### **NEW MOBILE PHONE POLICY for all State Schools in 2020**

As you may be aware, Victorian government schools will be required to implement a new mobile phone policy from Term 1, 2020

This new policy will help focus students' attention on learning in the classroom by providing them with:

- (a) a safe environment to learn without inappropriate mobile phone use (including cyberbullying) or distractions
- (b) greater opportunities for social interaction and physical activity during recess and lunchtimes.

The use of technology is important, but the risks and benefits from its use needs to be carefully managed. A summary of research articles is available via the resources named below. It provides the reason for the new policy, including concerns about the impact of overuse of mobile phones on thinking and learning, health and wellbeing.

The full Wyndham Central College policy will be provided to parents and students via the Step Up interviews and via Compass and the Year Level Leaders. In summary, a student will still be able to bring a mobile phone to and from school, but it will need to be turned off and stored securely away in the school supplied lockers for the entire school day. Parents or carers can still contact their children but this must be done through the school office in emergencies.

The new mobile phone policy allows for a very small number of exceptions. Exceptions are only available where the use of a mobile phone is an essential tool for a student in managing a health condition. More information about exceptions and how they can be attained will be provided at a later date.

Families are encouraged to continue conversations about mobile phone use and to support their children to become safe and responsible technology users. A range of resources are available for families to support these conversations, including the eSafety Commissioner's 7 Tips for Managing Screen Time, Online Safety: A guide for parents and carers, and Screen Smart Parent Tour and the Department of Education and Training's Bully Stoppers webpage.

### Students on school premises Before School & After School

### Please see below an extract from Wyndham Central College's Supervision and Duty of Care Policy

Students will be supervised for a minimum of 10 minutes before and after school. This supervision will include the following:

- Monitoring of entry or exit points and/or designated pick up and drop off areas
- Supervision of the arrival and departure of school contract buses

At Wyndham Central College yard duty supervision at the beginning of the school day will commence at **8.30am**. This supervision will include **Buses Location 1** and **Buses Location 2**.

Yard duty supervision at the end of the school day will be provided until 3.30pm for all students. This supervision will include Buses Location 1, Buses Location 2, Shaw's Road near the Gate Location 7 each until 3.30pm.

DET – Detention Duty until 3.40pm.

Supervision is provided if students are needed for CAT/SAC resits until 4.15pm.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) drops off or otherwise arranges for a student to be on the school premises before supervision commences at the beginning of the day, the Principal or via the Assistant Principals or the Year Level Leading Teachers will, as soon as practicable, follow up with the parent, guardian and/or carer to:

- advise of the supervision arrangements before school, and
- request that the parent, guardian or carer make alternate arrangements.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) has failed to collect the student after school, the next steps may include some or all of the following:

- Attempting to contact the parents, guardians or carers
- Attempting to contact the emergency contacts
- Contacting the Victoria Police and/or the Department of Human Services (Child Protection) to arrange for the supervision, care and protection of the student.

### **Attendance / Non Attendance Process**

Please report all known absences to the Attendance Officer, Ms. Carol Mills by calling the College on 97414911 and selecting Option 1. If your child has been absent please send a note with your child within three working days to explain his/her absence. For further information please see the Attendance Policy on Compass or the Department of Education parent website.

### Same-day notification of unexplained student absences

Fact sheet for parents/carers from the Department of Education

If your child is sick or absent, you are required to notify their school as soon as possible **on the day of absence** using one of the following methods:

- 1. Online: log the absence directly using your school's IT platform Compass
- 2. **Telephone:** the school's Attendance Officer, Mrs. Carol Mills on 9741 4911 (Option 1 for attendance) and let her know your child's name, class, date of absences and reason.
  - Email: your child's tutor teacher, via Compass and provide the staff with your child's name, class, date of absences and reason.

Notifying the school of your child's absence either prior to, or on the day that they will be away, helps ensure the safety and wellbeing of children and will fulfil your legal responsibility.

### Why do I need to notify the school if my child is absent?

Schools need to know when and why a child is absent and you need to know if your child isn't at school.

From the end of Term 2 2018, all Victorian government schools are required to contact parents/carers as soon as practicable on the same day of an unexplained student absence. If your child is absent on a particular day and you have not contacted the school to explain why, the absence will be marked as unexplained.

This system also promotes daily school attendance. Going to school every day is the single most important part of your child's education, they learn new things every day – missing school puts them behind.

### What is your responsibility?

You are legally required to ensure your child attends school every day or you must provide an explanation for their absence. You should let the school know in advance of any upcoming absences or let them know in the morning if your child won't be at school. In order for schools to implement the same day notification requirement, it's essential that you provide the school with your most up-to-date contact details.

Generally one notification will be sent per family. Should there be circumstances that require both parents and carers to be notified, please contact the school to make the necessary arrangements.

### What is the school's responsibility?

The school must notify you of an unexplained absence in relation to your child as soon as practicable on the same day.

Schools will let you know either by your school's online communications app, SMS, phone call or email. If you can't be reached because the school does not have your correct contact details (i.e. changed phone number, SMS/email failure notification received etc.), the school will attempt to make contact with any emergency contact/s nominated on your child's file held by the school. Where possible, this contact will be made on the same day of the unexplained absence.

### Where can I learn more about the process for managing student absences?

Ask your school for a copy of the *Attendance Policy* which outlines the school's processes and procedures for monitoring, recording and following-up of student absences.

### **School Nurse**

A reminder to ensure all <u>medical plans</u> for your children are up to date. Please feel free to contact Ms. Claudia Jara, the School Nurse on 97414911 to discuss any medical needs. If students are unwell at school they are required to attend First Aid and the school nurse will then contact the family if it is deemed necessary. If your child calls you directly please tell them to go to First Aid for medical attention.

### **Crossing Supervisor**

In the interest of student safety and the efficiency of the school buses, the College has a Crossing Supervisor in the bus service road (Market Road Extension) near the College basketball courts. The supervisor will be responsible for controlling the traffic and supervising the crossing of students after school.

# Wyndham City Council – Shaw's Road Crossing Supervisor Please Note:

The Wyndham City Council expressed concern that students are <u>not</u> using the crossing and are weaving around cars trying to cross Shaws Road (stressing drivers who are having to break suddenly to avoid hitting the students or having an accident with another vehicle). Your support with reiterating to your child the importance of using the school crossing correctly is appreciated.

### **School Gates**

The school gates are closed at 8.50 am to facilitate students arriving to class on time. Students must report to the administration area after 8:50 am, to obtain a late pass. Consequences for lateness may apply. Your child should have a note to explain a known lateness. Thank you to adhering to school policy.

### Bike storage at school

It is important that all bikes are locked onto the racks with a bike lock or padlock and chain. This message has been communicated to all students however we would appreciate it if you could remind your son/daughter of this requirement. A bike helmet is also a legal requirement. Please note: Skateboards and scooters are not allowed in the school grounds.

### **Environmental duty**

To assist our school community in being aware of their environment all year levels are responsible for picking up rubbish in certain areas within the College and also take part in an environmental program to help reduce litter. Could you please encourage your child to be environmentally conscious within the community and use the rubbish bins provided. As a further support please be aware of the amount of packaging being brought to school when preparing student lunches.

### **Emergency Management Plan**

The Wyndham Central College Emergency Management Plan is tested regularly to ensure the safety of all students, staff and school visitors in the event of an emergency situation. As part of this plan we conduct four emergency drills per year, two lock down drills and two fire drills and students are made aware of when a drill is about to commence.



It's been another productive couple of months here at the College, and we've been seeing a lot of high level student achievement in a range of areas. We recently held the annual Art show which showcased the work of some very talented students. Last week the Enrichment class held a musical evening, and by the time you are reading this the Enrichment Drama students would have performed the play that they have written and produced. We've also had students involved in creating community murals, both at school and in the adjoining Galvin Park. It's a real pleasure watching students thrive in the many avenues we have for success here at the College.

We will soon be welcoming almost 270 grade 6 students from our local primary schools. The transition team and myself have been busy visiting all these students to distribute enrolment information and we are very excited to be starting the secondary education journey with these children.

We will be offering a range of transition activities in the coming month to help make the change to high school as easy as possible. All students will be 'stepping up' into their 2020 programs towards the end of the term, and families will be requested to attend the College to meet with their student's 2020 Tutor Teacher to set goals for the coming year.

As we move into the final assessment period for the year we'd ask that you keep a close eye on your children and support them as much as possible. Some students can become a little overwhelmed by exams; this can be combated by a healthy life-style (plenty of sleep, nutritious food and exercise). Supports at school include Tutor Teachers, classroom teachers, Year level leaders and assistants. There is a whole student services team on site every day, as well as a school nurse. Having a quiet place to study will also help students achieve their best, encourage them to limit their screen time while revising for assessments.

Finally we'd like to thank everyone that took the time to complete the Parent Opinion Survey, this is valuable feedback we use when making decisions and setting school goals for the year ahead. It was terrific to hear that over 90% of families endorse that there is effective communication with their student's teachers. The other highlights were student motivation and support which again was positively endorsed by over 80% of families, and promoting positive behaviour at over 80%. Thank you again to all the people that provided us with this feedback, the school leadership team have been working closely with the data and are using this to plan for next year and beyond.

### Did you know Compass could do that?


Parents and Carers can find subject-specific learning tasks and resources for their child, via their Compass account - a hassle-free way to allow for further study outside of regular school hours. Attendance and unexplained absences can also be monitored using either the COMPASS app or website, and reasons for absences can quickly be added by entering an Attendance Note. A reminder that it is a Department of Education requirement that Parents/Carers provide a reason for all unexplained absences. ### Step Up interviews for Years 11 and 12 students (2020)

On Thursday the 14th and Friday 15th November, the college will be conducting compulsory Parent/Carer-Tutor Teacher course confirmation interviews for Years 11 and 12 students (2020). A letter and booking sheet has been given to students to take home outlining the interviews.

### Project Updates: Term 4, 2019

### 10S - Werribee River Detectives by Mr Andre Bernardi, STEM & Maths Teacher WCC

We have now reached the final phase of the Werribee River detective's project. The aim of the project is to test the quality of natural water bodies in different locations throughout the state.

Excursion two was conducted in the Werribee River – Mansion area and the Werribee Cliffs on Tuesday the 15<sup>th</sup> of October. Water sample data collected by students enabled students to compare results with other locations.





After testing, students were able to observe Community Volunteers at the Wyndham Community Garden. This highlighted the benefits of becoming a voluntary community member. The excursion also gave students an opportunity to better understand the impact of water quality on local gardens, orchids.

Students will have the opportunity to collate their results as a STEM presentation at the college AVID center on November 1.

### 9S - Coding Edison Robots using Scratch Software by Joshua Cefala-Lopez 9S

During term 3 the year 9 STEM class has been completing a project called "An introduction to coding Edison robots using Scratch software". Unlike a remote control car, the students had to code their robots using a programming website called Scratch. Individually or in groups students make certain codes to complete a booklet full of puzzles, mazes, and questions that needed to be answered.

During the process of completing the booklet students had to take screenshots of their codes and take videos of their robot doing the code for their digital journal and their video that needed to be created after the booklet was completed. In their digital journal, students provided screenshots of the codes made for the booklet to show evidence that the codes were made by the student and the answer in the booklet is not just randomly guessed. The Students also had to answer a mathematical question in their digital journal explaining the perimeter driven, Area of the shape and the speed of the Edison robot when it went around a shape of a certain triangle, square and hexagon.

During the completion of the digital journal students also had to make a 3-minute video explain how the Edison robot works while showing the Edison robot completing at least five codes. When the project was finished, students had to hand in their folder of screenshots, Digital Journal and their video via compass.

There was a great turn out of students, and a fantastic atmosphere with everyone getting involved in some way to enjoy the sunshine.



The program aims to educate young people and prevent graffiti, transform and brighten the environment and create safer public spaces. We hope to involve more students in similar education programs in the future.
























# 8B's Excursion to Polly Woodside

**Important Update:** Students interested in studying Medicine, Dentistry and some other Clinical Science courses at a member university of the UMAT Consortium, will now need to sit the <u>UCAT (University Clinical Aptitude Test)</u> as part of their admissions process instead of the UMAT (Undergraduate Medical and Health Sciences Admission Test).

UCAT has now replaced UMAT for 2019 applications university entry in 2020.

However, for those students who have already sat the UMAT in July this year, nothing has changed regarding your application for the 2019 medical entry courses.

### **Career Focus - Disability Support Worker**

According to the Australian Government's Department of Jobs and Small Business, Aged and Disabled Carers will see an increase of 39.3% in job opportunities within the next 5 years. 'Disability Support Workers' can also be known as an; Aged Carer, Developmental Care Worker, Disabled Carer, Home Support Worker, Intellectual Disability Services, Nursing Assistant (Disability Support) and Special Care Worker.

Disability support workers provide care, supervision and support for people with disabilities in the home, residential establishments, clinics and hospitals. They also work with other health professionals to maximise the individual's physical and mental wellbeing. They provide companionship and emotional support, and when possible, promote independence and community participation.

### Disability support workers:

- Assist people with self-medication
- Implement care programs for those in residential establishments.
- Provide in-home support with health issues and daily living tasks such as washing, dressing, eating, transport and budgeting.
- Assist with the delivery of activities to enhance the physical, social, emotional and intellectual development of those in care.
- Ensure that those in their care are washed, dressed, fed and ready for educational and recreational activities.
- Assist those in their care during domestic activities such as eating meals and showering.
- Provide companionship and support during daily activities.
- Cook and serve meals, clean premises, wash, iron and perform other household tasks.
- Organise refuge accommodation.
- Work with a team of health professionals, family, friends and carers to implement a program of support.
- Can work evenings, weekends and public holidays and may also be required to live or stay on the premises.

To work in this field, it is important to be patient, flexible and understanding. You will need to be supportive, caring and have a commitment to the rights of people with disabilities to live dignified lives. It is also important to be able to accept responsibility, have good communication skills, be able to work as part of a team and capable of meeting the physical demands of the job.

To become a Disability Support Worker, you usually have to complete a Certificate IV in Disability which is the entry level qualification for working with people with disabilities. Further studies for disability work include the Diploma of Community Services work.

The Victorian Government have included a range of Certificates in Disability, Ageing Support, Individual Support or Community Services as part of their 2019 Free TAFE initiative.
