Please ensure your child follows the Mobile Phone Policy for All Schools Students

Victorian schools implemented a mobile phone policy in, 2020. This policy continues in 2021.

It helps focus students' attention on learning in the classroom by providing them with:

- (a) a safe environment to learn without inappropriate mobile phone use (including cyberbullying) or distractions
- (b) greater opportunities for social interaction and physical activity during recess and lunchtimes.

 The use of technology is important, but the risks and benefits from its use needs to be carefully managed. A summary of research articles is available via the resources named below. It provides the reason for the policy, including concerns about the impact of overuse of mobile phones on thinking and learning, health and wellbeing.

Students will still be able to bring a mobile phone to and from school, but it will need to be turned off and stored securely away in the school supplied lockers for the entire school day. Parents or carers can still contact their children through the school office in emergencies.

Families are asked to support your child to follow the mobile phone use policy and to support your children to become safe and responsible technology users.

Attendance / Non Attendance Process – Reminder

If your child has been absent please send a note with your child including their name, tutor class and reason within three working days to explain his/her absence. For further information please see the Attendance Policy on Compass or the Department of Education parent website.

Same-day notification of unexplained student absences

Fact sheet for parents/carers from the Department of Education

If your child is sick or absent, you are required to notify their school as soon as possible **on the day of absence** using one of the following methods:

- 1. Online: log the absence directly using our school's IT platform Compass
- 2. **Telephone:** the school's Attendance Officer, Mrs. Carol Mills on 9741 4911 (Option 1 for attendance) and let her know your child's name, class, date of absences and reason.
- 3. **Email:** your child's tutor teacher, via Compass and provide the staff with your child's name, class, date of absences and reason. Notifying the school of your child's absence either prior to, or on the day that they will be away, helps ensure the safety and wellbeing of children and will fulfil your legal responsibility.

Why do I need to notify the school if my child is absent?

Schools need to know when and why a child is absent and you need to know if your child isn't at school.

From the end of Term 2 2018, all Victorian government schools are required to contact parents/carers as soon as practicable on the same day of an unexplained student absence. If your child is absent on a particular day and you have not contacted the school to explain why, the absence will be marked as unexplained.

This system also promotes daily school attendance. Going to school every day is the single most important part of your child's education, they learn new things every day – missing school puts them behind.

What is your responsibility?

You are legally required to ensure your child attends school every day or you must provide an explanation for their absence. You should let the school know in advance of any upcoming absences or let them know in the morning if your child won't be at school. In order for schools to implement the same day notification requirement, it's essential that you provide the school with your most up-to-date contact details.

Generally one notification will be sent per family. Should there be circumstances that require both parents and carers to be notified, please contact the school to make the necessary arrangements.

What is the school's responsibility?

The school must notify you of an unexplained absence in relation to your child as soon as practicable on the same day.

Schools will let you know either by your school's online communications app, SMS, phone call or email. If you can't be reached because the school does not have your correct contact details (i.e. changed phone number, SMS/email failure notification received etc.), the school will attempt to make contact with any emergency contact/s nominated on your child's file held by the school. Where possible, this contact will be made on the same day of the unexplained absence.

Where can I learn more about the process for managing student absences?

Ask your school for a copy of the *Attendance Policy* which outlines the school's processes and procedures for monitoring, recording and following-up of student absences.



Privacy Policy

SECONDARY SCHOOL ENROLMENT PRIVACY COLLECTION STATEMENT (PRIVACY INFORMATION FOR PARENTS AND CARERS)

During the ordinary course of your child's attendance at our school, school staff will collect your child's personal and health information when necessary to educate your child, or to support your child's social and emotional wellbeing or health. Such information will also be collected when required to fulfil a legal obligation, including duty of care, anti-discrimination law and occupational health and safety law. If that information is not collected, the school may be unable to provide optimal education or support to your child, or fulfil those legal obligations.

For example, health information may be collected through the school nurse or wellbeing staff member. If your child is referred to a specific health service at school, such as a Student Support Service Officer, or school-engaged psychologist, the required consent will be obtained.

Our school may use online tools, such as apps and other software, to effectively collect and manage information about your child for teaching and learning purposes, parent communication and engagement; student administration; and school management purposes. When our school uses these online tools, we take steps to ensure that your child's information is secure. If you have any concerns about the use of these online tools, please contact us.

School staff will only share your child's personal or health information with other staff who need to know to enable the school to educate or support your child, or fulfil a legal obligation.

When our students transfer to another Victorian government school, personal and health information about that student will be transferred to that next school. Transferring this information is in the best interest of our students and assists that next school to provide optimal education and support to students.

In some limited circumstances, information may be disclosed outside of the school (and outside of the Department of Education and Training). The school will seek your consent for such disclosures unless the disclosure is allowed or mandated by law

Our school values the privacy of every person. When collecting and managing personal and health information, all school staff must comply with Victorian privacy law. Throughout this notice, 'staff' includes Principal Class Officers, Teachers, Student Support Service officers, youth workers, social workers, nurses and any other allied health practitioners and all other staff at our school. This includes employees, agents and service providers of the Department, whether paid of unpaid.

Students on school premises Before School & After School

Please see below an extract from Wyndham Central College's Supervision and Duty of Care Policy

Supervision will include the following:

- Monitoring of entry or exit points and/or designated pick up and drop off areas
- Supervision of the arrival and departure of school contract buses

At Wyndham Central College yard duty supervision at the beginning of the school day will commence at **8.30am**. This supervision will include **Buses Location 1 and Buses Location 2**.

Yard duty supervision at the end of the school day will be provided until 3.30pm for all students. This supervision will include Buses Location 1, Buses Location 2, Shaw's Road near the Gate Location 7 each until 3.30pm.

DET – Detention Duty until 3.40pm.

Supervision is provided if students are needed for CAT/SAC resits until 4.15pm.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) drops off or otherwise arranges for a student to be on the school premises before supervision commences at the beginning of the day, the Principal or via the Assistant Principals or the Year Level Leading Teachers will, as soon as practicable, follow up with the parent, guardian and/or carer to:

- advise of the supervision arrangements before school, and
- request that the parent, guardian or carer make alternate arrangements.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) has failed to collect the student after school, the next steps may include some or all of the following:

- Attempting to contact the parents, guardians or carers
- Attempting to contact the emergency contacts
- Contacting the Victoria Police and/or the Department of Human Services (Child Protection) to arrange for the supervision, care and protection of the student.

Thank you in supporting our students to remain safe by following this policy.

School Nurse

A reminder to ensure all <u>medical plans</u> for your children are up to date. Please feel free to contact Ms. Claudia Jara, the School Nurse on 97414911 to discuss any medical needs. If students are unwell at school they are required to attend First Aid and the school nurse will then contact the family if it is deemed necessary. If your child calls you directly please tell them to go to First Aid for medical attention. If your child is being tested for COVID 19 please notify the college immediately and a clearance letter from the doctor needs to be sited before the student returns.

School Gates

The school gates are closed at 8.45 am to facilitate students arriving to class on time. Students must report to the administration area after 8:45 am, to obtain a late pass. Consequences for lateness may apply. Your child should have a note to explain a known lateness.

Bike storage at school

It is important that all bikes are locked onto the racks with a bike lock or padlock and chain. This message has been communicated to all students however we would appreciate it if you could remind your son/daughter of this requirement. A bike helmet is also a legal requirement. Please note: Skateboards and scooters are not allowed in the school grounds.

Emergency Management Plan

The Wyndham Central College Emergency Management Plan is tested regularly to ensure the safety of all students, staff and school visitors in the event of an emergency situation. As part of this plan we conduct four emergency drills per year, two lock down drills and two fire drills and students are made aware of when a drill is about to commence.

Second Hand Uniform

We are asking for your assistance with donations of any items of uniform that your child/children have grown out of or not using anymore. If you can assist, please drop off second hand uniforms to the front office and we will issue to other students within the college as necessary.

Students must pass English and then have 9 units to complete Year 11.

Year 12 Exams

Year 12 Progression

At the start of the year, I went over the requirements for students to successfully pass Year 12. I believe this is now a good time to revisit the expectations for completion of Year 12.

To achieve your VCE you must successfully complete 16 units including:

- three units from the English group, two of which must be a Unit 3 and 4 sequence.
- at least three additional Unit 3 and 4 sequences.

If a student does not meet the above expectations, they will be at risk of not gaining their VCE Certificate. If you have any questions, please contact me at the school.

Year 12 After school tutoring

Our school has been working with Empowered Tutoring for the past Semester to help support our Year 12 students with afterschool tutoring. Many students have decided to take up this offer of professional tutors to help support their learning in the classroom. This is a free service (Wyndham Central College is covering the costs) We are currently offering tutoring in the following subjects: Business Management, English, Further Maths, General Maths, Psychology, Chemistry, Biology and Physics.

As the Year 7-10 exams were rescheduled to the later dates, as above, teachers of Year 7-10 will not be able to include the exam results on the Semester 1 report by 25th June. Therefore, the Semester 1 reports will be reopened in week one of term three for Year 7-10 teachers to enter the exam results.

The Semester 1 reports with exam results will be then be made available to families with the exam results entered on 16th July. A Compass notification will be sent out to remind families to check their child's report for the exam marks.

I also recommend that parents encourage their children to attend or continue to attend Homework Club (run on Monday and Wednesday after school) which offers students support to complete their homework and/or revision.



CAMPS SPORTS & EXCURSION FUND (CSEF)

Please remember if your financial circumstances have changed and you now have a Health Care Card you are may be entitled to the Victorian State Government funding to families of \$225 that can be used towards the costs associated with camps, excursions and sporting events. These funds will be paid directly to the college and can only be used for these types of events/activities.

Eligibility Criteria

Camps, Sports and Excursion Fund (CSEF) application forms are available to:

- a parent/carer who holds either a Centrelink Health Care Card, a Pensioner Concession Card, or a Veterans Affairs Gold Card; or
- · a temporary foster carer; or
- a parent/carer of a student who is 16 years or older and who holds a valid concession card (such as a Youth Allowance Health Care Card or Disability Support Pension Card).

To be eligible for these funds in 2021 you must complete the application form (available from the administration office) and attach a copy of your eligible card which must be current as of the 27th January 2021.

Families who applied at our college for this in 2020 will NOT need to complete a new form as it will be an automatic process.

A new application will only be required in the following situations:

- If a family has a change to their financial situation and are now eligible
- If you are a new family to Wyndham Central College and are eligible
- If you are an existing family who has a new child starting in 2021

All applications are validated by CentreLink and if there is a discrepancy, families will be required to contact CentreLink directly.

CHANGE OF CONTACT DETAILS

If you have recently changed your contact details, living arrangements etc., please update them either through COMPASS or at the school, to ensure we can work together to support your child.

CAN WE ASSIST YOU WITH A PAYMENT PLAN?

In some cases families may require a little assistance to meet the financial obligations of education, even though at Wyndham Central College we endeavor to keep the costs associated with education down to a minimum. Pay family payments online fast, just enter the BPAY Biller Code, your reference number, the amount and the payment date, and you're done; this code is found on the your family statement. If you require a payment to be allocated to a particular item you will need to send an email to the college with your request before you make payment. Biller code and reference numbers now appear on your family statements.

A reminder to parents, when making a BPAY payment, could you please notify the College either by phone or email as soon as the payment has been made if there is a specific item you would like this payment to be allocated towards.



VISITORS TO THE SCHOOL

For the safety of staff and students, all visitors to the school must report to the front office (including parents) and log into Compass. In case of an emergency, we need to be aware of who is on site. Visitors will also need to check in via our QR code at the front office.

STUDENTS LEAVING SCHOOL EARLY

If your child needs to leave school early for an appointment, parents are required to send their child with a note in their planner advising the reason and time they need to leave. The student must take the note to their Year Level administration office in the morning to receive an early leaver's pass. This pass can then be shown to the teacher at the time they are leaving class and then also to the Attendance Officer located next to First Aid.



Get Active Kids Voucher Program – Round two

This Victorian-first program will offer up to 100,000 vouchers worth up to \$200 each across four rounds, helping kids from Victorian families with the cost of membership and registration fees, sports equipment and uniforms.

To be eligible, kids must be aged 4 to 18 years old, a resident in Victoria, named on a current Australian Government Health Care Card or Pensioner Concession Card and also named on a valid Australian Government Medicare Card at the time of application.

The Get Active Kids Voucher Program is also supporting sport clubs and active recreation providers to broaden their memberships and providing them with additional revenue to help recover from the impacts of the coronavirus.

If you are planning to get a job or if you would like to study at university or TAFE next year, you will need a TFN. You will need to apply for a TFN – these aren't issued automatically.

IPC Health HeadtoHelp Wyndham Vale Hub

In response to the significant impact the COVID-19 pandemic is having on the mental health of individuals and communities across Victoria, the Australian government has provided funding and 15 dedicated mental health HeadtoHelp clinics have been established across Victoria, with nine in Greater Melbourne and six in regional Victoria.

Who can contact HeadtoHelp?

The HeadtoHelp Service is for all Victorians. It is for anyone of any age experiencing emotional distress, mental ill-health and/or addiction along with their families and carers.

What type of support can you receive from HeadtoHelp?

The HeadtoHelp Service takes a holistic approach to mental health, whether someone has a mental ill-health history or it's the first time they have reached out for support.

The HeadtoHelp clinician will apply a personalised approach to understand the type of support an individual needs and draws upon the broad range of services available to identify which best suits their needs.

In the first instance, we will talk to the individual about their personal concerns and identify the support they need. We will then work with the individual to develop a package of support services suited to their individual situation. That support may be provided from within the HeadtoHelp Hub team, or we may refer to other health providers who are better suited to support the individual.

The Wyndham Vale HeadtoHelp Hub will provide:

- Personalised Intake service with a caring, holistic approach
- Counselling and support with our Mental Health Clinicians
- Social Prescribing support with our Wellbeing Coordinators
- Mental health group programs to support community needs

Is HeadtoHelp a telehealth service only or can you meet with someone face-to-face?

HeadtoHelp Hub is a face-to-face service providing a holistic approach to individuals mental health care. The Service is also a Virtual Hub that provides individuals the option of telephone and Health direct Video.

Are HeadtoHelp Services Free?

Yes, HeadtoHelp is a Free and Confidential Service. And, if we assess that an Individual will benefit from support from another service, we will ensure, where possible, this is also a free or low-cost service.

Do I have to go to my GP to get a mental health treatment plan before seeking HeadtoHelp services?

No, a Mental Health Plan is not required for an Individual to access HeadtoHelp support. Anyone can call HeadtoHelp, whether they already have a GP mental health treatment plan or not.

How do you contact your local HeadtoHelp Hub?

3 Entry Pathways for easy Service accessibility

- 1. Call **1800 595 212** and the Headtohelp Central Intake Clinician can identify your nearest HeadtoHelp Hub, or whether other, suitable support services are available in your area.
- 2. Visit the Wyndham Vale Hub Located at 510 Ballan Rd, Wyndham Vale and ask to speak to a HeadtoHelp Clinician.
- 3. Call the HeadtoHelp Wyndham Hub on 0370372105 and talk with a Hub clinician.

Who it is for

The HeadtoHelp service is open to Victorians of any age who may be experiencing distress or mental ill health. This includes people who have never accessed mental health services before and their family and friends. It also is for family and friends of those in aged care.

Where it is located

There are 15 HeadtoHelp hubs across the state. In the North Western Melbourne PHN region, our three hubs are located in the Wyndham LGA, Hume LGA and Inner Melbourne, but you can access services via phone no matter where you are.

How you can access

You can call HeadtoHelp on 1800 595 212 and we will help you find the support you need. Your GP or another health professional might also suggest you use the HeadtoHelp service.

How it works

When you call HeadtoHelp on 1800 595 212, an experienced mental health professional will listen and work with you to find the best ways to get you the help you need.

What help you receive

Depending on the assistance you need, we may connect you with online support or an existing mental health service, such as a GP, or other health or support service to get you back on track. The hubs can help you find a GP if you do not have one, as it's really important that your mental and physical health are looked after together.

Who is involved

The HeadtoHelp hub's multidisciplinary team has GPs and mental health workers, including psychologists, mental health nurses, social workers and alcohol and drug workers, who can support you through telehealth, or onsite at a hub.

What to expect

Your mental and physical wellbeing are linked, so the best way to improve your mental health is with a team-based approach that includes your GP. We can also help with the other essentials of life such as housing, work, education and training.
