#### From the Principal's Desk

In 2020 we will continue to work hard to ensure that our students experience a positive and harmonious learning environment and to that end, the College will be working on implementing the School Wide Positive Behaviours program across the College in 2020.

With that aim our students started and have settled in very well, engaging in their classrooms with their teachers and

fellow students in the first three full weeks of term. A reminder to families that this is actually week 5 of our teaching program and our VCE/VCAL students will be receiving their progress checks shortly. This also means that all students will be preparing for their first set of reportable assessments for this year. Students from years 7-10 will be completing their first Common Assessment Tasks (CATs) and our VCE students will be completing their first School Assessed Coursework (SACs).

Our year 7 and 10 students will be supplied with their 'lease to own' laptops starting this week and our year 7's will be completing some on-line testing to help our staff plan their individualised work program. If parents/carers would like to share any additional or new information that will support learning plans please contact the college to speak to our Year level leaders, tutor teachers or our student services area.

All students should now have all school equipment. On day one all students were provided with an AVID binder, their writing books, access to their JacPlus theory books and the World book library and their student planner. The student planner has lots of support material for students and families that help kids fully prepare students to be 'ready to learn'. All students have also been provided with a school locker to be accessed before and after school and during break times. A reminder that the expectation is that school bags and mobile phones are to be put into lockers at the beginning of each school day.

Please note, changes of email addresses, phone numbers or addresses can also be made via the Compass system. For the safety of all students it is very important for families to keep all medical information updated. Please see our school nurse to ensure all information is current.

#### Family nights and our Grade 5/6 Information night for our future families

Thank you to all the parents who have attended the Information Evenings held so far this year. Again a great opportunity to share stories, meet others in the same situation and reflect on our students' journey. The support of our parent community is always very much appreciated and the Year Level Leaders, tutor teachers and classroom teachers enjoy the strong partnerships that are built.

Our college is holding our first 'open night' in mid March for perspective students and families which will be accompanied by various opportunities to tour the school during the school day. #### **NEW MOBILE PHONE POLICY for all State Schools in 2020**

As you may be aware, Victorian government schools will be required to implement a new mobile phone policy from Term 1, 2020

This new policy will help focus students' attention on learning in the classroom by providing them with:

- (a) a safe environment to learn without inappropriate mobile phone use (including cyberbullying) or distractions
- (b) greater opportunities for social interaction and physical activity during recess and lunchtimes.

The use of technology is important, but the risks and benefits from its use needs to be carefully managed. A summary of research articles is available via the resources named below. It provides the reason for the new policy, including concerns about the impact of overuse of mobile phones on thinking and learning, health and wellbeing.

Students will still be able to bring a mobile phone to and from school, but it will need to be turned off and stored securely away in the school supplied lockers for the entire school day. Parents or carers can still contact their children through the school office in emergencies.

Families are encouraged to continue conversations about mobile phone use and to support their children to become safe and responsible technology users. A range of resources are available for families to support these conversations, including the eSafety Commissioner's 7 Tips for Managing Screen Time, Online Safety: A guide for parents and carers, and Screen Smart Parent Tour and the Department of Education and Training's Bully Stoppers webpage. Our school policy and fact sheets were made available to all parents at the College Step Up interviews in December and are currently available on Compass or via the front office and the College Assistant Principals and Year Level Leaders.

#### Reminder - Notice of Election and Voting Period 2020 Wyndham Central College School Council Election — Information for Parents and Students

#### What is a school council and what does it do?

All government schools in Victoria have a school council. They are legally constituted bodies that are given powers to set the key directions of a school within statewide guidelines. In doing this, a school council is able to directly influence the quality of education that the school provides for its students.

#### Who is on the school council?

For most school councils, there are three possible categories of membership:

- A mandated elected Parent category more than one-third of the total members must be from this category. Department of Education and Training (DET) employees can be Parent members at their child's school as long as they are not engaged in work at the school.
- A mandated elected DET employee category members of this category may make up no more than one-third of the total membership of school council. The principal of the school is automatically one of these members.
- An optional Community member category members are co-opted by a decision of the council because of their special skills, interests or experiences. DET employees are not eligible to be Community members.
- A mandatory elected student current student member elected by the student body.

Generally, the term of office for all members is two years. The term of office of half the members expires each year, creating vacancies for the annual school council elections.

#### Why is Parent/Student membership so important?

Parents and Students on school councils provide important viewpoints and have valuable skills that can help shape the direction of the school.

Those parents and students who become active on a school council find their involvement satisfying in itself and may also find that their children feel a greater sense of belonging.

#### How can you become involved?

The most obvious way is to vote in the elections, which are held in Term 1 each year. However, ballots are only held if more people nominate as candidates than there are positions vacant.

#### Ballot Papers and Voting

From Thursday the 27th February 2020 a list of nominated Parent candidates together with a statement from them will be posted in the entry foyer of the college. Parent Ballot papers are available from Administration office of the college or by calling 9741 4911. There are 2 positions to fill therefore you must only elect 2 candidates marked with 1 for first preference and 2 for your second preference (any further numbers will mean it is a null and void ballot paper).

The list of nominated Student candidates are displayed in various locations around the college buildings and ballot papers are available from Ms. Mitchell during break times in the Senior Building. There is only 1 position to fill and therefore you must only elect 1 candidates marked with 1 as your preference (any further numbers will mean it is a null and void ballot paper).

Please note that Voting opens from Thursday 27th February and will close 4:00pm Thursday 5th March 2020

#### School Council Treasurer Position

The college is also seeking expression of interest for the position of Treasurer with a financial or legal background (either working or retired) such as an accountant, lawyer, bank manager or police officer; they do not necessarily need to be a parent of a student at the college to hold this position.

#### Secondary School vaccinations in 2020

The Secondary School Vaccine Program offers free vaccines to Year 7 and 10 students. These vaccines provide protection against:

- Diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis (whooping cough) one dose for year 7 students
- Human Papillomavirus (HPV) two doses for year 7 students
- Meningococcal A,C,W,Y one dose for year 10 students

Parents/guardians of year 7 and 10 students should look out for the vaccine consent card booklet coming home from school with your child. You need to read the information, complete and return the card regardless of whether your child is being vaccinated at school.

The Wyndham Central Secondary College School Council immunisation service may contact you about the Secondary School Vaccine Program. Schools are authorised to provide basic parent/guardian contact details to local councils for this purpose. Contact the school by 28 February 2020 if you do not want your contact details given to the Wyndham Council immunisation service.

To learn more about the Secondary School Vaccine Program, the vaccines, the diseases they protect against, or how you can prepare your child for vaccination, go to betterhealth.vic.gov.au

Additionally, the Commonwealth government is funding vaccinations for all children under 20 years of age who missed any scheduled vaccines, including a catch up program for Meningococcal ACWY vaccine for adolescents aged 15-19 years of age who have not already received the vaccine in school. If students have missed vaccines, either in childhood or adolescence, and require catch-up vaccines, they should speak with their immunisation provider. (ie. local council or GP).

#### Students on school premises Before School & After School

#### Please see below an extract from Wyndham Central College's Supervision and Duty of Care Policy

Students will be supervised for a minimum of 10 minutes before and after school. This supervision will include the following:

- Monitoring of entry or exit points and/or designated pick up and drop off areas
- Supervision of the arrival and departure of school contract buses

At Wyndham Central College yard duty supervision at the beginning of the school day will commence at **8.30am**. This supervision will include **Buses Location 1 and Buses Location 2**.

Yard duty supervision at the end of the school day will be provided until 3.30pm for all students. This supervision will include Buses Location 1, Buses Location 2, Shaw's Road near the Gate Location 7 each until 3.30pm.

DET – Detention Duty until 3.40pm.

Supervision is provided if students are needed for CAT/SAC resits until 4.15pm.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) drops off or otherwise arranges for a student to be on the school premises before supervision commences at the beginning of the day, the Principal or via the Assistant Principals or the Year Level Leading Teachers will, as soon as practicable, follow up with the parent, guardian and/or carer to:

- advise of the supervision arrangements before school, and
- request that the parent, guardian or carer make alternate arrangements.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) has failed to collect the student after school, the next steps may include some or all of the following:

- Attempting to contact the parents, guardians or carers
- Attempting to contact the emergency contacts
- Contacting the Victoria Police and/or the Department of Human Services (Child Protection) to arrange for the supervision, care and protection of the student.

#### **Attendance / Non Attendance Process**

Please report all known absences to the Attendance Officer, Ms. Carol Mills by calling the College on 97414911 and selecting Option 1. If your child has been absent please send a note with your child within three working days to explain his/her absence. For further information please see the Attendance Policy on Compass or the Department of Education parent website.

#### Same-day notification of unexplained student absences

Fact sheet for parents/carers from the Department of Education

If your child is sick or absent, you are required to notify their school as soon as possible **on the day of absence** using one of the following methods:

- 1. Online: log the absence directly using your school's IT platform Compass
- 2. **Telephone:** the school's Attendance Officer, Mrs. Carol Mills on 9741 4911 (Option 1 for attendance) and let her know your child's name, class, date of absences and reason.
- 3. **Email:** your child's tutor teacher, via Compass and provide the staff with your child's name, class, date of absences and reason.

Notifying the school of your child's absence either prior to, or on the day that they will be away, helps ensure the safety and wellbeing of children and will fulfil your legal responsibility.

#### Why do I need to notify the school if my child is absent?

Schools need to know when and why a child is absent and you need to know if your child isn't at school.

From the end of Term 2 2018, all Victorian government schools are required to contact parents/carers as soon as practicable on the same day of an unexplained student absence. If your child is absent on a particular day and you have not contacted the school to explain why, the absence will be marked as unexplained.

This system also promotes daily school attendance. Going to school every day is the single most important part of your child's education, they learn new things every day – missing school puts them behind.

#### What is your responsibility?

You are legally required to ensure your child attends school every day or you must provide an explanation for their absence. You should let the school know in advance of any upcoming absences or let them know in the morning if your child won't be at school. In order for schools to implement the same day notification requirement, it's essential that you provide the school with your most up-to-date contact details.

Generally one notification will be sent per family. Should there be circumstances that require both parents and carers to be notified, please contact the school to make the necessary arrangements.

#### What is the school's responsibility?

The school must notify you of an unexplained absence in relation to your child as soon as practicable on the same day.

Schools will let you know either by your school's online communications app, SMS, phone call or email. If you can't be reached because the school does not have your correct contact details (i.e. changed phone number, SMS/email failure notification received etc.), the school will attempt to make contact with any emergency contact/s nominated on your child's file held by the school. Where possible, this contact will be made on the same day of the unexplained absence.

#### Where can I learn more about the process for managing student absences?

Ask your school for a copy of the *Attendance Policy* which outlines the school's processes and procedures for monitoring, recording and following-up of student absences.

#### **School Nurse**

A reminder to ensure all <u>medical plans</u> for your children are up to date. Please feel free to contact Ms. Claudia Jara, the School Nurse on 97414911 to discuss any medical needs. If students are unwell at school they are required to attend First Aid and the school nurse will then contact the family if it is deemed necessary. If your child calls you directly please tell them to go to First Aid for medical attention.

#### **School Gates**

The school gates are closed at 8.50 am to facilitate students arriving to class on time. Students must report to the administration area after 8:50 am, to obtain a late pass. Consequences for lateness may apply. Your child should have a note to explain a known lateness. Thank you to adhering to school policy.

#### Bike storage at school

It is important that all bikes are locked onto the racks with a bike lock or padlock and chain. This message has been communicated to all students however we would appreciate it if you could remind your son/daughter of this requirement. A bike helmet is also a legal requirement. Please note: Skateboards and scooters are not allowed in the school grounds.

#### **Environmental duty**

To assist our school community in being aware of their environment all year levels are responsible for picking up rubbish in certain areas within the College and also take part in an environmental program to help reduce litter. Could you please encourage your child to be environmentally conscious within the community and use the rubbish bins provided. As a further support please be aware of the amount of packaging being brought to school when preparing student lunches.

#### **Emergency Management Plan**

The Wyndham Central College Emergency Management Plan is tested regularly to ensure the safety of all students, staff and school visitors in the event of an emergency situation. As part of this plan we conduct four emergency drills per year, two lock down drills and two fire drills and students are made aware of when a drill is about to commence.

#### **Second Hand Uniform**

We are asking for your assistance with donations of any items of uniform that your child/children have grown out of or not using anymore. If you can assist, please drop off second hand uniforms to the front office and we will issue to other students within the college as necessary.

#### **ZAP Club and ZAP Process**

This year we have introduced the ZAP Club and ZAP process for all Year 7 students. I have spoken to the Year 7 cohort about the process at assembly and they were receptive of this support offered to assist their learning.

The purpose of the ZAP club and process is to encourage students to complete their classwork, homework and assignments. The process will work as follows

- 1. Year 7 students who need support to complete their class work, homework or assignments will receive a ZAP ticket from the teacher.
- 2. The teacher places the ZAP ticket in the student's planner. (An example of the ZAP ticket is below.)
- 3. The student takes the ZAP ticket home and informs the parent /carer that they will have ZAP Club during Break 2 the very next day.
- 4. The student has an opportunity to complete the uncompleted work/assignment the evening prior with family support.
- 5. If the student completes the uncompleted work/assignment at home that evening, they can hand in the completed work/assignment to the teacher BEFORE school and will not have need to attend ZAP Club during Break 2 that day for support.
- 6. If the student has not completed their assignment at home the previous night, they will be required to attend ZAP Club during Break 2. During Break 2, the student reports immediately to the ZAP room with their ZAP assignment and their lunch.
- 7. The student works on the uncompleted work/assignment with a teacher and can then submit the completed work.
- 8. If the student does not finish the work, the student will return to ZAP the following day and each subsequent day until the assignment has been completed to their full potential.



#### THE COLLEGE OFFERS BPAY

email to the college with your request before you make payment. Biller code and reference numbers now appear on your family statements.

#### **VISITORS TO THE SCHOOL**

#### STUDENTS LEAVING SCHOOL EARLY

Wyndham Central College has provided its students and their parents/guardians with a 'School Careers Website'. You can find 'Career Tools' on the Pathways Portal under Student/Parent Links on the College Homepage.

It is a "One Stop Shop" for students' needs with their Career Planning, Information, VCE, Post School Options and much more.

Students can also use it to create and save their resume.

The site is also designed with the parent/guardian in mind, to provide both students and parents/guardians with all the information needed about the students' Career/Pathway Planning and post school options – and the information is constantly changing in these areas.

The Careers Office, in the Wellbeing Centre, is a resource centre for our students with current institutional handbooks and brochures at their disposal. Students are invited to visit, browse and question. An open door policy exits to ensure students make informed decisions about future pathways. Initial Year 12 interviews will take place shortly to assist students with the momentous decisions facing them this year. Parents/guardians are welcome to take advantage of the services provided. Appointments can be made to discuss the future pathways of their children.

#### **HOW CAN I CHOOSE A CAREER?**

Many people say that they would like a job they **enjoy**, with the possibility of earning a reasonable **income**. **So how do you choose that job?** 

Firstly, keep in mind that there is not just one perfect job for you. There are several jobs that would suit you well, so you need to **explore the possibilities**.

First, think about what you enjoy doing.



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For example, is it sport-related, scientific, reading/writing-related, helping people, information technology-related?

What do you enjoy doing in your spare time?

What subjects do you excel in at school?

How important is it that you earn a lot of money?

Answering questions such as these will set you on a path to making some decisions.

If you like science, what type of science do you prefer – physics, chemistry, biology?

If you are creative, what is your speciality - music, drama, art, design?

If it is geography, perhaps you could be interested in urban planning, mapping or surveying.

If it is health, perhaps it is nursing, nutrition or public health.

If it is physics and maths, perhaps engineering.

Do not look too far ahead – you are not deciding on a life-time career. You will have several careers.

#### **HOW CAN I ACCCESS UNIVERSITY COURSES?**

Many courses accept Year 12 graduates on the basis of their ATAR (Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank) and meeting any prerequisite subject requirements. Some courses, however, have additional requirements (eg an audition, a folio presentation, completion of a selection kit, attendance at an interview, testing). You are advised to check these out on the Victorian Tertiary Admissions Centre (VTAC) website (<a href="www.vtac.edu.au">www.vtac.edu.au</a>). Applicants for courses apply on the VTAC website, commencing in August each year. Up to eight courses can be applied for.

### **APPLYING for MEDICINE, DENTISTRY or ORAL HEALTH?**

If you are in Year 12 and plan to apply for any of these health science courses to start in 2021, you may need to sit the UCAT ANZ (University Clinical Aptitude Test).



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The UCAT ANZ is a two-hour, computer-based test which assesses a range of mental abilities identified by universities as important to practicing in the fields of medicine and dentistry.

It consists of five separately timed subtests which each contain a number of questions in a multiple-choice format.

You will sit the test in July 2020 and selected universities use your UCAT ANZ results as part of the selection process, in conjunction with your ATAR and HSC/VCE results, and in some cases an interview.

You will only have one chance to sit the UCAT ANZ this year.

# THE HOW AND WHY OF PRACTISING GRATITUDE

Gratitude, or appreciation for the good things that happen in life, is an essential part of building happiness. When you're going through a tough time it can be hard to remember to be grateful for the good stuff, but there are a stack of benefits that can be gained from working gratitude into your everyday life. Find out more about ways to increase your gratitude and your awareness of things you can be grateful for.

## This can help if:

- you want a strategy for helping to deal with a tough time
- you want to boost your mood
- you want to cultivate awareness and appreciation for the good things in your life.

## What is gratitude?

Everyone has times when they feel aware of being thankful for a person or a situation. These moments give us a good feeling that we call 'gratitude'.

Feeling grateful just happens sometimes, but you can also make a special effort to increase how often you feel it. Research has shown that people with high levels of gratitude experience a whole bunch of benefits, so it's a great idea to increase your own.

## The benefits of gratitude

Increasing your gratitude is useful because:

- it's an instant mood booster and feels great in the moment
- you're likely to feel closer to friends and family
- you're likely to enjoy your life more
- \* it's good for your physical health
- it's easier to cope with tough times
- good things in life don't stick in our heads as easily as bad events.

This last point is really important. We tend to remember when bad things happen, and the time we spend thinking about them makes us unhappy. But, if we make an effort to increase how often we experience gratitude, it can balance out some of the negative stuff.

That doesn't mean that you should ignore/forget your problems, or that the things wrong with your life are unimportant. It just means that good memories will also stick in your mind, so you get to enjoy them for longer.

## How to practise gratitude


Experiencing more gratitude is easy and doesn't take much time. Try these ideas and see what works best for you:

- Keep a gratitude journal. Take five minutes each day or once a week to think of and write down three things that have happened to you since the previous day or week that you're glad you experienced.
- **Take pictures.** Set yourself a mission to photograph little things in your everyday life that make you smile.
- Tell someone you're grateful to have them in your life. Whether it's someone you look up to, or someone who just makes you happy, take the time to tell them you're glad they're around.


