IMPORTANT DATES

We have just completed our first month of term 2 and students are working towards completing all set tasks for the first semester. It was wonderful to see so many families attending our parent/teacher interviews at the end of term one where our staff were able to share the progress of students and set learning goals in order to support students to continue to grow.

The college continues to offer families ways to communicate with classroom and tutor teachers and Year level staff to ensure a successful school year for all students. This can be done via COMPASS email and by visiting or by calling the college.

As we know when parents/carers are actively involved in conversations with their sons/daughters about their education the outcomes are far more positive. When this is combined in a three way partnership with teachers the outcomes and opportunities are far better. It is always pleasing when these opportunities are offered and students are encouraged to take them up and achieve their very best. There are many examples in this newsletter where our students have excelled in many different areas so I encourage you to read the reports and celebrate their learning successes.

Our Year 7 and 9 cohorts are currently completing the NAPLAN tests using the online format and it is important that students try their best to show how they have grown in their knowledge and skills in reading writing and numeracy over the previous two years. Students from years 7 through to 12 are also currently completing the Attitudes to Schools opinion survey in an online format. The college values the input of all students and will once again be analyzing the survey results to ensure that we continue to improve our programs and whole school learning environment. We have always valued student feedback and we encourage our students to continue to provide feedback throughout the school year via the Student Representative Council and this term via a new initiative called PIVOT surveys. Students on school premises Before School & After School

Please see below an extract from Wyndham Central College's Supervision and Duty of Care Policy

Students will be supervised for a minimum of 10 minutes before and after school. This supervision will include the following:

- Monitoring of entry or exit points and/or designated pick up and drop off areas
- Supervision of the arrival and departure of school contract buses

At Wyndham Central College yard duty supervision at the beginning of the school day will commence at **8.30am**. This supervision will include **Buses Location 1 and Buses Location 2**.

Yard duty supervision at the end of the school day will be provided until **3.20pm for all students**. This supervision will include **Buses Location 1, Buses Location 2, Shaw's Road near the Gate Location 7 each until 3.30pm**.

DET – Detention Duty until 3.40pm.

Other supervision may be required if students are needed for CAT/SAC resits until 4.15pm.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) drops off or otherwise arranges for a student to be on the school premises before supervision commences at the beginning of the day, the Principal or via the Assistant Principals or the Year Level Leading Teachers will, as soon as practicable, follow up with the parent, guardian and/or carer to:

- advise of the supervision arrangements before school, and
- request that the parent, guardian or carer make alternate arrangements.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) has failed to collect the student after school, the next steps may include some or all of the following:

- Attempting to contact the parents, guardians or carers
- Attempting to contact the emergency contacts
- Contacting the Victoria Police and/or the Department of Human Services (Child Protection) to arrange for the supervision, care and protection of the student.

Attendance

Please report all absences to the Attendance Officer, Carol Mills by calling the College on 97414911 and selecting Option 1.

School Nurse

A reminder to ensure all **medical plans** for your children are up to date. Please feel free to contact Claudia the School Nurse on 97414911 to discuss any medical needs. If students are unwell at school they are required to attend First Aid and the school nurse will then contact the family if it is deemed necessary. If your child calls you directly please tell them to go to First Aid for medical attention.

Crossing Supervisor

In the interest of student safety and the efficiency of the school buses, the College has a Crossing Supervisor in the bus service road (Market Road Extension) near the College basketball courts. The supervisor will be responsible for controlling the traffic and supervising the crossing of students after school.

School Gates

The school gates are closed at 8.50 am to facilitate students arriving to class on time. Students must report to the administration area, after 8:50 am, to obtain a late pass. Consequences for lateness may apply. Your child should have a note to explain a known lateness.

Bike storage at school

It is important that all bikes are locked to the racks with a bike lock or padlock and chain. This message has been communicated to all students however we would appreciate it if you could remind your son/daughter of this requirement. A bike helmet is also a legal requirement. Please note: Skateboards and scooters are not allowed in the school grounds.

Environmental duty

To assist our school community in being aware of their environment all year levels are responsible for certain areas within the College and also take part in an environmental program to help reduce litter. Could you please encourage your child to be environmentally conscious within the community and use the rubbish bins provided.

Emergency Management Plan

The Wyndham Central College Emergency Management Plan is tested regularly to ensure the safety of all students, staff and school visitors in the event of an emergency situation. As part of this plan we conduct four emergency drills per year, two lock down drills and two fire drills and students are made aware of when a drill is about to commence.



Welcome to the second school term as we enter the phase of NAPLAN and Attitudes to School Survey assessment periods. All students in years 7 and 9 are in the midst of completing NAPLAN. This year for the first time these are being completed online, and despite some initial external technical issues, staff are noticing that students are more engaged than they have been previously. This is probably not surprising given this generation's tech-abilities, and we believe it's been a positive move by the Curriculum and Assessment Reporting Authority.

The other benefit of NAPLAN online is that the tests are adaptive. This means the degree of difficulty of the questions being asked will vary depending on the skills of the student.

Therefore students who may have some challenges in their learning will be given supported questions, while those with high proficiency will be challenged in the questions they are given. All in all it should make for a more positive experience for your children, and we look forward to discussing their results with them and parents/carers when they are available later in the year.

The Attitudes to School survey is also online, and is for all students to complete. It is simply a range of questions designed to get some data around how children are finding their schooling experience. The survey covers students' perceptions of teachers, how they feel about the school, what their opinions are around their own learning and personal resilience. Again this is valuable data when we plan whole school programs as we can identify areas students would benefit from us further developing.

The year 7s, 8s and 9s had a great time last week at the cross country. I personally walked each year level down to Presidents' Park, and walked the course with them. Their participation was outstanding, and even though it could have been a bit warmer it was an enjoyable day for all and well done to the team led by Miss Emily Bellin for all their work over the day. We look forward to the next level of western zone competitions.

In other messages of appreciation we wish Mrs Laura Newton all the best as she takes some family leave in anticipation of a new addition to her family. We'd also like to welcome Mr. Scott Lynch as the new Year 8 Level Leader.

The remainder of the term will be busy term for all as all students begin preparing for the June exam period. Timetables will be mailed home shortly and we encourage you to help your children be organised to achieve their best! All the best to all and I hope you manage to avoid the seasonal-illnesses.

Finally, I would like to thank our Year 9 tutor teachers for their ongoing support and communication with their tutor groups.



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**YEAR'S 10, 11 & 12
REPORT**

Years 10, 11 and 12 examination dates are listed below and I encourage all students to commence a revision and study plan for their exams. Tutor Teachers can assist with the preparation of a plan.

Year 11 and 12 students will only be required to attend school to sit their timetabled exam and are to remain at home for exam study at all other times. A notice will need to be signed by parents to allow for this.

Any student who is absent during an exam must produce a medical certificate on their return to school to be able to re-sit the exam for a grade.

Please note that VCAL classes, VET classes and Work-placement will continue as normal during the exam period.

Important dates:

- Year 10 examinations will be held from Monday 3rd June – Thursday 6th June
- Year 11 examinations will be held from Thursday 30th May - Thursday 6th June.
- Year 12 examinations will be held on Thursday 6th June, Tuesday 11th June, Thursday 13th June and Friday 14th June
- The GAT Exam is on Wednesday 12th June from 10:00am - 1:15pm in the College gymnasium (compulsory for all students studying a Year 12 subject, including Year 11 students).

Year 11 and 12 subject progress checks are now available on Compass under the reports section.

These checks are for any student studying a Year 11/12 subject who have incomplete class work and are at risk of not obtaining a satisfactory pass for a particular subject.

If your child does have a progress check then please discuss this with your son/daughter and ensure that the necessary work is completed and submitted for assessment to the appropriate teacher.

Please encourage your child to set aside some time each day to complete their homework and study.

Below are some study tips that may assist students:

- Use a school diary for planning
- Create 'to do' lists - don't leave things to the last minute
- Draw up a home work timetable using a calendar to plan activities listing study requirements, SAC's, exams and deadlines for assignments
- List exam dates and other commitments

- List due dates for work submissions and work backwards to set mini deadlines for each stage
- Prioritise each task to help achieve goals, to avoid being overwhelmed by what has to be done and then rushing at the end
- Maintain a balance between study and recreational activities
- Use a clear flat space for regular homework and study – not a bed or a couch
- Organise your equipment
- Keep your school work in an easily accessible spot – the AVID binder is perfect for this.
- If possible, choose a space away from distractions, such as television, mobile phones etc.

NAPLAN ONLINE 2019

All Year 7 and 9 students are currently participating in the NAPLAN Online tests. We wish them all the best as they navigate their way through the Writing, Reading, Language Convention and Numeracy tests from 14th May – 24th May.

The NAPLAN tests provide valuable additional information about students' strengths and areas for improvement; this is important information in assisting teachers to develop teaching and learning plans and programs to maximise your child's learning.

EXAMS

The College examination period will be held as follows:

Year 11 Exams: 30th May – 6th June

Year 7-10 Exams: 3rd June - 6th June

Year 12 Exams: 6th June – 14th June

All students are busily working on completing Semester 1 units. They will also work on revising the Semester 1 work in the weeks leading into exams. It is important for student success that students develop good work and study habits. All students are expected to develop a homework and home study plan so that they revise on a regular basis and review knowledge and skills learned. The study timetable should be reviewed in the weeks leading to exams to ensure that it provides your child with the opportunity to be well prepared for the exams ahead. This will allow your child to experience success and build confidence.

Last year we trailed an exams revision session in the session preceding each exam. For example if students have a math exam session 2, they would have a math revision session 1. The feedback about this exam format was positive from both students and staff and we will once again provide this exam format to further prepare students to experience success.

Learning Disposition

In our last newsletter, I introduced parents to the importance of nurturing a positive learning disposition as its role in student learning success. Students will require a complex combination of dispositions, skills, values and attitudes to be successful future oriented lifelong learners. Personal qualities like resilience and the ability to communicate and collaborate with others become important elements of our learners' identities.

Development of these dispositions is fundamental for students to develop an awareness of the way they learn and establish future-focused attitudes to learning, critical if they are to be able to become lifelong learners.

Agility and Flexibility

Flexible students have the capacity to change their minds as they receive additional information. They often consider alternative points of view or deal with several sources of information simultaneously. Their minds are often open to change based on additional information, new data or even reasoning that contradicts their beliefs. Flexible thinkers display confidence in their intuition and tolerate a reasonable degree of confusion and ambiguity. They are often willing to shift their thinking to ensure their approach to problem-solving is creative and productive.

Parents can support their children to build Agility and Flexibility by:

In today's globalized world, flexible and creative thinking are extremely valuable. These are the "soft skills" you hear about—skills that employers are finding increasingly important.

In today's world students need to understand how to evaluate changing information, respond creatively when problems arise, and be prepared for the jobs and opportunities of the future. You can help your child build their brain's control systems to resist jumping to an impulsive first response, and in turn, thrive in an ever-changing world.

Cognitive flexibility helps kids remain open and receptive to new experiences, multiple sources of information, a variety of interpretations, varied approaches to problems, and alternative points of view. Here are some suggestions to help build your child's cognitive flexibility:

1. Evaluate characters in books. While reading books, take the opportunity to think about the story beyond one perspective. You and your kid can reflect on reasons why an "evil" character in a story might not be fully to blame or deserves sympathy. They can also provide alternative endings to stories. This helps kids resist their first response to the story or character as the only correct interpretation. And it helps to develop empathy and understanding of characters that aren't so black and white.
2. Imagine different possibilities. Encourage your child to give you several different interpretations of art, music, or even the shape of a cloud. Cartoons can provide opportunities for children to build cognitive flexibility, too. Ask, "Why do you think this cartoonist selected cows to be the talking animals with all the other animals silent?" Take kids to museums and explore different meanings behind the paintings and sculptures.
3. Ask questions. When your children ask you questions, that is a great opportunity to flip the question back to them. After they share an idea, acknowledge it positively, and then say, "What else?" That phrase, "What else?" can be the most powerful builder of flexible thinking. If they are bothered by an assignment, rules in sports, or other things they consider to be "unfair," talk to them about why they feel that way.

4. Explore different problem-solving methods. Cognitive flexibility in math and science includes being open to multiple interpretations, even when asked to respond with only one. Remind your kid that there might be two ways to solve the problem, draw the graph, or form a hypothesis.
5. Go one step further. While discussing the daily news or what they're learning in history class, provide opportunities for children to go beyond the first "interpretation" that comes to mind. Instead of stopping at one opinion or thought, push them to keep thinking. They might share alternatives to fighting to resolve historical disputes, or express opinions about explorers meeting the indigenous inhabitants on their journeys.

Consider the impact your efforts will have on your kid's tolerance, ethics, and citizenship far beyond their childhood. The leaders and innovators of the future will be those who are comfortable with new experiences and unfamiliar customs, open to variations of opinions and interpretations, willing to take on alternative points of view and multiple approaches to problem solving, and excited by creative innovation.

**STEM ACADEMY
REPORT**

In this newsletter I would like to take the opportunity to update you all on one of the projects 10S is working on during the course of term 2 alongside with students from the Yr 9 Advance program.

Werribee River Detectives Project: 10S and 9 Advance

The Werribee River detective's project first ran at the college in 2018. The program was started by Mr. Allan Bernardi (Advance Coordinator) with the Catchment Management Authorities of Victoria to allow students and teachers in the state to test the quality of natural water bodies in different locations throughout the state. Being in the Wyndham region the focus for 10S alongside students from the Advance program at WCC was to test and monitor the quality of the Werribee River in different catchment locations like Bacchus Marsh, Cobbleticks Ford and Werribee Mansion.

Water sample data collected by the students from their testing was then uploaded to a specific web site portal for collection, analysis and use by the relevant authorities of the state of Victoria.

To prepare students involved in the water sampling, STEM professionals John Forrester and Dr. Teresa Mackintosh (Werribee River Keepers) from the Werribee River Association came to the college to talk and present to students. The visits focused students on the skills required to test water successfully and waterway health, environmental sustainability and the contributions we can all make to improve the health of the Werribee River.

Below is a summary from one of our STEM students explaining Dr Mackintosh's visit.

Dr. Mackintosh came into 10S on Wednesday the 27/3/19. She spoke about the water ways in Werribee and herself. She talked about how different insects in the waterways may be affected by the waters condition.



Before the start of lesson she gave us a mini graph quiz analysis that we would need to complete. After the lesson was over, Teresa talked about the types of water sampling and testing such as electrical conductivity, PH, Turbidity and nitrogen and phosphorus testing. She described how agricultural areas and urbanized areas have unhealthy waterways because of the fertilizer's and litter that go in the waterways, places include Wyndham vale and Toolem. Places that have more trees and hydration have healthier waterways.

Teresa had come from the UK and had studied at Monash University for over 15 years, listening to her professional experience, we learned that macro-invertebrates and micro-invertebrates are insects that inhabit the Werribee waterways. She found that these insects would hide in aquatic plants to hide from predators, different insects would include mayflies, and water-boat beetles that would inhabit the area. Teresa also discussed a huge range of different scientific aspects, and her professions are highly appreciated by our 10S classroom.

It is my pleasure to thankyou Dr. Teresa Mackintosh for coming into our class and presenting your project to us, we look forward to water sampling with you soon and in the further future.

Wynspeak 2019





Bachelor of Engineering (Honours)

In this new degree, students spend their first year of study experiencing the breadth of engineering options available at RMIT University before entering their specialised program in second year with a strong technical foundation.

Career Focus – Social Worker

Social workers help people to deal with personal and social problems, either directly or by planning or carrying out programmes that benefit groups or communities. They are interested in challenging the structural barriers that contribute to inequality, discrimination, exploitation and oppression within communities.

Social workers can specialise in a range of different practice areas such as; children and family, youth, violence and sexual assault, medical and health, child protection, income support, disability, education, aged care, correctional services, family law, youth justice, community legal, psychiatric and general mental health, refugees and migrants and indigenous communities. They are employed in a variety of community and welfare fields across state, territory and federal government departments; hospitals, community health centres, local government authorities or non-government organisations. Some social workers are self-employed, working as counsellors, therapists and consultants. With the broad academic and practical training, qualified social workers may also work in non-social work areas such as project officers, policy makers, managers or administrators.

Within the different areas that social workers can work, their responsibilities can include:

- Provide counselling and support through a crisis that may be due to death, illness, relationship breakdown or other reasons.
- Provide clients with information about services that can assist them.
- Provide letters of referral or reports that will help clients to obtain other services such as crisis accommodation or social security benefits.
- Guide small groups of people to share their experiences, support each other and learn social skills.
- Assist community groups to plan and carry out programs to help themselves (for example, assisting groups to form an association).
- Research community problems, needs and solutions through client contact and records of welfare and health agencies.
- Analyse statistics and write reports.
- Develop policy and evaluate programs.
- Manage and train staff.
- Attend professional meetings.
- Lobby to change social welfare policies and procedures in the pursuit of social justice for all members of the community.

To work in this field, it is important to have:



- Emotional maturity.
- Keen analytical abilities.
- Ability to view other people's problems objectively.
- Good organisational and communication skills.
- An ability to work independently or as part of a team.
- A commitment to social justice.


