- Supervision of the arrival and departure of school contract buses

At Wyndham Central College yard duty supervision at the beginning of the school day will commence at **8.30am**. This supervision will include **Buses Location 1 and Buses Location 2**.

Yard duty supervision at the end of the school day will be provided until **3.20pm for all students**. This supervision will include **Buses Location 1**, **Buses Location 2**, **Shaw's Road near the Gate Location 7 each until 3.30pm**. **DET – Detention Duty until 3.40pm**.

Other supervision may be required if students are needed for CAT/SAC resits until 4.15pm.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) drops off or otherwise arranges for a student to be on the school premises before supervision commences at the beginning of the day, the Principal or via the Assistant Principals or the Year Level Leading Teachers will, as soon as practicable, follow up with the parent, guardian and/or carer to:

- advise of the supervision arrangements before school, and
- request that the parent, guardian or carer make alternate arrangements.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) has failed to collect the student after school, the next steps may include some or all of the following:

- Attempting to contact the parents, guardians or carers
- Attempting to contact the emergency contacts
- Contacting the Victoria Police and/or the Department of Human Services (Child Protection) to arrange for the supervision, care and protection of the student.

Attendance

Please report all absences to the Attendance Officer, Maria Wilson by calling the College on 97414911 and selecting Option 1.

School Nurse

A reminder to ensure all <u>medical plans</u> for your children are up to date. Please feel free to contact Claudia the School Nurse on 97414911 to discuss any medical needs. If students are unwell at school they are required to attend First Aid and the school nurse will then contact the family if it is deemed necessary. If your child calls you directly please tell them to go to First Aid for medical attention.

Crossing Supervisor

In the interest of student safety and the efficiency of the school buses, the College has a Crossing Supervisor in the bus service road (Market Road Extension) near the College basketball courts. The supervisor will be responsible for controlling the traffic and supervising the crossing of students after school.

School Gates

The school gates are closed at 8.50 am to facilitate students arriving to class on time. Students must report to the administration area, after 8:50 am, to obtain a late pass. Consequences for lateness may apply. Your child should have a note to explain a known lateness.

Bike storage at school

It is important that all bikes are locked to the racks with a bike lock or padlock and chain. This message has been communicated to all students however we would appreciate it if you could remind your son/daughter of this requirement. A bike helmet is also a legal requirement. Please note: Skateboards and scooters are not allowed in the school grounds.

Environmental duty

To assist our school community in being aware of their environment all year levels are responsible for certain areas within the College and also take part in an environmental program to help reduce litter. Could you please encourage your child to be environmentally conscious within the community and use the rubbish bins provided.

Emergency Management Plan

The Wyndham Central College Emergency Management Plan is tested regularly to ensure the safety of all students, staff and school visitors in the event of an emergency situation. As part of this plan we conduct four emergency drills per year, two lock down drills and two fire drills and students are made aware of when a drill is about to commence.

School Lawyer

Monique – the School Lawyer – sadly finished up at Wyndham Central College on 25 October 2018. She would like to thank the school community for making her feel so welcome. Students and families with existing legal matters have been allocated new lawyers at WEstjustice. Changes to this program for 2019 will be communicated in our next newsletter.



Term four is certainly proving to be a busy one with our students preparing for their end of year assessments and exams. It's been fantastic to see so many students accessing our Homework club and seeking help from the teachers who are staffing the program.

It has also been pleasing to see the amount of students who are being rewarded VIVO points at our weekly assemblies, I think there were well over 100 in year seven this week. Teachers are asked to nominate students based on an element of our Positive School Wide Behaviour matrix. This week teachers are looking for students 'who help others' as well as 'keep the school clean'. When teachers observe students displaying these behaviours they nominate them to the Year Level Leader who rewards them with 25 VIVO points. We also have a random draw which will award a student 500 VIVOs if their name is generated. I think we awarded a few thousand VIVOs at this week's assembly because the students are exhibiting such positive behavior.

Another exciting event we are working towards is the grade six into year seven transition process. Mr. Rowe, Ms. Fracalossi and myself have been busy over the last two weeks visiting all our feeder primary schools, meeting the new students and distributing enrolment packs. We have planned two transition days, one for everyone and one for those who may need a bit more support with transitioning to high school (we all know it can be a daunting time). We are thrilled to be welcoming so many fresh and friendly faces to our college, it's been a real pleasure meeting our new cohort and are eagerly planning programs for them for 2019.

Good luck to all the students who will undergo their exams in the coming month! There are teachers available after school for those who need additional support. We encourage all families to provide a quiet study-space at home, and that you have high expectations for your children to succeed. A small quote to end on 'stay positive, work hard, make it happen'.

On the 18th of October, we had the opening of the Wyndham Central Annual Art show. A range of students from year had presented art work in Art show, some receiving awards. In Particular we acknowledge Keira Fathers-Rattray who won the People's Choice Award. Well done Keira. We look forward to the students skills developing next year. Just a reminder about a couple of processes, if a student is late to school or out of uniform – unexplained - twice in a week, they will receive and afterschool detention for this. YEAR'S 9 & 10 REPORT

We are well into a busy Term 4, as student's complete their 2018 studies and prepare to transition into 2019. It is important to remember that although the end of the 2018 academic year is fast approaching their still much work to be done to ensure satisfactory completion of this school year. Students must continue to be focused on their studies, follow the school values of respect cooperation and excellence and demonstrate these values in their daily school life. This means that students must arrive to school and to each class on time, in uniform and with all equipment ready to learn. Additionally students must attempt all work and seek assistance when required. I ask for the support of all parents and guardians in reiterating these expectations to their children.

Examinations commence for Year 10 students on Wednesday 7th November and for Year 9 students on Thursday 22nd November. All students should already be participating in a regular homework pattern as a matter of normal work habits; using the AVID Cornell note taking system is a proven system of success and one useful way to revise. Leading up to examinations periods, the focus on constructive revision and preparation for examinations should be accelerated. In preparation for the examination period, all students should have developed a study timetable, to revise and prepare for their upcoming exams. I encourage all students to speak with their individual teachers to gain specific feedback on how to best prepare for exams and ensure they have completed all course work.

An examination timetable for students, along with a letter outlining Term 4 important dates, has been issued to all Year 10 students and will be issued to Year 9 students in the coming weeks. Please ensure that your child is familiar with the times that their exams occur. Students are expected to attend all exams in full school uniform.

Parents and guardians play a vital role in supporting their child by providing a quite work place for study and revision and encouraging them to work to their potential.

- Year 9 Step-up Program: 5th 18th December

Compass

Parents and Carers can find Learning Tasks and Resources via their Compass account – a hassle-free way to allow for further study outside of regular school hours. Attendance and unexplained absences can also be monitored using either the Compass app or website, and reasons for absences provided by adding an Attendance Note. A reminder that it is a Department of Education requirement that Parents/Guardians provide a reason for all unexplained absences. I would like to thank the Year 9 Tutor Team, students, and their families for their communications regarding attendance. I am overjoyed that unexplained absences at Year 9 are at an all-time low. Please contact the College ICT Department if you have any questions or issues with logging onto your Compass account.

Exams

Year 9s will begin their exam period on Thursday, November 22nd, and conclude Wednesday, November 28th. It is of utmost importance that students are attending every session every day, to ensure they give themselves the greatest chance at achieving success.

While most students are demonstrating they are ready for Senior School, a small number of students are continuing with detrimental behaviours such as truancy, being unprepared for class, and socialising during class time. This is not only preventing them from learning valuable knowledge and skills, but it can also impact the learning of others. I ask all parents and carers to speak with their child about the importance of our College values: Respect, Cooperation and Excellence. These discussions will assist students as they revise for their exams, and transition into Year 10 students.

End of Year Processes and Step Up

Following exams, out Middle Years Parent/Teacher Goal Setting interviews will take place on Monday 3rd of December and Tuesday 4th of December. These compulsory meetings are designed to open the line of communication between home and school for the following year, and are a fantastic opportunity for students and their loved ones can express any key information with their 2019 Tutor Teacher, enabling proactive planning of supports. I look forward to seeing all parents and carers attending.

Our Year 9 into 10 Step Up program will begin on Wednesday 5th December. While we expect that all students put careful consideration into their subject selections earlier this year, In order to avoid disappointment, students must inform their Year Level Leader of any timetable issues before the end of 2018. The Goal Setting Interviews are on November 15th and 16th. Students are to attend in their school uniforms with their parents/guardians as normal scheduled classes do not run on these days for senior school students.

Step Up

Year 11 Step Up begins on Monday November 19th until Friday 30th November. During this time, your students will begin their VCE/ VCAL journey at Wyndham Central College. The expectations for this time is for 100% attendance rate for all students to make sure they get the best possible start to their senior years. 






PARENT PAYMENT SHEETS

The 2019 English Novel list, Campion Booklist and Parent Payment Sheets for each year level have or will be distributed by early December 2018. The costs associated with the English Novel list and the Campion Booklist is required to be paid directly to Campion Education, the novels will be delivered to the college and distributed to the students who have ordered them; the book packs can be either delivered to your home or can be collected on the Book Collection Day in January 2019.

Wyndham Central College negotiates with many suppliers to keep costs to a minimum. An expectation of 50% of the Parent Payment Sheet costs is requested in December 2018 and the other 50% on the return of students in January 2019. The college offers various payment options which include Cash, EFTPOS and of course BPAY, the latter allows the convenience to parents to make payment at any time for any amount. We also offer Cash Payment Plans and the CentrePay option for holder of Health Care Cards but there is a requirement to have a meeting with the Business Manager in this situation; for families who already have CentrePay it will continue as it has in the past and there is no need to discuss this plan unless there is a requirement to reduce or increase the amount. 2019 ARRANGMENTS - CAMPS, SPORTS AND EXCURSION FUND (CSEF)

The Victorian state government has once again offered extra funding to families who hold a Centrelink pension card or a Health Care card. \$225 towards the costs associated with camps, excursions and sporting events. These funds will be paid directly to the college and can only be used for these types of events/activities.

In 2019 families who applied at our college for this in 2018 will **NOT** need to complete a new form it will be an automatic process. Except in the following situations:

- An existing family has a new child starting in 2019
- A new family starts at the college

In this instance a form will be required to be completed and a copy of a current Health Care /Pension card must be produced.

All applications will be validated by CentreLink and if the criteria is not meet

Eligibility Criteria

All applications will be subject to the parent/legal guardian's concession card being successfully validated with Centrelink on the first day of either term one (29 January 2019) or term two (23 April 2019).

VISITORS TO THE SCHOOL

For the safety of staff and students, all visitors to the school must report to the front office (including parents) and log into Compass. In case of an emergency, we need to be aware of who is on site.

STUDENTS LEAVING SCHOOL EARLY

If your child needs to leave school early for an appointment, parents are required to send their child with a note in their planner advising the reason and time they need to leave. The student must take the note to their Year Level administration office in the morning to receive an early leaver's pass. This pass can then be shown to the teacher at the time they are leaving class and then also to the front office when they exit the school.

Career Focus - Disability Support Worker

According to the Australian Government's Department of Jobs and Small Business, Aged and Disabled Carers will see an increase of 39.3% in job opportunities within the next 5 years. 'Disability Support Workers' can also be known as an; Aged Carer, Developmental Care Worker, Disabled Carer, Home Support Worker, Intellectual Disability Services, Nursing Assistant (Disability Support) and Special Care Worker.

Disability support workers provide care, supervision and support for people with disabilities in the home, residential establishments, clinics and hospitals. They also work with other health professionals to maximise the individual's physical and mental wellbeing. They provide companionship and emotional support, and when possible, promote independence and community participation.

Disability support workers:

- Assist people with self-medication
- Implement care programs for those in residential establishments.
- Provide in-home support with health issues and daily living tasks such as washing, dressing, eating, transport and budgeting.
- Assist with the delivery of activities to enhance the physical, social, emotional and intellectual development of those in care.
- Ensure that those in their care are washed, dressed, fed and ready for educational and recreational activities.
- Assist those in their care during domestic activities such as eating meals and showering.
- Provide companionship and support during daily activities.
- Cook and serve meals, clean premises, wash, iron and perform other household tasks.
- Organise refuge accommodation.
- Work with a team of health professionals, family, friends and carers to implement a program of support.
- Can work evenings, weekends and public holidays and may also be required to live or stay on the premises.

To work in this field, it is important to be patient, flexible and understanding. You will need to be supportive, caring and have a commitment to the rights of people with disabilities to live dignified lives. It is also important to be able to accept responsibility, have good communication skills, be able to work as part of a team and capable of meeting the physical demands of the job.

To become a Disability Support Worker, you usually have to complete a Certificate IV in Disability which is the entry level qualification for working with people with disabilities. Further studies for disability work include the Diploma of Community Services work.

The Victorian Government have included a range of Certificates in Disability, Ageing Support, Individual Support or Community Services as part of their 2019 Free TAFE initiative. For further information on these courses available please visit: https://www.vic.gov.au/freetafe/free-tafe.html
