Students on school premises Before School & After School

Please see below an extract from Wyndham Central College's Supervision and Duty of Care Policy

Students will be supervised for a minimum of 10 minutes before and after school. This supervision will include the following:

- Monitoring of entry or exit points and/or designated pick up and drop off areas
- Supervision of the arrival and departure of school contract buses

At Wyndham Central College yard duty supervision at the beginning of the school day will commence at **8.30am**. This supervision will include **Buses Location 1 and Buses Location 2**.

Yard duty supervision at the end of the school day will be provided until 3.30pm for all students. This supervision will include Buses Location 1, Buses Location 2, Shaw's Road near the Gate Location 7 each until 3.30pm.

DET – Detention Duty until 3.40pm.

Supervision is provided if students are needed for CAT/SAC resits until 4.15pm.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) drops off or otherwise arranges for a student to be on the school premises before supervision commences at the beginning of the day, the Principal or via the Assistant Principals or the Year Level Leading Teachers will, as soon as practicable, follow up with the parent, guardian and/or carer to:

- advise of the supervision arrangements before school, and
- request that the parent, guardian or carer make alternate arrangements.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) has failed to collect the student after school, the next steps may include some or all of the following:

- Attempting to contact the parents, guardians or carers
- Attempting to contact the emergency contacts
- Contacting the Victoria Police and/or the Department of Human Services (Child Protection) to arrange for the supervision, care and protection of the student.

Attendance / Non Attendance Process

Please report all known absences to the Attendance Officer, Ms. Carol Mills by calling the College on 97414911 and selecting Option 1. If your child has been absent please send a note with your child within three working days to explain his/her absence. For further information please see the Attendance Policy on Compass or the Department of Education parent website.

Same-day notification of unexplained student absences

Fact sheet for parents/carers from the Department of Education

If your child is sick or absent, you are required to notify their school as soon as possible **on the day of absence** using one of the following methods:

- 1. Online: log the absence directly using your school's IT platform.
- Telephone: the school office and let the staff know your child's name, class, date of absences and reason. 9741 4911 press 1
 Attendance
- 3. **Email:** the school and provide the staff with your child's name, class, date of absences and reason.

Notifying the school of your child's absence either prior to, or on the day that they will be away, helps ensure the safety and wellbeing of children and will fulfil your legal responsibility.

Why do I need to notify the school if my child is absent?

Schools need to know when and why a child is absent and you need to know if your child isn't at school.

From the end of Term 2 2018, all Victorian government schools are required to contact parents/carers as soon as practicable on the same day of an unexplained student absence. If your child is absent on a particular day and you have not contacted the school to explain why, the absence will be marked as unexplained.

This system also promotes daily school attendance. Going to school every day is the single most important part of your child's education, they learn new things every day – missing school puts them behind.

What is your responsibility?

You are legally required to ensure your child attends school every day or you must provide an explanation for their absence. You should let the school know in advance of any upcoming absences or let them know in the morning if your child won't be at school. In order for schools to implement the same day notification requirement, it's essential that you provide the school with your most up-to-date contact details.

Generally one notification will be sent per family. Should there be circumstances that require both parents and carers to be notified, please contact the school to make the necessary arrangements.

What is the school's responsibility?

The school must notify you of an unexplained absence in relation to your child as soon as practicable on the same day.

Schools will let you know either by your school's online communications app, SMS, phone call or email. If you can't be reached because the school does not have your correct contact details (i.e. changed phone number, SMS/email failure notification received etc.), the school will attempt to make contact with any emergency contact/s nominated on your child's file held by the school. Where possible, this contact will be made on the same day of the unexplained absence.

Where can I learn more about the process for managing student absences?

Ask your school for a copy of the *Attendance Policy* which outlines the school's processes and procedures for monitoring, recording and following-up of student absences.

School Nurse

A reminder to ensure all <u>medical plans</u> for your children are up to date. Please feel free to contact Ms. Claudia Jara, the School Nurse on 97414911 to discuss any medical needs. If students are unwell at school they are required to attend First Aid and the school nurse will then contact the family if it is deemed necessary. If your child calls you directly please tell them to go to First Aid for medical attention.

Crossing Supervisor

In the interest of student safety and the efficiency of the school buses, the College has a Crossing Supervisor in the bus service road (Market Road Extension) near the College basketball courts. The supervisor will be responsible for controlling the traffic and supervising the crossing of students after school.

Wyndham City Council – Shaw's Road Crossing Supervisor Please Note:

The Wyndham City Council expressed concern that students are <u>not</u> using the crossing and are weaving around cars trying to cross Shaws Road (stressing drivers who are having to break suddenly to avoid hitting the students or having an accident with another vehicle). Your support with reiterating to your child the importance of using the school crossing correctly is appreciated.

School Gates

The school gates are closed at 8.50 am to facilitate students arriving to class on time. Students must report to the administration area after 8:50 am, to obtain a late pass. Consequences for lateness may apply. Your child should have a note to explain a known lateness. Thank you to adhering to school policy.

Bike storage at school

It is important that all bikes are locked onto the racks with a bike lock or padlock and chain. This message has been communicated to all students however we would appreciate it if you could remind your son/daughter of this requirement. A bike helmet is also a legal requirement. Please note: Skateboards and scooters are not allowed in the school grounds.

Environmental duty

To assist our school community in being aware of their environment all year levels are responsible for picking up rubbish in certain areas within the College and also take part in an environmental program to help reduce litter. Could you please encourage your child to be environmentally conscious within the community and use the rubbish bins provided. As a further support please be aware of the amount of packaging being brought to school when preparing student lunches.

Emergency Management Plan

The Wyndham Central College Emergency Management Plan is tested regularly to ensure the safety of all students, staff and school visitors in the event of an emergency situation. As part of this plan we conduct four emergency drills per year, two lock down drills and two fire drills and students are made aware of when a drill is about to commence.



It's been great to see some of our hard work paying off recently and we have been thrilled with our recent NAPLAN results. Despite the nation-wide trend of year 9s languishing, and in the words of James Merlino our Education Minister 'not taking it seriously' 33% of our year 9 students demonstrated high growth in writing. This is an outstanding result and is 10% above state average, and 13% above similar schools.

This just goes to show the impact our AVID strategies and the teaching of our curriculum is having on our students. Wyndham Central College has indeed created a community of high expectations, where our student are achieving excellence. As the term draws to a close we hope you are able to attend parent teacher interviews on the last two days of school. We value the relationships we build with our families and invite you to be partners in the learning journey. Reports are able to be collected at this time, and they are also available electronically on Compass.

Year 8 and 9 students have chosen their programs for 2020, and as we head toward the tail end of the year (which will be focused on assessments and exams) we are also behind the scenes preparing for next year and our Step Up program will be the commencement of that. We are also planning a transition program for approximately 275 new year 7 students that will be starting with us next year. This is the most amount of new enrolments Wyndham Central College has had in many years and is a real testament to the high regard we are deservedly held in the community.

As always it's been a term jam-packed with activities and events. Some of my favourites have been; the school musical, Year Level Celebration Assemblies, Wear it Purple Day and Year 8 Camp. No doubt term four will also be just as invigorating, and we trust you will all have a safe and restful break.



YEAR 11 REPORT

Welcome all parents and guardians to the end of term 3. This term is often seen as a long one, with minimal respite breaks for the students by means of public holidays and whole school events (sports days), but as I reflect on the term – it has seemed to fly by more than any other this year. I know our students don't go through the ups and downs of school life alone, and I'd like to thank everyone for their support and guidance for their children/students so far. One term to go for Year 11.

Please be aware that all reports will be distributed on the 18th of September. Please make sure you speak to your students regarding their report progress and have an open conversation about what is required to grow as we head towards the end of the year. Please remember if you have any concerns or questions regarding the report, to contact the classroom teacher, tutor teacher or myself for clarification and support.

It is important to remind all students and guardians that there are clear guidelines in place in regards to VCE promotion. In order for all students to progress from Year 11 to Year 12, they must **satisfactorily complete at least nine units**, **including two units of English.** They must also have satisfactory attendance. If you have any concerns about your child's progression you can contact your students tutor teacher or Mr. Cook.

Students completed the final stage of their ELEVATE program for this year with a presentation on Memory Mnemonics. Memory Mnemonics is a study tool that gives meaning to the student's revision and packages it into smaller bites that are easier for the students to recall. This should set all the students up well with strategies for their exams and final SACs for the year. They will continue with the ELEVATE program next year as year 12 students to continue with their academic progression.

Please make sure to book in with your student's teachers for the upcoming Parent Teacher Interviews. These will be conducted from the 19th to the 20th September. It is always great to have such supportive parents/careers for our students, particularly towards the final stages of such an important year. We value a shared responsibility from all parents and carers towards the education of our students and we always enjoy discussing the best ways to help them succeed.

Please note that Year 11 Term 4 is slightly shorter than the junior years. For Year 11 students the exams start on November 6th until November 13th. The exams will be conducted under strict VCAA conditions and will mirror the expectations of Year 12 exams. Following the exams, the students will Step Up into their Year 12 subjects for 2 weeks, starting on the 18th November until the 29th November. More information will be provided to parents and students as these dates get closer.

Finally, a quick reminder about uniform. Non uniform items are to be left at home and not enter into the school grounds. Students who are wearing non uniform items may have these items confiscated for parents/carers to pick up.

Holiday Classes

Exams

Year 12 Exams will be running the last week of term, Monday 16th September to Thursday 19th of September. VCE scored students are only required to attend during their scheduled exam. All non-scored VCE students are to attend a scheduled class. VCAL students have class as per normal. These practice exams provide an excellent opportunity for students to practice their skills and to receive feedback from their teachers to support their study program development.

Parent Teacher Interviews

A second lot of Parent Teacher interviews for Year 12 students are being held on Thursday 19th September from 4-7pm and Friday 20th September 9-1pm and are the last scheduled interview times for Year 12 students. I encourage you to attend these interviews to receive an update on your child's progress and to see how you can best support your child moving into the end of the year. If you are unable to make this time can you please contact individual teachers and make a time to meet with then to discuss your child's progress.

Year 12 Tutor Day

The last year 12 tutor day was held on Friday 30th of August. The day started off with us welcoming back Nathan Stremple, a motivational speaker we have worked with in the past. We are well now fast approaching the end of Semester 2 with the conclusion of another busy and productive term.

Year 9 NAPLAN: Congratulation to student and teachers on the outstanding results

NAPLAN results have arrived and have been distributed to all families. I am delighted to announce that while there has been a declining national trend of Year 9 results, Wyndham Central College's steady and consistent improvement over that last five years continued with 33% of our Year 9 students demonstrating high growth in writing, this being 10% above the state average and 13% above similar school. This consistent and steady improvement led by Mrs. Lynda Wilson, Leading teacher for Literacy and Mrs. Lilibeth Lee, Leading teacher for Numeracy can only occur when there is a strong partnership with the parent/carer, leading teacher, and student. We thank all parents/carers for their contribution to this partnership and preparing and supporting their child in their learning journey.

The NAPLAN provides teachers with valuable information about each student's skills, strengths and areas for growth. This, in turn, helps teachers to plan effective learning, teaching and assessment programs to help each child maximise their learning.

Reports

Students have been working over this term and have now completed CATs and SACs as part of their learning program and teachers have evaluated the progress of each child.

Printed copies of the Term 3 Reports will be distributed to parents on **Thursday 19th September from 4 pm – 7 pm and Friday 20th September from 9 am – 1pm.** We encourage all parents to make interview times on Compass to discuss their child's progress. Learning Disposition - Fifth disposition - Problem Solving & Questioning

In our newsletters, we have been looking at the importance of nurturing a positive learning disposition and its role in student learning success. Students will require a complex combination of dispositions, skills, values, and attitudes to be successful future-oriented lifelong learners. Personal qualities like resilience and the ability to communicate and collaborate with others become important elements of our learners' identities. So far, in this series, we have looked at the following learning dispositions:

- Persistence
- Agility and Flexibility
- Motivation and Drive to Learn
- Metacognition- thinking about thinking

Development of these dispositions is fundamental for students to develop an awareness of the way they learn and establish future-focused attitudes to learning, critical if they are to be able to become lifelong learners. In this newsletter, we will focus on the fifth and final disposition: **Problem Solving and Questioning**

One of the distinguishing characteristics of students who are well prepared for 21st-century learning is their inclination and ability to find problems to solve and ask useful questions to enhance their knowledge and understanding. Effective problem solvers know how to ask questions to fill in gaps between what they know and what they do not yet know. They also pose questions about alternative points of view and often make causal connections between people, events or situations. Effective problem-solving and questioning also require learners to pose hypothetical problems characterised by 'if' questions and to recognise discrepancies and phenomena in their environment which require further investigation.

When parents solve all children's problems we not only increase their dependency on adults but we teach kids to be afraid of making mistakes and to blame themselves for not being good enough. That's fertile ground for anxiety and depressive illness. So, how can we raise kids to be courageous problem-solvers rather than self-critical scaredy cats?

Here are six practical ideas to get you started.

1. Turn requests into problems for kids to solve

Kids get used to bringing their problems to parents to solve. If you keeping solving them, they'll keep bringing them. 'Mum, my sister is annoying me!' 'Dad, can you ask my teacher to pick me for the team?' 'Hey, I can't find my socks!' It's tempting if you are in a time-poor family to simply jump in and help kids out. Alternatively, you can take a problem-solving approach, cuing them to resolve their own problems and take responsibility for their concerns. 'What can you do to make her stop annoying you?' 'What's the best approach to take with your teacher?' 'Socks, smocks! Where might they be?'

2. Ask good questions to prompt problem-solving

A problem-solving approach relies on asking good questions, which can be challenging if you are used to solving your child's problems. The first question when a child brings you a problem should be: 'Can you handle this on your own?' Next should be, 'What do you want me to do to help you solve the problem?' These questions are not meant to deter children from coming to you; rather, to encourage and teach them to start working through their own concerns themselves.

3. Coach them through problems and concerns

So, your child feels she was unfairly left out of a school sports team by a teacher and asks you to get involved. The easiest solution may be to meet with the teacher and find out what's going on. You may or not resolve the problem but in doing so you are teaching a child to become dependent on you. Alternatively, you could coach your child to speak to the teacher herself and find out why she was left out. There are times when children need their parents to be advocates for them such as when they are being bullied, but we need to make the most of the opportunities for children to speak for themselves. Better to help your child find the right words to use and discuss the best way to approach another person when they have problems. These are great skills to take into adulthood.

4. Prepare kids for problems and contingencies

You may coach your child to be independent – walk to school, spend some time alone at home (when old enough), catch a train with friends – but does he know what to do in an emergency? What happens if he comes home after school and the house is locked? Who should he go to? Discuss different scenarios with children whenever they enter new or potentially risky situations so that they won't fall apart when things don't go their way. Remember the Boy Scouts motto – be prepared!

5. Show a little faith


Sometimes you've got to show faith in children. We can easily trip them up with our negative expectations, such as by saying 'Don't spill it!' to a child who is carrying a glass filled with water. Of course, your child doesn't want to spill it but you've just conveyed your expectations with that statement. We need to be careful that we don't sabotage children's efforts to be independent problem-solvers with comments such as, 'Now don't stuff it up!' 'You'll be okay ... won't you?' 'You're not very good at looking after yourself!'

6. Applaud mistakes and stuff-ups

Would a child who accidentally breaks a plate in your family while emptying the dishwasher be met with a 'That's annoying, you can be clumsy sometimes' response or an 'It doesn't matter, thanks for your help' type of response? Hopefully, it won't be the first response, because nothing shuts a child's natural tendencies to extend themselves down quicker than an adult who can't abide mistakes. If you have a low-risk-taking, perfectionist, consider throwing a little party rather than making a fuss when they make errors so they can learn that mistakes don't reflect on them personally and that the sun will still shine even if they break a plate, tell a joke that falls flat or don't get a perfect examination score.

STEM Academy News: September 2019

As we head towards the end of term 3, it would appear that we have been busier than ever in the STEM Academy at the college.

STEM Project: 10S - Werribee River Detectives

I would like to take the opportunity to update you all on the progress of the STEM project 10S is working on during the course of term 3.

We have now reached the second phase of the Werribee River detective's project. The aim of the project is to test the quality of natural water bodies in different locations throughout the state.

The second excursion was conducted in the Wyndham Vale wetlands on Tuesday the 13th of August. Water sample data



collected by students enabled students to begin comparing their results with previous locations at Baccus Marsh and Cobbledicks Ford. Further comparison was made with online data collected by scientists on the Melbourne Water Website. In addition, macroinvertebrate sampling enabled further analysis of the quality of the Wyndham Vale wetlands. Dr Robert Walsh, from Australian Water life, assisted students with the collection of macroinvertebrates on the day and viewing under microscopes in a laboratory.

Being a Science teacher, National Science Week is personally my favorite part of the year. National Science week 2019 was celebrated with great enthusiasm at Wyndham Central College during 12-18 August. Students participated in various lunchtime Science activities throughout the week. We also had an opportunity to welcome students from the 'Western English Language School' in an attempt to extend our participation and involvement in the wider community outside our college.

A small group of year 9 girls, of Wyndham Central College, was selected to participate in a workshop titled "The power of Engineering". We spoke to different site engineers. The tunnel is being constructed to establish a freeway connection to minimize traffic noise on local streets, trucks on local streets, supporting urban redevelopment opportunities by protecting land on the surface, and averting traffic from residential homes. Through this excursion, we were able to apply our knowledge of how the significant roles of engineering are used in the construction of such infrastructure, such as the West Gate Tunnel. Thanks to Ms. Sharma for providing us with this great and unique opportunity.



Career Focus: Plumbing

Plumbers lay out, install, test and maintain pipes, fixtures, metal roofing, fittings, gas meters and regulators.

Plumbers:

- prepare and/or study plans and specifications to determine the layout of plumbing systems and materials needed
- find and mark positions for connections, measure pipes and mark cutting or bending lines, then cut holes through walls and floors to accommodate pipes

- cut, thread and bend pipes, assemble and install piping, valves and fittings, and join pipe sections and secure pipes
- test lines as required by local plumbing regulations
- install equipment such as boilers, chillers, pumps, heating and cooling systems, gas appliances, water tanks, water heaters and solar water heating systems, and fixtures such as toilets, wash basins and industrial processing units
- weld and braise pipework (steel, copper, plastic and stainless steel)
- system testing and commissioning
- maintain and repair plumbing systems.

The plumbing industry is dominated by small firms and self-employed tradespeople. Plumbers may also work for federal or state and territory government departments concerned with public works. Plumbers can be involved in everything from domestic maintenance to high-rise construction.

With further training and experience, plumbers can enter into other technical areas and become sales representatives. Some transition into; building supervisors, building and construction managers, plumbing inspectors, hydraulics consultants, technical teachers, estimators, building contract administrators or purchasing officers, or start their own business.

Demand is linked with activity in the construction industry. However, unlike in other building trades, downturns in building activity have less impact on plumbers because of the work available in renovation and maintenance. Demand is also more stable in plumbing because, by law, certain jobs must be performed by plumbers.

To be a plumber, it's helpful if you:

- enjoy practical work
- have good hand-eye coordination
- are able to work independently
- are able to work at heights and different weather conditions
- are able to cope with the physical demands of the job
- have good interpersonal skills
- have good mobility.

The education and training required to become a plumber (general) is to complete a Certificate III and apprenticeship in plumbing. Entry requirements may vary, but employers generally require completion of Year 10. However, as competition is strong for available apprenticeship positions, it is recommended if you have:

- completed your Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) or equivalent
- a strong understanding of Mathematics and English
- completed a relevant pre-apprenticeship i.e. Certificate II in Plumbing (VET Course).

 Note: You will need to obtain a 'Construction Induction Card' (also known as 'White Card') to access any construction site in Australia. For more information on this you can read more here:

Recently, Victoria's Education Department rolled out a new government initiative called 'Headstart' which gives secondary school students the opportunity to start their apprenticeship or traineeship in specific trade areas, while they are at school. Plumbing is one of the trades that is being offered, so for any students who are passionate about starting their plumbing apprenticeship, this is a great pathway. 'Headstart' work with students from Year 10-12, to support them in finding employers, enrolling at TAFE, and ensuring they are continuing to be successful at school. You can also choose to continue further training in a specialised area of plumbing by completing a Certificate IV in Plumbing Services. This qualification gives you the skills you need to become a:

- Air-conditioning and Mechanical Services Plumber
- Duct fixing Plumber
- Fire Services Plumber
- Gasfitter
- Plumber (General)
- Sanitary Plumber
- Water Plumber

Once you have completed your training, you will be required to apply for registration and licensing with the relevant body in your state or territory i.e. the Victorian Building Association (VBA). Post-trade qualifications from the Construction, Plumbing and Services (Certificate IV) may be required to fulfill registration requirements for more specialised areas of work, such as gas fitting, draining, hydraulics and fire protection.


