Pathways Week

Our pathways team led by Mrs Kathy Karlovic have been working with our years 9-12 students in the first couple of weeks providing students with the opportunities to attend Pathway expo's with 44 different providers presenting at Wyndham Central College, holding a Tertiary event and VTAC information night for our year 12 students, a VCE/VCAL/VIP taster program for our year 10 students and our subject expo for all years 9 -11 students. The school would like to take this opportunity to thank parents who attended during this week and supported the students, your children, in selecting their pathway choices for 2020. All student passports should have been submitted and are now overdue. The college will be working hard over the next few weeks in developing a well-rounded 2020 timetable and teaching program that caters for all students.

Confirmation of entry into our specific AVID elective, STEM, Spanish Immersion, Enrichment, VCAL and VCE Industry programs will be available to families by the end of term and all subject selection confirmations will be sent home in the first two weeks of term 4.

Student reports and student results

A printed copy of the Semester one report was distributed to families on day one of this term. If parents/carers did not receive their copy I would like to remind you that all reports are available on COMPASS via your parent login. Students have all set learning goals based on their own learning journey. Families are encouraged to support students to achieve these goals by talking about learning and asking for help. The college has enhanced our programs with the extension of homework club, year 12 tutoring service and an earlier Parent/Teacher interview opportunity and a new Middle Years Literacy and Numeracy program (MYLENS). Students identified will be receiving further information shortly.

Staff are already preparing five weekly checks for our senior classes and interim reporting 7-12. This will also be the last report for our year 12 cohort. Please note that a key part of the success of your son's/daughter's education is the way you interact with the school. We hope that once again we will see all of our families at the parent-teacher interviews on either Thursday 19th or Friday 20th September, but we also are available to all parents/guardians/carers to discuss and work with you in partnership to improve outcomes for all of our students. Your sons/daughters teachers and tutor teachers are available to you via email or telephone in the first instance.

NAPLAN results

Parents of year 7 and 9 students will also be receiving information regarding the results from the NAPLAN testing over the next month. Please make contact with the school if you have any questions, concerns or if you don't receive the package. As a reminder the college completed the test online in 2019 and we are excited to see improved outcomes in Reading, Writing, Vocabulary and Numeracy outcomes as our students grow in their abilities between years 5-7 and years 7-9.

Student Voice – Attitudes to School Survey results.

Over the last week our staff have been working through the results from our Attitudes to School Survey. It has provided some very positive data around students having a real understanding that high expectations improve results and the importance of coming to school every day. We look forward to continuing to work with student focus groups on improvement strategies and developing their leadership and student voice. Our new and improved Student Representative Council (SRC) will be sharing the data and forming improvement actions with their respective year level cohorts via year level assemblies and as focus groups during our pastoral program. We thank our students for completing the survey and then working on actions that continue to build the pride in our school community. We are very proud of their leadership.

Parent Surveys

As I have mentioned a few times it is extremely important that schools and parents work together to create the best learning environment for students. Our annual parent surveys have been distributed to over 300 families and I once again encourage all families that have received the letter to please complete the online survey. If you haven't been provided with a survey request but would like to meet with me to provide feedback or suggestions for improvement please do not hesitate to call the school and arrange an appointment.

Students on school premises Before School & After School

Please see below an extract from Wyndham Central College's Supervision and Duty of Care Policy

Students will be supervised for a minimum of 10 minutes before and after school. This supervision will include the following:

- Monitoring of entry or exit points and/or designated pick up and drop off areas
- Supervision of the arrival and departure of school contract buses

At Wyndham Central College yard duty supervision at the beginning of the school day will commence at **8.30am**. This supervision will include **Buses Location 1** and **Buses Location 2**.

Yard duty supervision at the end of the school day will be provided until 3.30pm for all students. This supervision will include Buses Location 1, Buses Location 2, Shaw's Road near the Gate Location 7 each until 3.30pm.

DET – Detention Duty until 3.40pm.

Supervision is provided if students are needed for CAT/SAC resits until 4.15pm.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) drops off or otherwise arranges for a student to be on the school premises before supervision commences at the beginning of the day, the Principal or via the Assistant Principals or the Year Level Leading Teachers will, as soon as practicable, follow up with the parent, guardian and/or carer to:

- advise of the supervision arrangements before school, and
- request that the parent, guardian or carer make alternate arrangements.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) has failed to collect the student after school, the next steps may include some or all of the following:

- Attempting to contact the parents, guardians or carers
- Attempting to contact the emergency contacts
- Contacting the Victoria Police and/or the Department of Human Services (Child Protection) to arrange for the supervision, care and protection of the student.

Attendance / Non Attendance Process

Please report all known absences to the Attendance Officer, Ms. Carol Mills by calling the College on 97414911 and selecting Option 1. If your child has been absent please send a note with your child within three working days to explain his/her absence. For further information please see the Attendance Policy on COMPASS or the Department of Education parent website.

School Nurse

A reminder to ensure all <u>medical plans</u> for your children are up to date. Please feel free to contact Ms.Claudia Jara, the School Nurse on 97414911 to discuss any medical needs. If students are unwell at school they are required to attend First Aid and the school nurse will then contact the family if it is deemed necessary. If your child calls you directly please tell them to go to First Aid for medical attention.

Crossing Supervisor

In the interest of student safety and the efficiency of the school buses, the College has a Crossing Supervisor in the bus service road (Market Road Extension) near the College basketball courts. The supervisor will be responsible for controlling the traffic and supervising the crossing of students after school.

Wyndham City Council – Shaw's Road Crossing Supervisor Please Note:

The Wyndham City Council expressed concern that students are <u>not</u> using the crossing and are weaving around cars trying to cross Shaws Road (stressing drivers who are having to break suddenly to avoid hitting the students or having an accident with another vehicle). Your support with reiterating to your child the importance of using the school crossing correctly is much appreciated.

School Gates

The school gates are closed at 8.50 am to facilitate students arriving to class on time. Students must report to the administration area, after 8:50 am, to obtain a late pass. Consequences for lateness may apply. Your child should have a note to explain a known lateness. Thank you to adhering to school policy.

Bike storage at school

It is important that all bikes are locked onto the racks with a bike lock or padlock and chain. This message has been communicated to all students however we would appreciate it if you could remind your son/daughter of this requirement. A bike helmet is also a legal requirement. Please note: Skateboards and scooters are not allowed in the school grounds.

Environmental duty

To assist our school community in being aware of their environment all year levels are responsible for certain picking up rubbish in areas within the College and also take part in an environmental program to help reduce litter. Could you please encourage your child to be environmentally conscious within the community and use the rubbish bins provided. As a further support please be aware of the amount of packaging being brought to school when preparing student's lunches.

Emergency Management Plan

The Wyndham Central College Emergency Management Plan is tested regularly to ensure the safety of all students, staff and school visitors in the event of an emergency situation. As part of this plan we conduct four emergency drills per year, two lock down drills and two fire drills and students are made aware of when a drill is about to commence.

A lock down drill will be completed this week.

YEAR'S 7, 8 & 9 REPORT

In the first three weeks, we've been full-steam ahead since our return from the school holiday break. Over this time our students have been finalising their career action plans, and our year 9s have completed work and their passports, choosing subjects for next year. They have attended a subject expo and had the opportunity to speak to teachers about programs available to them in the senior school. I know many of our year 9s will be working at an accelerated pace next year and will embark upon a VCE subject. Congratulations to the students that have made it through our rigorous process.

Our building spaces have had a revamp over the break and we now have enclosed spaces in our Federation, Latrobe and Deakin which have greatly enhanced these buildings. This has created additional room to run programs, and decreased student congestion in particular areas which has had a positive impact on the climate of these teaching spaces.

The highlight of this term for me so far has been the Year 8 camp (see Year 8 report). I was fortunate enough to spend the day with the students and staff camping out at 'Forest Edge' in East Gippsland. It's so great to see kids out of their classroom school environment, making new friends and participating in activities that push them out of their comfort zone. It was a cold day but the rain held off and the students got to participate in a wide range of outdoor programs. Thank you so much to Mr. Lynch and his team for running this event I'm sure a lot of happy memories were created. My favorite activity always is the damper making, yum!

Finally the annual Parent Opinion survey was recently sent out to a number of families whose names were generated from a random sample from our data base. If you received one of these we'd really appreciate it if you would take the time to give



us your feedback. All surveys are anonymous, and the information we receive back goes into our whole school planning. In Term 3, Year 10 will also be completing:

- Financial Literacy training. Financial Literacy training will be starting over the next few weeks. Students will participate in daily training sessions over a week and this is facilitated by the Smith Family. On completion of the training, students will receive a Certificate I in Financial Services. All students should have already returned their permission form with their Unique Student Identifier (USI). If you need assistance with this please contact your child's tutor teacher.
- **TAC Road Towards Zero Excursion.** As part of our upcoming Road Safety unit, students will be traveling via bus to the Melbourne Museum to take part in the interactive TAC Towards Zero workshop. A friendly reminder that this excursion is a Department of Education compulsory event, and that your child will need a completed permission form to attend.

It is a school requirement for all students to be in full school uniform each and every day. Every day at school is important and it's 'not ok to be away'. If your child is absent for any reason, please call the school or log it on COMPASS with the reason for absence, please note that a note must be returned to school within 3 days.

As we prepare for 2020, <u>subject selection passports are now overdue</u>. If you could not attend the Subject Selection Counselling day on Thursday 25th July, and have not signed your child's subject passport, can you please contact your child's Tutor Teacher as soon as possible. Failure to submit a signed passport may result in your child missing out on their top subject preferences.

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YEAR 11 REPORT

Last week Year 11 students took part in the pathwys expo and had their final subject selection counselling interviews on Thursday 25th July. Students attended information sessions with different TAFE's and university providers and were able to collect information and ask questions, related to different courses and careers. They also attended a presentation delivered by the Defence Forces, in which they were given many different options, in a broad range of areas. All of these activities have led to students making informed choices and supporting them in their post secondary pathway planning into university, TAFE and employment.

Career Action Plans plans have now been finalised for the term. These should have been submitted to tutor teachers and will form part of the next reports. All course selection documentation for next year is now **overdue**. Please ensure this is all completed and handed into tutor teachers as soon as possible. Failure to do so may result in your child missing out on their subject choices.

It is important to remind students and guardians that there are <u>clear guidelines in regards to VCE promotion</u>. In order for students to progress from Year 11 to Year 12, they must satisfactorily complete at least nine units in Year 11, including the two units of English. 100% attendance is expected unless a medical certificate is provided. If you have any questions or concerns about your student's progression you can contact their tutor teacher or myself.

A reminder that this Term we are focusing on students being at school on time and in the correct uniform. Please make sure your son/daughter leaves home in the correct winter uniform so they can arrive at schoolon time and ready to learn.

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We are well into Semester 2 and into another rewarding term ahead. Students have settled into their learning for Term 3.

Report Reflections and Goal setting

Students began the term by reviewing their Semester 1 Reports, self- assessing areas of strengths and weaknesses and setting goals to ensure they maximise their success this term. Students need to revisit these goals regularly and ensure that they are on track to achieve them. Parents can support this by having conversations about their child's goals this term and encouraging the benefits of perseverance with tasks they may find challenging.

Ongoing Revision and Cornell notes (Homework Policy)

As an AVID school, teachers support students to continue to build their ability to effectively complete all steps of the Cornell note-taking system. We ask parents/carers to support and encourage your child at home with completing the Cornell note steps using the 10-24-7 method. That is, reviewing and revising the day's notes every night, formulating questions the next night and creating summaries at the end of the week. This is a well know and well-researched method of supporting students to achieve success. It increases students' confidence and improves exam results. Organisation is also important for success and students are required to ensure that they have a well- organised binder that they bring to all classes. This ensures that they have all equipment and work is kept together.

Homework Club

A reminder that Wyndham Central College offers Homework Club every Monday and Wednesday in the AVID Centre from 3:20 pm to 4:20 pm. Homework Club is facilitated by experienced classroom teachers and provides support to students who self-nominate to attend. Teachers support students who may be having difficulty with their classwork, assignments, homework or who like a place and space in which to work that is supported by teacher assistance if required. Please encourage your child/children to attend Homework Club and use this valuable resource.

Course selection 2020

Course selection is well underway and students in conjunction with their families and teachers are selecting subjects and programs for Years 10, 11 and 12, in 2020. Parents, please contact either your child's tutor teacher, Compass Manager Mr. Navin Pratap, or our Pathways Leader Ms. Kathy Karlovic or Pathways Assistant Ms. Pina Siragusano if you have any concerns around course selection. Year 8 students will be undertaking the Year 8 into Year 9 course selection 2020 process later this term.

International Program and Cultural Exchange

This year we have been joined by three students from Gredos San Diego in Madrid. They joined the Wyndham Central College community on 5th July and were with us until 31st July. This cultural exchange is part of our school program promoting and building strong international relations and supporting the development of language and cultural understandings. The students attend school and experienced life as an Australian student in an Australian family. It has again been a wonderful opportunity for all and we thank our host families who make this cultural exchange possible: the Fraser – Smith family, the Martin family, and the Anderson family.

The international cultural exchange continued as we welcomed 18 eighteen Japanese students along with four staff visiting from Mito High School. We hope that this will be an enriching cultural and language experience for our visitors and all members of the Wyndham Central College community.

Learning Disposition

In our newsletters, we have been looking at the importance of nurturing a positive learning disposition and its role in student learning success. Students will require a complex combination of dispositions, skills, values, and attitudes to be successful future-oriented lifelong learners. Personal qualities like resilience and the ability to communicate and collaborate with others become important elements of our learners' identities. So far, in this series, we have looked at the following learning dispositions:

- Persistence
- Agility and Flexibility
- Motivation and Drive to Learn

Development of these dispositions is fundamental for students to develop an awareness of the way they learn and establish future-focused attitudes to learning, critical if they are to be able to become lifelong learners. In this newsletter, we will focus on **Metacognition- thinking about thinking.**

Metacognition is the process of examining our thoughts as we engage in them. It is commonly referred to as "thinking about thinking". In the classroom, it is characterised by students' ability to plan a strategy for producing the information that is needed, the awareness of their own learning process and their ability to reflect on and evaluate the productiveness of their own thinking. Students need to be able to question themselves about their own learning strategies and evaluate the efficiency of their own performance in order to be successful lifelong

Metacognition is a big word for something most of us do every day without even noticing. Reflecting on our own thoughts is how we gain insight into our feelings, needs, and behaviours — and how we learn, manage and adapt to new experiences, challenges, and emotional setbacks. It is the running conversation we have in our heads, mentally sounding ourselves out and making plans. More and more studies are suggesting that kids who are taught to use metacognitive strategies early on are more resilient and more successful, both in and out of school.

Children who are taught to think of themselves as being "good" or "bad" at a particular task can have a fixed mindset that makes them passive in approaching a challenge: either they can do it or they can't, but they aren't likely to think they can change that outcome.

Teaching children to become more metacognitive helps them move from a fixed mindset that leaves little room for change to a growth mindset, which promotes self-awareness and resilience.

Helping your child learn to work through difficult situations (or homework assignments, as the case may be) without becoming overwhelmed or giving up supports the development of metacognition.

For example:

- A child who struggles to stay on task is likely to feel frustrated and anxious when they are assigned a long essay. If they are unable to reflect on why the project upsets them, they might think, "Everyone else is having an easy time. I'm just bad at writing."
- A child who has learned to reflect on their own learning process, on the other hand, could look at the situation and say, "I always feel like this when I have to work for a long time. Maybe if I take breaks every hour or so I'll feel less stressed out." By taking a metacognitive approach, the child is able to manage their frustration and find a better way to approach big assignments in the future.

Metacognitive skills are not only excellent tools for children as they enable children to self-regulate when faced with challenges, especially unexpected ones.

Robotics & Coding at years 9 and 10 and Games Design at year 10, are being experienced and enjoyed by students at the college this Semester.

It's also a very exciting opportunity for year 8 students at the college as STEM Academy 2020 – Expressions of Interest application process will soon be underway.

On August 7, during their regular year 8 assembly, I will be making a presentation to students about the STEM Academy program available to them in 2020/2021. This presentation explains to students the merits of STEM Education, and how it can help them gain some of the most important 21st Century skills required by young people going forward into their futures and working lives. These 21st century skills are discussed regularly by employers, teachers and government departments throughout Australia and the world.

These skills include, but are not limited to, such things as:

- Digital Technologies Literacy
- Collaboration (working with groups of people)
- Problem Solving
- Critical Thinking
- Creativity

This presentation is the first step in the expression of interest process for interested students wanting to join the STEM Academy program in 2020.

At Wyndham Central College, we provide a unique and unmatched STEM education experience where we create a tutor group at year 9.

The group of successful, like-minded students enrol in the year-long STEM ACADEMY ELECTIVE where they work on STEM projects. These projects form a basis for learning and developing the above mentioned 21st century skills. Whilst we have our STEM elective, this unique elective and is only available to students in 9S.

Students who complete projects in the STEM Academy have access to:

- Hands-on, project-based curriculum that involves problem-solving, design-thinking and prototyping across the Science, Maths, Digital Technologies, Design & Technology & Arts curriculum
- Learning spaces that are flexible and support collaboration
- Cutting-edge technological equipment and specialist programs that may include:
- Robotics and coding
- Electronics and engineering
- 3D modelling and printing
- Designing solutions, ideas and products

All year 8 students are encouraged to apply as the only requirements are:

- · A commitment and desire to work hard and succeed
- A passion for Science, Technology, Engineering / Design and Maths
- The belief that you can develop skills (e.g. leadership, problem solving, design thinking etc.)
- The desire to design, make, construct, create and/or develop new projects
- Desire to use technology to problem-solve and gain 21st century skills
- Desire to participate in social action projects in the local and wider community

The program run then runs for two years. Successful applicants are expected to continue into 10S for 2021.

Admission into the STEM Academy – the process

Students interested in participating in the expression of interest process for the program will:

- 1) Complete an application form that must be signed by a parent / guardian.
- 2) Applicants may be invited to attend an interview with their parent/guardian to discuss their suitability for the program.
- 3) Applicants will be invited to answer a short growth mindset survey.
- 4) Successful applicants will be notified by the end of Term 3, 2019.







News & Updates

VTAC course applications for 2020 are opening on Monday, so if you are in Year 12 and intending to study at a Victorian University, TAFE or independent tertiary college next year, it's time to ensure that you have started your VTAC application preparation.

All applications are made on the Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre (VTAC) website (www.vtac.edu.au) as VTAC receives, collates and forwards all student applications to institutions including special consideration (SEAS) requests, scholarship applications and any other relevant or required documentation.

Here are some tips to get started:

Research!

- Research the courses on offer in your chosen field and preferred institution(s).
- Use 'CourseSearch' on the VTAC website and VTAC App (see quick link) as the primary source of course information.

Refine your list!

Establish your course preferences (you will do this after visiting open days too) and
ensure you are aware of the selection criteria for each course that you wish to apply
for, as each course and institution's entry requirements do vary i.e. interview,
admission tests, audition, folio presentation, or extra form/documents that need to be
completed. Note: This information can be found on each college website. Important: Take note of all relevant dates and deadlines.

Register!

Create a VTAC user account and have all your details close at hand i.e. educational history, student numbers to ensure that you complete your application accurately. Place your eight courses in your order of preference. You won't be able to save a draft of your application, but you will be able to change your preferences after it is completed. Remember: It is important to list your 'dream course' at the top of your preference list, as adjustment factors can affect your overall score and you will always be offered a place in the highest course in your list for which you meet the requirements.

*Important to note: You have until 30th of September for a 'timely' application where the normal application fee is \$36.00, after this date the fee increases to \$113.00.

The 'How to apply' page on the VTAC website is very helpful and may answer any questions you may have. You will also find some very useful YouTube VTAC video links about applying for courses, SEAS, scholarships, the offer process and changing preferences.

CASPer Test for Teaching

The CASPer test is an online tool designed to evaluate key personal and professional characteristics of all applicants applying for courses in Medicine, Veterinary Science and Education. The test measures traits like professionalism, ethics, communication and empathy, reviewing characteristics that make for successful students and graduates.

It runs for 60-90 minutes and comprises of 12 sections. Each section contains either a video-based or word-based scenario followed by a series of 3 open-ended questions. Test takers are asked to type in their responses within a 5-minute time limit.

The CASPer Test is compulsory for students wishing to apply for degrees in teaching, so it is important to be aware of the test dates, fees and technical (computer and internet) and security requirements you will need to follow.

You will need to register for your test at least three days before your preferred test date and time to account for identity verification and payment processing timelines.

Career Focus: Medicine – Surgeon

There are many areas of Medicine that you can undertake your training and work in, for example; Paramedicine, Pathology, Medical Practitioner, Ophthalmology, Pediatrician, Anesthetist and the list goes on! Training usually starts with an undergraduate degree in Medicine or Biomedicine and then post graduate study follows in a specialist area.

One specialist area in medicine is to become a Surgeon. Surgeons treat diseases, injuries and deformities by using a range of different methods and instruments, and may specialise in a particular field, such as cardiovascular or plastic surgery.

Surgeons:

- Operate on patients to repair injuries, fix deformities, treat disease and improve function.
- Examine patients to determine medical state and surgical risk.
- Prescribe pre-operative and post-operative treatments to patients including sedatives and antibiotics.
- Analyse patient medical history, allergies and examination results to decide the best courses of action.
- Refer patients to other medical specialists and exchange relevant medical details.

Surgeons can work in private practice alone or with fellow medical practitioners, in a group practice, in community health centres or at a (public or private) hospital. They work in cities, suburbs and rural towns. There are a number of specialisations of surgery:

- Brain Surgeon
- Cardiovascular Surgeon

- Orthopedic Surgeon
- Plastic Surgeon

The important personal requirements to be a surgeon are:

- Good communication skills
- Ability to exercise high ethical standards
- Compassionate towards others
- High level of motivation and self-discipline
- Excellent hand-eye coordination

To gain entry into undergraduate courses in medicine, you usually need to gain your VCE with particularly good results. Prerequisite subjects, or assumed knowledge in one or more of English, mathematics, biology, chemistry and physics are normally required. Some universities offer medicine as a double degree and may have different prerequisites and some have flexible entry requirements.

Training also involves experience in approved hospitals and the passing of examinations leading to membership of the appropriate professional college. Specialist training programs and examinations are administered by the colleges. Entry into these courses is highly competitive and based on a combination of academic achievement, performance on the University Clinical Aptitude Test (UCAT) and a structured interview. The UCAT is a two-hour computer-based test which assesses a range of mental abilities identified by universities as important to practicing in the fields of medicine, dentistry and clinical sciences.

Entry into the graduate-entry courses is based on prior completion of a bachelor degree, performance in the Graduate Australian Medical School Admissions Test (GAMSAT) and a score resulting in a semi-structured interview. Studies in behavioral, social, biological and physical sciences and humanities are likely to enhance performance in the test, and are offered at most universities.

Following course completion, graduates must undertake one year of full-time employment (internship) at a recognised teaching hospital to be able to gain full registration as a surgeon with the Medical Board of Australia. Prior to commencing clinical placements, students will be required to undergo a National Police Check and a Working with Children Check and provide evidence of immunisations. It is a legal requirement that graduates to be registered with the Medical Board of Australia before practicing in any state or territory in Australia.

Career Profile - Medicine

Name: Dr Adam Peterson

Current Position: Advanced trainee in Gastroenterology and Hepatology

Can you tell us where you studied, how long your course duration was and where you undertook your work experience (if any) to become qualified as a Gastroenterologist and Hepatologist?

After school, I studied a Bachelor of Physiotherapy for 4 years at Monash University. Following this, I undertook a Bachelor of Medicine, Bachelor of Surgery as a post-graduate student at Monash University for a further 4 years.

I could then start working as a doctor, completed my medical internship at Austin Health and stayed on there to complete basic physician training over 3 years. I am now 1 year through advanced training in gastroenterology and Hepatology. This training position takes 3 years and I will then be a qualified Gastroenterologist and Hepatologist, although many people undertake further training or research in an area of interest before commencing full time clinical work.

Whilst you were studying at secondary school, did you know that medicine is what you wanted to get into?

I knew I wanted to attend university and initially thought about engineering. My chemistry teacher in year 12 suggested I consider a career as a pharmacist after I expressed an interest in organic chemistry. I didn't really know what I wanted to do, but preferenced multiple health degrees (pharmacy, physio, medicine, biomedical science) in my university application.

What do you love about your job?

I get to learn something new most days! I get to apply my understanding of science to diagnosing and managing a wide variety of medical conditions. I get to help patients through some of the most difficult periods in their lives and hopefully do this in such a way that returns them to the things that they love to do.

What personal requirements would you say are necessary in your position?

As you can see above, the training to be a doctor takes a really long time! A commitment to not only that training but to lifelong learning is mandatory for a career in medicine. Being a skilled communicator is essential for dealing with patients, but also other doctors, nurses, pharmacists and allied health professionals that make up the wider healthcare team. Having leadership skills is also necessary, as often the doctor takes a leading role in those teams, but these can be learned over time.

What are the challenges of your job and the best ways to overcome those challenges?

Working in life or death situations can be very stressful! Developing healthy strategies to deal with stress and to learn from your experiences helps you become better at meeting those challenges. It's important that you not only have support at work, but also at home. This job can be very busy, I often have 14-hour work days, and/or work for 2 weeks at a time without a break! Time management is essential for looking after sick people, but also looking after yourself as you juggle ongoing study, teaching, research, as well as your own family and friends.
