#### Notice of Election and Call for Nomination

#### 2019 School Council Election – Information for Parents

#### What is a school council and what does it do?

All government schools in Victoria have a school council. They are legally constituted bodies that are given powers to set the key directions of a school within statewide guidelines. In doing this, a school council is able to directly influence the quality of education that the school provides for its students.

#### Who is on the school council?

For most school councils, there are three possible categories of membership:

- A mandated elected Parent category more than one-third of the total members must be from this category.
   Department of Education and Training (DET) employees can be Parent members at their child's school as long as they are not engaged in work at the school.
- A mandated elected DET employee category members of this category may make up no more than one-third of the total membership of school council. The principal of the school is automatically one of these members.
- An optional Community member category members are co-opted by a decision of the council because of their special skills, interests or experiences. DET employees are not eligible to be Community members.
- A mandatory elected student current student member elected by the student body.

Generally, the term of office for all members is two years. The term of office of half the members expires each year, creating vacancies for the annual school council elections.

#### Why is Parent membership so important?

Parents on school councils provide important viewpoints and have valuable skills that can help shape the direction of the school.

Those parents who become active on a school council find their involvement satisfying in itself and may also find that their children feel a greater sense of belonging.

#### Do I need special experience to be on school council?

Each member brings their own valuable life skills and knowledge to the role, councilors may need to develop skills and acquire knowledge in areas that are unfamiliar to them. What you do need is an interest in your child's school and the desire to work in partnership with others to help shape the school's future.

#### How can you become involved?

The most obvious way is to vote in the elections, which are held in Term 1 each year. However, ballots are only held if more people nominate as candidates than there are positions vacant.

In view of this, you might seriously consider

- standing for election as a member of the school council
- encouraging another person to stand for election.

#### What do you need to do to stand for election?

The principal will issue a Notice of Election and Call for Nominations following the commencement of Term 1 each year. All school council elections must be completed by the end of March unless the usual time line has been varied by the Minister.

If you decide to stand for election, you can arrange for someone to nominate you as a candidate or you can nominate yourself in the Parent category.

DET employees whose child is enrolled in a school in which they are not engaged in work are eligible to nominate for parent membership of the school council at that school.

Once the nomination form is completed, return it to the principal within the time stated on the Notice of Election. You will receive a Nomination Form Receipt in the mail following the receipt of your completed nomination.

Generally, if there are more nominations received than there are vacancies on council, a ballot will be conducted during the two weeks after the call for nominations has closed.

#### How many positions are available in 2019?

If you are interested in standing for election this year there are current one (1) available position in the Parent category.

#### What are the crucial dates?

#### Closing date for nominations

All nominations need to be returned to the Front Office by 1pm on **Friday 5**th **April** Please note that nomination forms are attached to this Newsletter.

#### Remember

- Ask at the school for help if you would like to stand for election and are not sure what to do
- Consider standing for election to council this year
- Be sure to vote in the elections.

#### Students on school premises Before School & After School

#### Please see below an extract from Wyndham Central College's Supervision and Duty of Care Policy

Students will be supervised for a minimum of 10 minutes before and after school. This supervision will include the following:

- Monitoring of entry or exit points and/or designated pick up and drop off areas
- Supervision of the arrival and departure of school contract buses

At Wyndham Central College yard duty supervision at the beginning of the school day will commence at **8.30am**. This supervision will include **Buses Location 1 and Buses Location 2**.

Yard duty supervision at the end of the school day will be provided until **3.20pm for all students**. This supervision will include **Buses Location 1**, **Buses Location 2**, **Shaw's Road near the Gate Location 7 each until 3.30pm**. **DET – Detention Duty until 3.40pm**.

Other supervision may be required if students are needed for CAT/SAC resits until 4.15pm.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) drops off or otherwise arranges for a student to be on the school premises before supervision commences at the beginning of the day, the Principal or via the Assistant Principals or the Year Level Leading Teachers will, as soon as practicable, follow up with the parent, guardian and/or carer to:

- advise of the supervision arrangements before school, and
- request that the parent, guardian or carer make alternate arrangements.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) has failed to collect the student after school, the next steps may include some or all of the following:

- Attempting to contact the parents, guardians or carers
- Attempting to contact the emergency contacts
- Contacting the Victoria Police and/or the Department of Human Services (Child Protection) to arrange for the supervision, care and protection of the student.

#### **Attendance**

Please report all absences to the Attendance Officer, Maria Wilson by calling the College on 97414911 and selecting Option 1.

#### **School Nurse**

A reminder to ensure all <u>medical plans</u> for your children are up to date. Please feel free to contact Claudia the School Nurse on 97414911 to discuss any medical needs. If students are unwell at school they are required to attend First Aid and the school nurse will then contact the family if it is deemed necessary. If your child calls you directly please tell them to go to First Aid for medical attention.

#### **Crossing Supervisor**

In the interest of student safety and the efficiency of the school buses, the College has a Crossing Supervisor in the bus service road (Market Road Extension) near the College basketball courts. The supervisor will be responsible for controlling the traffic and supervising the crossing of students after school.

#### **School Gates**

The school gates are closed at 8.50 am to facilitate students arriving to class on time. Students must report to the administration area, after 8:50 am, to obtain a late pass. Consequences for lateness may apply. Your child should have a note to explain a known lateness.

#### Bike storage at school

It is important that all bikes are locked to the racks with a bike lock or padlock and chain. This message has been communicated to all students however we would appreciate it if you could remind your son/daughter of this requirement. A bike helmet is also a legal requirement. Please note: Skateboards and scooters are not allowed in the school grounds.

#### **Environmental duty**

To assist our school community in being aware of their environment all year levels are responsible for certain areas within the College and also take part in an environmental program to help reduce litter. Could you please encourage your child to be environmentally conscious within the community and use the rubbish bins provided.

#### **Emergency Management Plan**

The Wyndham Central College Emergency Management Plan is tested regularly to ensure the safety of all students, staff and school visitors in the event of an emergency situation. As part of this plan we conduct four emergency drills per year, two lock down drills and two fire drills and students are made aware of when a drill is about to commence.

This is vital information when planning curriculum as our teachers can identify the gaps in student learning. We know that NAPLAN is controversial and doesn't always get favorable publicity in the media, but we'd respectfully ask that you encourage your children to try their best. Along with VCE data it is the most valuable achievement data the College receives.

On behalf of the team I'd like to wish you all a relaxing Easter break with your children. Any feedback you have on school programs and policies is always welcome.



If a student is absent when sitting a CAT the student may re-sit a CAT if they present a medical certificate to a Year Level Leader. The students will then need to fill out a CAT re-sit from and, take it to their parents/guardians to sign. A student that receives an 'N' will also need to fill out a CAT re-sit form, and re-sit the CAT to gain a 'Satisfactory' grade on their end of Semester report.

A reminder to Parent's/Guardian's that Industry and Enterprise (I&E) is a VCE subject. To re-sit a VCE subject a student will follow the same process, but fill out the VCE Scored Assessment Coursework (SAC) re-sit from. CAT/SAC re-sits occur on Monday and Wednesday afterschool.

Students should now have been issued a new senior school laptop. The Laptop is a vital piece of equipment for students to complete their senior studies at Wyndham Central College.

Well done to all students that participated in the Elevate 'Study Sensei' session. It was great to see students engaged, listening actively, and answering questions. The skills learnt in this session will allow students in Year 10 to continue to develop their time management, and effective study skills.

#### **Elevate Program**

#### **YEAR 12 REPORT**

#### **Year 12 Tutor Day**

On Monday the 18th of March, Year 12 students were involved in a number of workshop presentations. The first session informed students on some of the vital information they need to be aware of as a VCE/VCAL student. Students were also shown examples of previous students study scores and how they equated to an ATAR score. It provided clarity for students and put into perspective how much work they need to put in to ensure this year is successful for them. In the second session, students took part in "Looking After Your mates" which is an interactive drink/drug driving information presentation about responsible driving and looking after each other. In the third session, we had 12 past students come back to the school and speak to students about their career pathways. The last session was a team building session that was facilitated by the Year 12 School Captains. Thanks to all involved in their work on making the day a great success.

#### **Special Provisions**

As a part of the assembly students were made aware that now is the time to apply for special provisions for the end of year exams. This is a detailed process and application forms can be collected from Mr Woollard, Assistant Principal – Years 10 - 12. As a part of the applications students will need to provide some support for their claims usually by a doctor or medical professional. As it can sometimes take time to organise these types of appointments we suggest you start this process now.

#### Successful Completion of Year 12

It is timely, with reports being issued, that we remind students and families about successful VCE/VCAL completion. Students need to satisfy the unit requirements of VCE/VCAL and this first set of reports will give us an indication on how students are progressing. Parents can book their interviews as of 4 pm Friday 22 March until 3:00 pm on Wednesday 3<sup>rd</sup> April . **Reports will be available to parents online via COMPASS on Monday 1st April**.

#### Parent workshops

Parent workshops will be offered during parent teacher interviews to support you and your child in understanding how to organise and maintain the AVID binder and how to complete the Cornell Note -taking process.

Workshops are also available for mathematics: 'how to help your child with fractions' and 'how to help your child with Problem Solving'. We encourage you to attend these workshops with your child and bring your child's binder along to the workshop. Please find attached session times and a reply slip at the back of the newsletter.

#### **NAPLAN ONLINE 2019**

Our school is conducting **NAPLAN Online** in 2019 from 14 – 24 May 2019. All Year 7 and 9 students are expected to participate in the NAPLAN Online tests which will be completed using their laptops.

Exemptions may be granted to students with significant intellectual disabilities and to students who have been learning English for less than one year. If your child is eligible for support due to disability or exemption, you should discuss this with his/her teacher **prior** to the tests. Signed parental consent is required **before** any support due to disability or exemption is granted.

Students may be withdrawn from NAPLAN by their parent or carer. This is a matter for consideration by parents and carers in consultation with the Principal. If, after consultation, you decide to withdraw your child, you must sign a Student Withdrawal Form before your child can be granted withdrawal. These forms are available at the school.

Students will be given the opportunity to practice the NAPLAN online test on Thursday 28<sup>th</sup> March when we will conduct the Coordinated Practice Test as part of the NAPLAN online requirement. This will be conducted similar to the NAPLAN online tests in May. Parents can help familiarise their child with the tests by using the ACARA website. http://www.nap.edu.au/online-assessment/public-demonstration-site

Additionally parents can support their child by encouraging their child to do their best on each of the tests and by ensuring that they have enough sleep and a healthy breakfast so that they can perform to the best of their ability and demonstrate their true skills and knowledge in NAPLAN. Having an accurate reflection of your child's skills and knowledge will support teachers in our work of knowing where your child is on the learning continuum and support teachers to plan educational plans to move them along this learning continuum successfully.

#### **Learning Disposition**

Students will require a complex combination of dispositions, skills, values and attitudes to be successful future oriented lifelong learners. Personal qualities like resilience and the ability to communicate and collaborate with others become important elements of our learners' identities.

The term 'learning dispositions', sometimes called 'habits of mind' or 'dispositions to learning', refer to the way in which learners engage in and relate to the learning process. Learning dispositions affect how students approach learning and therefore the outcomes of their learning.

Development of these dispositions is fundamental for students to develop an awareness of the way they learn and establish future-focused attitudes to learning, critical if they are to be able to become lifelong learners. Some commonly identified learning dispositions that are particularly relevant when thinking about future-focused practices, include: Persistence, Agility and Motivation, Motivation and learning drive, Metacognition – thinking about thinking and Problem Solving and questioning.

In this newsletter, I would like to focus on **Persistence.** Persistence means that students stick to a task until it is complete and don't give up easily. Persistent students are able to analyse a problem and develop a system, structure or strategy to attack it. They are comfortable in employing a wide range of strategies for problem solving a task. Persistence is a key attribute for students to develop as it encourages a positive attitude towards tasks and a resilience for examining different ways a problem can be solved, rather than giving up at the first sign of failure.

Parents can support their children to build persistence by:

Encourage your high-schooler to have new experiences. Getting out of their comfort zone will allow them the opportunity to struggle and build perseverance.

This could mean joining a new extracurricular activity, getting a job, or volunteering in the community. As your teen continues to broaden their experiences, they'll be more comfortable with taking on new challenges and may find they are more capable than they thought they were.

Take the time to point out moments in your teen's life when they struggled and persevered. One great example to share is simply when they were learning to walk. It takes all children time to learn to stand on their own two feet, and it's a good reminder for your teen when they are frustrated with the time it is taking them to accomplish a goal or learn a new skill. You can also add when they mastered something that was difficult, like learning to ride a bike, skateboard, or play guitar. Also share with the, times when you or other family members struggled and persevered.

Talk to your teen about goals that they haven't met. Goals should require effort and skill, but there's not always a guarantee that they'll be met. How your child responds to failure and frustration is critical. "Good failures" to describe failures that your child learns from, and that help them succeed in the future. The ability to get back in the game – to bounce back from mistakes or setbacks – is key to developing resilience and persistence. You can also demonstrate resilience in your reactions to your teen's setbacks. The STEM Academy program is now into its second year at the college and is making great strides in increasing the variety of STEM programs available for students in years 9 and 10.

The program comprises of two unique tutor groups (9S and 10S) and a variety of STEM electives offered at years 9 and 10 for all students.

#### What Is STEM?

This question is normally answered quickly by stating: Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math's. However, when the STEM teaching team at Wyndham Central College design projects for students we consider that all:

- projects should be based on a problem solving mentality using real life scenarios where possible
- students working on projects should engage in problem solving tasks as opposed to strictly remembering facts
- projects should encourage growth mindset learning strategies as students fail and then try again to complete parts of the project until they succeed
- projects should build resilience into the mindsets of the students as failure is considered ok i.e. a bump in the road on the highway of success
- as teachers we ask ourselves... "what are the students going to build?"
- we always ensure the projects use curriculum across the science, math's, digitech, and design & technology for years 9 and 10
- projects are normally term based.

During term one our STEM students have been participating in the following projects:

#### 9S: Food & Sustainability

Students are growing a real vegetable garden from seedlings at the college. They learn about best methods of garden design and planting, sustainability and vegetable growing using different kinds of plants and fertilisers.



#### Yr 9 Robotics

Students have completed an introductory course into building and coding Lego Mindstorms EV3 robots.

#### Yr 10 Design Thinking and 3D CAD Engineering

Students have completed an introductory course in using 3D CAD software which allows them to create their own 3D designs and print them with 3D printers to prototype different models.

#### 10S: Design Thinking @ Werribee Zoo

Students recently visited Werribee Zoo where they are investigating a current issue for an animal of their choice. They use "Design Thinking" processes to prototype and create a solution for the issue. The zoo will can choose to implement their solution in the actual zoo.



#### **Enrichment Expo**


Presentation of the Thomas Edison Project: Research Investigation of a Famous Influential





Finally, a big thank you to all the Enrichment Mentors who guided and met with students during the term.














## SCIENCE REPORT








### Being 'Future Ready'

With the next wave of the industrial revolution changing the future of Australia's workforce, we must plan now for the changes, challenges and opportunities in the landscape of our workforce.

Lisa Denny, a research fellow at the Institute for the Study of Social Change and University of Tasmania reports that automation and AI (Artificial Intelligence) will replace jobs with high levels of routine and repeatable and predictable processes which require precision. Clerical jobs in administration, reception or data entry clerk will be replaced if they haven't already. Whereas "non-routine jobs which need human problem solving, creativity, adaptability, flexibility, physical dexterity, and communication skills will be the jobs of the future" Lisa explains.

So it is important to be aware of how technology is changing our future and what the forecasted employment opportunities will be.

There are four sectors to show the most growth; health care and social assistance; construction; education and training; and professional, scientific and technical services.

The top five areas forecasted to show job growth are positions in; Aged and disabled care, registered nursing, child care, software and applications programming and Waiting.

The Foundation for Young Australians (FYA) have also undertaken research on the key factors that assist in the transition from education to full-time work. Apart from having an optimistic mindset and choosing a career pathway in a growing sector, it is crucial that you find the right course that helps you build transferrable skills such as problem solving, effective communication and team work. Many institutions incorporate units of study that are designed to prepare you for applying for jobs once you are qualified. Some institutions also work with affiliates who offer work placement to help students with building their industry work experience.

#### Career Focus – IT

### (Computer Programmer)

According to the Australian Government Department of Jobs and Small Business, Computer System and Design professionals are projected to have a 15.6% increase in job opportunities by May 2023. Information Technology Programmers write, test and maintain computer programs to ensure that the computer application meets the needs of the users of the computer system.

#### Programmers are responsible for:

- Assisting systems analysts and designers in researching and documenting computer users' requirements.
- Analysing objectives and problems specified by analysts and designers.
- Translating the solutions provided by systems designers into detailed program specifications.
- Preparing documentation for other programmers, users of the system and other support services workers.
- Undertaking program design activities including definition of data and error message arrangements.
- Supervising and reporting on the work of junior programmers.
- Modifying and documenting program code to correct errors or to enhance a program's capabilities.
- Testing the programs and making amendments.
- Preparing reports on the status, operation and maintenance of system software for use by computer equipment suppliers, system designers, other programmers and computer operators.

To consider programming as a pathway, it is helpful to have an ability to work independently as well as part of a team, be a good communicator, have an aptitude for technical activities and a logical approach to finding solutions to problems. But most importantly, having a general interest in technology and updating your knowledge as it changes is beneficial.



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To become qualified as a programmer, you usually have to complete a VET qualification. You can also become a programmer by studying information technology or computer science at university with a major in programming, software development or games development. To gain entry into these courses, you usually need to have completed your VCE or Senior Secondary Certificate of Education. Prerequisite subjects, or assumed knowledge, in one or more of English and Mathematics are normally required. As always advised, you will need make contact with your chosen institutions for more information on course prerequisites and requirements.

Once qualified, Programmers have the opportunity to work in small companies, large organisations or on a freelance basis. People working as Programmers typically advance into designer and analyst roles after some years of experience. In some smaller organisations, all three roles may be carried out by a single individual.

#### Can \$500 help with school expenses in 2020?

Back to school can be an expensive time for many families. The Smith Family and ANZ run a program called Saver Plus, a program that teaches people good savings and money management tools. Eligible families save \$50 / month over ten months and attend a short money management workshop in the local area — often at Werribee Plaza Library or Wyndham Vale Community Centre. At the end of the program, ANZ provides \$500 funding for school and extracurricular expenses. The program has been running for 16 years and has many fantastic outcomes, including helping and encouraging parents to talk to children about money from a young age — as early as preschool and primary school, right through the high school years. When parents role model good money behaviours and have open conversations about the household budget, this helps children be better equipped to manage their money as they grow, and can help establish good money habits for life.

To be eligible, you must have children at school or studying yourself, have regular income (either your or your partner) and have a current Health Care card or concession card. Our local coordinator is Tina McElligott 0439 585 702.




