REMINDER - PLEASE BE MINDFUL OF PARKING WHEN PICKING UP YOUR CHILDREN AND NOT BLOCK THE LOCAL NEIGHBOURS DRIVEWAYS AND THE SCHOOL BUSES

Please ensure your child follows the Mobile Phone Policy for All Schools Students

Victorian schools implemented a mobile phone policy in, 2020. This policy continues in 2021.

It helps focus students' attention on learning in the classroom by providing them with:

- (a) a safe environment to learn without inappropriate mobile phone use (including cyberbullying) or distractions
- (b) greater opportunities for social interaction and physical activity during recess and lunchtimes.

 The use of technology is important, but the risks and benefits from its use needs to be carefully managed. A summary of research articles is available via the resources named below. It provides the reason for the policy, including concerns about the impact of overuse of mobile phones on thinking and learning, health and wellbeing.

Students will still be able to bring a mobile phone to and from school, but it will need to be turned off and stored securely away in the school supplied lockers for the entire school day. Parents or carers can still contact their children through the school office in emergencies.

Families are asked to support your child to follow the mobile phone use policy and to support your children to become safe and responsible technology users.

Attendance / Non Attendance Process – Reminder

If your child has been absent please send a note with your child including their name, tutor class and reason within three working days to explain his/her absence. For further information please see the Attendance Policy on Compass or the Department of Education parent website.

Same-day notification of unexplained student absences

Fact sheet for parents/carers from the Department of Education

If your child is sick or absent, you are required to notify their school as soon as possible **on the day of absence** using one of the following methods:

- 1. Online: log the absence directly using our school's IT platform Compass
- 2. **Telephone:** the school's Attendance Officer, Mrs. Carol Mills on 9741 4911 (Option 1 for attendance) and let her know your child's name, class, date of absences and reason.
- 3. **Email:** your child's tutor teacher, via Compass and provide the staff with your child's name, class, date of absences and reason. Notifying the school of your child's absence either prior to, or on the day that they will be away, helps ensure the safety and wellbeing of children and will fulfil your legal responsibility.

Why do I need to notify the school if my child is absent?

Schools need to know when and why a child is absent and you need to know if your child isn't at school.

From the end of Term 2 2018, all Victorian government schools are required to contact parents/carers as soon as practicable on the same day of an unexplained student absence. If your child is absent on a particular day and you have not contacted the school to explain why, the absence will be marked as unexplained.

This system also promotes daily school attendance. Going to school every day is the single most important part of your child's education, they learn new things every day – missing school puts them behind.

What is your responsibility?

You are legally required to ensure your child attends school every day or you must provide an explanation for their absence. You should let the school know in advance of any upcoming absences or let them know in the morning if your child won't be at school. In order for schools to implement the same day notification requirement, it's essential that you provide the school with your most up-to-date contact details.

Generally one notification will be sent per family. Should there be circumstances that require both parents and carers to be notified, please contact the school to make the necessary arrangements.

What is the school's responsibility?

The school must notify you of an unexplained absence in relation to your child as soon as practicable on the same day.

Schools will let you know either by your school's online communications app, SMS, phone call or email. If you can't be reached because the school does not have your correct contact details (i.e. changed phone number, SMS/email failure notification received etc.), the school will attempt to make contact with any emergency contact/s nominated on your child's file held by the school. Where possible, this contact will be made on the same day of the unexplained absence.

Where can I learn more about the process for managing student absences?

Ask your school for a copy of the *Attendance Policy* which outlines the school's processes and procedures for monitoring, recording and following-up of student absences.

Privacy Policy

SECONDARY SCHOOL ENROLMENT PRIVACY COLLECTION STATEMENT (PRIVACY INFORMATION FOR PARENTS AND CARERS)

During the ordinary course of your child's attendance at our school, school staff will collect your child's personal and health information when necessary to educate your child, or to support your child's social and emotional wellbeing or health. Such information will also be collected when required to fulfil a legal obligation, including duty of care, anti-discrimination law and occupational health and safety law. If that information is not collected, the school may be unable to provide optimal education or support to your child, or fulfil those legal obligations.

For example, health information may be collected through the school nurse or wellbeing staff member. If your child is referred to a specific health service at school, such as a Student Support Service Officer, or school-engaged psychologist, the required consent will be obtained.

Our school may use online tools, such as apps and other software, to effectively collect and manage information about your child for teaching and learning purposes, parent communication and engagement; student administration; and school management purposes. When our school uses these online tools, we take steps to ensure that your child's information is secure. If you have any concerns about the use of these online tools, please contact us.

School staff will only share your child's personal or health information with other staff who need to know to enable the school to educate or support your child, or fulfil a legal obligation.

When our students transfer to another Victorian government school, personal and health information about that student will be transferred to that next school. Transferring this information is in the best interest of our students and assists that next school to provide optimal education and support to students.

In some limited circumstances, information may be disclosed outside of the school (and outside of the Department of Education and Training). The school will seek your consent for such disclosures unless the disclosure is allowed or mandated by law

Our school values the privacy of every person. When collecting and managing personal and health information, all school staff must comply with Victorian privacy law. For more information about privacy including about how to access personal and health information held by the school about you or your child, see our school's privacy policy:

Throughout this notice, 'staff' includes Principal Class Officers, Teachers, Student Support Service officers, youth workers, social workers, nurses and any other allied health practitioners and all other staff at our school. This includes employees, agents and service providers of the Department, whether paid of unpaid.

Students on school premises Before School & After School

Please see below an extract from Wyndham Central College's Supervision and Duty of Care Policy

Supervision will include the following:

- Monitoring of entry or exit points and/or designated pick up and drop off areas
- Supervision of the arrival and departure of school contract buses

At Wyndham Central College yard duty supervision at the beginning of the school day will commence at **8.30am**. This supervision will include **Buses Location 1 and Buses Location 2**.

Yard duty supervision at the end of the school day will be provided until 3.30pm for all students. This supervision will include Buses Location 1, Buses Location 2, Shaw's Road near the Gate Location 7 each until 3.30pm.

DET - Detention Duty until 3.40pm.

Supervision is provided if students are needed for CAT/SAC resits until 4.15pm.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) drops off or otherwise arranges for a student to be on the school premises before supervision commences at the beginning of the day, the Principal or via the Assistant Principals or the Year Level Leading Teachers will, as soon as practicable, follow up with the parent, guardian and/or carer to:

- advise of the supervision arrangements before school, and
- request that the parent, guardian or carer make alternate arrangements.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) has failed to collect the student after school, the next steps may include some or all of the following:

- Attempting to contact the parents, guardians or carers
- Attempting to contact the emergency contacts
- Contacting the Victoria Police and/or the Department of Human Services (Child Protection) to arrange for the supervision, care and protection of the student.

Thank you in supporting our students to remain safe by following this policy.

School Nurse

A reminder to ensure all <u>medical plans</u> for your children are up to date. Please feel free to contact Ms. Claudia Jara, the School Nurse on 97414911 to discuss any medical needs. If students are unwell at school, they are required to attend First Aid and the school nurse will then contact the family if it is deemed necessary. If your child calls you directly, please tell them to go to First Aid for medical attention. If your child is being tested for COVID 19 please notify the college immediately and a clearance letter from the doctor needs to be sited before the student returns.

School Gates

The school gates are closed at 8.45 am to facilitate students arriving to class on time. Students must report to the administration area after 8:45 am, to obtain a late pass. Consequences for lateness may apply. Your child should have a note to explain a known lateness.

Bike storage at school

It is important that all bikes are locked onto the racks with a bike lock or padlock and chain. This message has been communicated to all students however we would appreciate it if you could remind your son/daughter of this requirement. A bike helmet is also a legal requirement. Please note: Skateboards and scooters are not allowed in the school grounds.

Emergency Management Plan

The Wyndham Central College Emergency Management Plan is tested regularly to ensure the safety of all students, staff and school visitors in the event of an emergency situation. As part of this plan we conduct four emergency drills per year, two lock down drills and two fire drills and students are made aware of when a drill is about to commence.

Secondhand Uniform

We are asking for your assistance with donations of any items of uniform that your child/children have grown out of or not using anymore. If you can assist, please drop off secondhand uniforms to the front office and we will issue to other students within the college as necessary.

YEAR'S 7, 8 & 9 REPORT

Welcome back to Term 3, we would like to thank all of our students, parents and staff for their continued support and commitment throughout the learning from home time we recently encountered and are encountering again. It is fantastic to see the way everyone adapts so quickly, minimising interruption and continuing our students learning. We are hoping this latest lockdown will be of short duration and that our students will be able to return and continue the term back in the classroom.

When we return, we would like families to continue to support the school in ensuring that students are at school in correct school uniform. YEAR 10 REPORT

Lockdown 6.0!

For our Year 10 Wyndham Central College students, it has been a stressful and challenging time since Term break with brief moments onsite and then the flip back into remote learning, however they have been working hard while in remote learning and should be commended on their efforts. For those families struggling with remote learning, developing effective strategies is the key for success:

1.Make an intentional study space

One of the downsides of remote learning is the potential for distractions.

When a student has to study at the dining room table, it can be hard to concentrate. If possible, create a dedicated spot representing the "school zone" free from noise and distractions — even if it's just a corner of a room! If multiple students are learning from home, designating different areas for study hours can help reduce disruptions.



2. Get the right gear

If your student does not have a laptop, please make contact with their tutor teacher to arrange a loan of one from IT.

Headphones are also helpful as classes running of TEAMS will often require student participation. Pens, pencils, notebooks are also essential for a productive workspace. Also ensure phones and other distractions are not in the study zone for students to become distracted by.



3. Take in-between-class breaks

On campus, class bells, lunch and locker stops create set pauses in the school day. When studying at home, these reminders may be absent. Breaks are crucial for mental and physical well-being, so encourage your child between their scheduled classes to remove themselves from their screens, get something to eat and stretch.



4. Head outside



During breaks, students should get outside and walk. Not only does staying indoors for too long deprive a person from much-needed sun, sitting in one place for too long may lead to strain on eyes, neck, shoulders, back — and mood. After all, exercise helps behaviour, confidence and mood, as well as cognition. So, encourage your child to stay active!

5. Ask for help

Studying remotely can be a convenient way to learn for some high schoolers, but it can also be a tougher transition for many. A lot of adolescents don't like to ask for help, but distance learning often works best when reaching out, whether academically or socially. Isolation can be the enemy of learning. Asking for help, whether from a parent, teacher, friend or tutor, can help connect students with others, as well as connect the dots on that math homework!

The Fit to Drive Foundation is a not for profit organisation dedicated to reducing road trauma in young people. They will be coming to the school to provide workshops that will focus on building the capacity of young people to make good decisions when faced with risky situations on our roads, whether as a passenger or a driver.

At the end of last term, semester one reports were distributed. As a reminder if you have not seen these reports, that families can log in COMPASS and access them. Students need to satisfy the unit requirements of VCE/VCAL and this first set of reports will give us an indication on how students are progressing. Students must pass English and then must have 9 units to complete Year 11. I have been in contact with families as to any concerns I have, but I encourage families to contact tutor teachers and classroom teacher for any concerns you may have.

The Year 11 Psychology students went to the Melbourne Zoo last term. The excursion allowed students to further develop and apply and understand ethical principles, to communicate scientific ideas and understand the scientific process and assess the strengths and limitations of science.









At the end of term, each teacher nominates students in their class who had outstanding academic achievement and another student for an endeavour award. The academic award recognises the student who have achieved the highest scores on assessments. The endeavour award recognises a student who is up to date with all their work, tries their best in every lesson and acts on feedback. Congratulations to all students who received an award, we will present these awards when we can hold our next assembly.

GAT – Parent Teacher Interviews – VTAC Parent Information Night

The GAT which was scheduled for 12th August has been postponed due to this current lockdown. As soon as the College has been advised of a new date, it will be communicated to you.

Parent Teacher Interviews will occur on 12th August for Year 12 students only . This will be done via TEAMs and all bookings are made via Compass. The interviews start at 4pm until 7pm and we hope to see all parents there meeting with your students' subject teachers.

During the Parent Teacher Interviews we will also be hosting the VTAC Parent Information Presentation, which will be via TEAMs. Ms Kathy Karlovic will outline the process for students to apply to universities and TAFEs for next year and start the application process. Students were presented the VTAC presentation last week, but it is important to open this to parents and carers for any questions or concerns to help support their student.

Connect Education

Students will be provided with a 3-hour workshop that is delivered by recently graduated students who scored top ATAR scores in each subject. The presenters will provide insights into the subjects, revision materials, booklets, notes, study planners and study guide techniques that helped them achieve their high scores. We are also looking in to extending this program into other subject areas for Term 4. All students are currently enrolled in the below subjects and are scored must attend their workshops.

We are well into Semester 2 and in the midst of another busy term. Even with the COVID lock down disruptions, students have shown much adaptability and resilience.

Report Reflections and Goal setting

At the conclusion of each term, students review their Term/Semester report, self- assess and reflect on areas of strength and weakness and set goals to ensure and maximise their success for the forthcoming term. As parents we ask you to support your students by encouraging them to revisit these goals regularly and ensure that they are on track to achieve them. Parents can support this by having conversations with their child about their goals for this term and encouraging the benefits of perseverance with tasks they may find challenging.

Learning Catch up and Extension

The College facilitates many programs and initiatives to assist your child to maximise their achievement, no matter where they are on their learning continuum.

These include:

The Tutor Learning Initiative- this semester we will continue the work commenced in semester one and the College has employed 10 tutors to provide additional support to students in the classroom.

Quicksmart- a 30-week program to accelerate confidence, skills and knowledge in math or literacy for students at year 7 and 8. Students in the program attend three thirty-minute sessions with our Quicksmart leaders.

The Enhancement Program- at year 7 and 8, students are grouped into flexible groups that enable teachers to target and assist students to grow and extend in specific skills during their enhancement session once per week.

Middle Years Literacy and Numeracy Support (MYLNS) Program- at years 10 and 8, teachers increase the scaffolding of all units and key skills and knowledge to benefit the learning of all students and set specific targets for students to achieve. In 2022, this program will expand to students in years 8, 9 and 10.

Enrichment Series - Teachers actively seek out programs via the Department of Education's Enrichment Series link that relates to their curriculum area. These allow the students to experience motivational, real life experiences that support students to increase their engagement and extend their skills and knowledge.

Victorian High Ability Program (VHAP) - This program involves high ability students in year 7 and 8, selected by the Department of Education and Training and aims to extend students.

Year 12 Tutoring Program- all year 12 students have the opportunity to participate in the afterschool tutoring program. Students participate in small group tutoring in their specific subjects.

A Strategy for Success: Ongoing Revision and Cornell notes

As an AVID school, teachers support students to continue to build their ability to effectively complete all steps of the Cornell note-taking system. We ask Parents/ Guardians to support and encourage your child at home with completing the Cornell note steps using the 10-24-7 method. That is, reviewing and revising the day's notes every night, formulating questions the next night and creating summaries at the end of the week. This is a well know and well-researched method of supporting students to achieve success. It increases students' confidence and improves exam results.

Organisation is also important for success and students are required to ensure that they have a well- organised binder that they bring to all classes. This ensures that they have all equipment and work is kept together.

Homework Club

A reminder that Wyndham Central College offers Homework Club every Monday and Wednesdays in the Monash Building from 3:10 pm to 4:20 pm. Homework Club is facilitated by experienced classroom teachers and provides support to students who self- nominate to attend. Teachers support students who may be having difficulty with their classwork, assignments, homework or who like a place and space in which to work that is supported by teacher assistance if required. Please encourage your child/children to attend Homework Club and use this valuable resource.

JAPANESE NEWS

2021 Olympic Connect 'Tomodachi 2021' Cultural Exchange Online Lessons







The Olympic Connect 'Tomodachi 2021' program is a joint initiative between The Australian Embassy in Tokyo and Japanese partners through the AUS+RALLY sports diplomacy initiative. The program, Tomodachi 2021, translates as Friends 2021, signifying the foundation of the program being built on friendship and relationship building between countries. It allows thousands of school children to feel the Olympic spirit through sports diplomacy activities. Through this initiative Wyndham Central College was paired with Ritsumeikan Keisho Junior and Senior School in Hokkaido, Japan.

On Monday 12th July, students from both schools participated in the first of two online lessons and played a game of 'sports charades.' WCC's Year 9 Japanese students performed actions from popular Australian sports and Ritsumeikan Keisho students performed actions from sports typically played in Japan. Students had to guess the sport based on the actions presented by each student. Some of the sports included: cricket, rugby, swimming, kendo, sumo, and karate, amongst others. Ristumeikan Keisho students also presented a school tour, performed a traditional folk song and dance called 'Soran Bushi' which was originally performed by ancient fishermen in Hokkaido to stay strong on long fishing trips. Ristumeikan Keisho students also performed the 'karate no kata' (detailed patterns of movement in karate). This was followed by a 'shitsumon ko-na-' (question corner) where students from each country asked each other questions about school and everyday life.

Students from both schools thoroughly enjoyed the lesson and the chance to communicate with each other in their target languages as well as share their cultures with each other. A letter of gratitude was sent to our students from a Ritsumeikan Keisho student which read as follows:

"Dear Wyndham Central Secondary Collage students,

Thank you so much for today! I had a lot of fun!!

I introduced the school library. I didn't participate in the gesture game, but I was happy to learn about Australian and Japanese sports through the gesture game!

Gesture games were fun and I want to communicate with them (students) again.

Cricket is not a familiar sport for the Japanese, so I want to try it next time!!

I've always been interested in Australian culture since I was in eleven years old. And I wanted to make friends too!

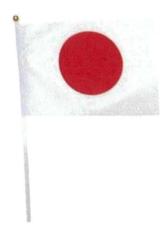
If you don't mind, please be friends!! Thank you."

CAMPS SPORTS & EXCURSION FUND (CSEF)

Please remember if your financial circumstances have changed and you now have a Health Care Card you are may be entitled to the Victorian State Government funding to families of \$225 that can be used towards the costs associated with camps, excursions and sporting events. These funds will be paid directly to the college and can only be used for these types of events/activities.

Eligibility Criteria

Camps, Sports and Excursion Fund (CSEF) application forms are available to:

- a parent/carer who holds either a Centrelink Health Care Card, a Pensioner Concession Card, or a Veterans Affairs Gold Card; or
- · a temporary foster carer; or
- a parent/carer of a student who is 16 years or older and who holds a valid concession card (such as a Youth Allowance Health Care Card or Disability Support Pension Card).

To be eligible for these funds in 2021 you must complete the application form (available from the administration office) and attach a copy of your eligible card which must be current as of the 27th January 2021.

Families who applied at our college for this in 2020 will NOT need to complete a new form as it will be an automatic process.

A new application will only be required in the following situations:

- If a family has a change to their financial situation and are now eligible
- If you are a new family to Wyndham Central College and are eligible
- If you are an existing family who has a new child starting in 2021

All applications are validated by CentreLink and if there is a discrepancy, families will be required to contact CentreLink directly.

CHANGE OF CONTACT DETAILS

If you have recently changed your contact details, living arrangements etc., please update them either through COMPASS or at the school, to ensure we can work together to support your child.

CAN WE ASSIST YOU WITH A PAYMENT PLAN?

ATTENDANCE FACT SHEET FOR SECONDARY SCHOOL STUDENTS

School is better when you're here

DO I HAVE TO GO TO SCHOOL?

Yes. Victoria school is compulsory until you turn 17.

Missing one day a fortnight is the same as missing 4 whole weeks of school a year.

From Foundation to Year 12 that adds up to 1.5 years of school.

Apart from this, school is better when you attend. Your friends and your teachers notice that you're away and wonder if you're OK.

WHY IS IMPORTANT THAT I GO TO SCHOOL EVERY DAY?

Right now, being at school is your most important job. You're building habits that you'll take into adulthood.

While it might not seem obvious, when you come to school you are learning about more than just Maths and English. You're learning all sorts of skills like working in teams and meeting deadlines that will help when you're an adult.

If you can't show up to school every day, how will you learn to show up for work?

Being at school every day also means you are involved in your own learning, interacting with other students and teachers and are a part of environment that is motivating and stimulating.

You can get help from your teachers and friends and won't have to rely on trying to learn things in your own time.

There is also a lot of evidence that shows that young people who attend school more frequently have better outcomes after school too.

This means they earn more money, have better job prospects, are less likely to misuse drugs and alcohol and are generally healthier.

DO I NEED TO LET SCHOOL KNOW IF I'M GOING TO BE AWAY?

Yes. Your parents need to notify the school of your absence as soon as they can within three days of your absence. If they know you are going to be away, they should try to tell the school before the day or days you are away. The school then decides if the absence is approved or not according to their attendance policy.

If you aren't at school, and the school hasn't heard from your parents, they now have to try and contact them as soon as possible on the day that you're away.







If you're away from school too much and don't have a reasonable excuse like a serious illness, your parents can also get in trouble.

Many schools have their own attendance requirements as well. This means you might pass a subject academically but fail it if you've missed too many classes. This is especially the case with VCE and VCAL.

You need to find out what your school's attendance policy is so you aren't unintentionally getting into trouble.

ARE THERE ANY GOOD REASONS TO BE AWAY FROM SCHOOL?

Basically, no. Unless you are so sick you can't get out of bed or there is an event like a funeral, you should be at school. Every day you are away is a day of classes and social connection you miss out on.

Even medical and health appointments should be made either before or after school or during the school holidays. This includes family holidays. Your parents are encouraged not to plan holidays during the term but to organise these during the school holidays.

If you do have to be away for some reason, your parents need to contact the school and let them know what's going on. Depending on the situation, the school might provide schoolwork for you to complete.

IF I'M NOT AT SCHOOL, WHAT DO I MISS OUT ON?

You miss out on all the big stuff - class discussions and all the interaction that happens in a classroom, the chance to get help from teachers and the opportunity to practice skills and gain knowledge. Being away means you miss out on the content altogether or that you need to catch up in your time.

If all of that isn't enough to convince you to be at school every day, being away also means you also miss out hanging out with your friends. Being away from school a lot can be lonely. It has a big impact on relationships and social connections. Believe it or not, everyone wants you at school and it really is better when you attend.

WHAT IF I'M HAVING PROBLEMS GETTING TO SCHOOL?

Sometimes getting to school can be about having a good routine. If you find yourself running late or missing school because you're disorganised, try:

- Having a set time to go to bed
- Being really disciplined with technology turn it off or better yet, leave it out of your room altogether. You can catch up on the all the chat and the latest episode of whatever you're watching later on
- Packing your bag the night before







- Having a set time for breakfast
- Planning to meet up with a friend so you can travel to school together.

Sometimes though it can be hard to get to school. You might feel overwhelmed by the work or things might be tough with your friends. Maybe you really dislike a teacher or things at home aren't great. Perhaps you're feeling down or anxious and don't even really know why.

Whatever the situation is, staying away from school isn't the answer. There are lots of people who want to help. Try talking to:

- Your parents or another adult family member
- A trusted teacher
- Your year level coordinator
- Wellbeing Coordinator or the school counsellor
- Another trusted adult like your coach
