A printed copy will be available to all students and their families for our Parent/Teacher interviews this coming Thursday afternoon the 7th of April from 4pm-7pm in person, and Friday the 8th of April from 9.30am – 2:30pm on Microsoft Teams.

A reminder that all parent/carers are able to make an interview time with our staff via Compass. If you have any difficulties do not hesitate to contact our ICT support team or your child's tutor teacher.

It is important for parents/carers, students and teachers to continue to work in partnership to support children's learning journeys and these interviews are an opportunity to meet your child's 2022 teachers. Due to the 2020/21 restrictions, we have not been able to conduct all of our parent/carer meetings or transition processes and our 2022 term one, week 3, 'Meet and Greet' sessions and BBQ were also cancelled. Therefore, this is our opportunity to meet once again and re-establish these important parent partnerships in supporting our students in their educational journeys.

At all other times it is important to continue to communicate with the school and this can always be done via COMPASS email or by phone with our classroom teachers, tutor teachers or year level leaders. A student planner can also be a valuable tool. Each student has a planner that should be bought to each class along with the student binder and a fully charged laptop.

Please ensure your child follows the Mobile Phone Policy for All Schools Students

Victorian schools implemented a mobile phone policy in, 2020. This policy continues in 2022.

It helps focus students' attention on learning in the classroom by providing them with:

- (a) a safe environment to learn without inappropriate mobile phone use (including cyberbullying) or distractions
- (b) greater opportunities for social interaction and physical activity during recess and lunchtimes.

The use of technology is important, but the risks and benefits from its use needs to be carefully managed. A summary of research articles is available via the resources named below. It provides the reason for the policy, including concerns about the impact of overuse of mobile phones on thinking and learning, health and wellbeing.

Students will still be able to bring a mobile phone to and from school, but it will need to be turned off and stored securely away in the school supplied lockers for the entire school day. Parents or carers can still contact their children through the school office in emergencies.

Families are asked to support your child to follow the mobile phone use policy and to support your children to become safe and responsible technology users. This is a Victorian Government regulation.

Staying COVID safe

Vital COVIDSafe steps

- Social distancing
- Limit mixing with other year levels
- Maintain physical distancing
- Limit to non-essential visitors and density limits in common areas
- Wash hands regularly and at key points
- Get a test even with the mildest of symptoms
- Isolate until you receive your test results



Rapid Antigen Test Kits (RAT tests)

RAT tests continue to be distributed to all students. It is highly recommended that your child takes a test on a **Monday and Wednesday morning** and continues to do so weekly until the end of Term. More information will be provided for Term 2.

If you are positive

If your child receives a positive result at any time you must report this to the school and Department of Health immediately.

You must report a positive result to the Department of Health via their system (Rapid antigen tests | Coronavirus Victoria) (link) or via the coronavirus hotline at 1800 675 398.

Students (or their parents) must also report a positive result to their school, either through the COVID Test <u>portal</u> (link) or by phone on 97417911 or written notification. This is so the school can support students, record that they will be absent while in 7-day isolation, and let the rest of the school community know there has been a positive case onsite and that they should monitor for symptoms.

Please note that a student will not be identified when communicating with the school community.

Any student who has tested positive for COVID-19, and has completed their 7-day isolation period and are subsequently asymptomatic (no symptoms) do not need to undertake surveillance testing for 30 days.

All students and staff who return a positive result from a rapid antigen test should also follow the latest advice at https://www.coronavirus.vic.gov.au/rapid-antigen-tests. (link)

Attendance / Non Attendance Process – Reminder

If your child has been absent please send a note with your child including their name, tutor class and reason within three working days to explain his/her absence. For further information please see the Attendance Policy on Compass or the Department of Education parent website.



Fact sheet for parents/carers from the Department of Education

If your child is sick or absent, you are required to notify their school as soon as possible **on the day of absence** using one of the following methods:

- 1. Online: log the absence directly using our school's IT platform Compass
- 2. **Telephone:** the school's Attendance Officer, Mrs. Carol Mills on 9741 4911 (Option 1 for attendance) and let her know your child's name, class, date of absences and reason.
- 3. **Email:** your child's tutor teacher, via Compass and provide the staff with your child's name, class, date of absences and reason. Notifying the school of your child's absence either prior to, or on the day that they will be away, helps ensure the safety and wellbeing of children and will fulfil your legal responsibility.

Why do I need to notify the school if my child is absent?

Schools need to know when and why a child is absent and you need to know if your child isn't at school.

From the end of Term 2 2018, all Victorian government schools are required to contact parents/carers as soon as practicable on the same day of an unexplained student absence. If your child is absent on a particular day and you have not contacted the school to explain why, the absence will be marked as unexplained.

This system also promotes daily school attendance. Going to school every day is the single most important part of your child's education, they learn new things every day – missing school puts them behind.

What is your responsibility?

You are legally required to ensure your child attends school every day or you must provide an explanation for their absence. You should let the school know in advance of any upcoming absences or let them know in the morning if your child won't be at school. In order for schools to implement the same day notification requirement, it's essential that you provide the school with your most up-to-date contact details.

Generally one notification will be sent per family. Should there be circumstances that require both parents and carers to be notified, please contact the school to make the necessary arrangements.

What is the school's responsibility?

The school must notify you of an unexplained absence in relation to your child as soon as practicable on the same day. Schools will let you know either by your school's online communications app, SMS, phone call or email. If you can't be reached because the school does not have your correct contact details (i.e. changed phone number, SMS/email failure notification received etc.), the school will attempt to make contact with any emergency contact/s nominated on your child's file held by the school. Where possible, this contact will be made on the same day of the unexplained absence.

Where can I learn more about the process for managing student absences?

Ask your school for a copy of the *Attendance Policy* which outlines the school's processes and procedures for monitoring, recording and following-up of student absences.

Students on school premises Before School & After School

Please see below an extract from Wyndham Central College's Supervision and Duty of Care Policy

Supervision will include the following:

- Monitoring of entry or exit points and/or designated pick up and drop off areas
- Supervision of the arrival and departure of school contract buses

At Wyndham Central College yard duty supervision at the beginning of the school day will commence at **8.30am**. This supervision will include **Buses Location 1 and Buses Location 2**.

Yard duty supervision at the end of the school day will be provided until 3.30pm for all students. This supervision will include Buses Location 1, Buses Location 2, Shaw's Road near the Gate Location 7 each until 3.30pm.

DET – Detention Duty until 3.40pm.

Supervision is provided if students are needed for CAT/SAC resits until 4.15pm.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) drops off or otherwise arranges for a student to be on the school premises before supervision commences at the beginning of the day, the Principal or via the Assistant Principals or the Year Level Leading Teachers will, as soon as practicable, follow up with the parent, guardian and/or carer to:

- advise of the supervision arrangements before school, and
- request that the parent, guardian or carer make alternate arrangements.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) has failed to collect the student after school, the next steps may include some or all of the following:

- Attempting to contact the parents, guardians or carers
- Attempting to contact the emergency contacts
- Contacting the Victoria Police and/or the Department of Human Services (Child Protection) to arrange for the supervision, care and protection of the student.

Thank you in supporting our students to remain safe by following this policy.

School Nurse

A reminder to ensure all <u>medical plans</u> for your children are up to date. Please feel free to contact Ms. Claudia Jara, the School Nurse on 97414911 to discuss any medical needs. If students are unwell at school, they are required to attend First Aid and the school nurse will then contact the family if it is deemed necessary. If your child calls you directly, please tell them to go to First Aid for medical attention. If your child is being tested for COVID 19 please notify the college immediately and a clearance letter from the doctor needs to be sited before the student returns.

School Gates

The school gates are closed at 8.45 am to facilitate students arriving to class on time. Students must report to the administration area after 8:45 am, to obtain a late pass. Consequences for lateness may apply. Your child should have a note to explain a known lateness.

Bike storage at school

It is important that all bikes are locked onto the racks with a bike lock or padlock and chain. This message has been communicated to all students however we would appreciate it if you could remind your son/daughter of this requirement. A bike helmet is also a legal requirement. Please note: Skateboards and scooters are not allowed in the school grounds.

Emergency Management Plan

The Wyndham Central College Emergency Management Plan is tested regularly to ensure the safety of all students, staff and school visitors in the event of an emergency situation. As part of this plan we conduct four emergency drills per year, two lock down drills and two fire drills and students are made aware of when a drill is scheduled.

Secondhand Uniform

We are asking for your assistance with donations of any items of uniform that your child/children have grown out of or not using anymore. If you can assist, please drop off secondhand uniforms to the front office and we will issue to other students within the college as necessary. Thank you for your support.

YEAR'S 10, 11 & 12 REPORT

I would like to encourage all parents/carers to attend the parent/teacher interviews on Thursday 7th April from 4pm-7pm (at the College) and on Friday 8th April from 9:30am -2:30pm (on Microsoft Teams) and more information will be provided to you on this.

The interviews will provide vital feedback on the progress of your child and strategies for support and improvement will be discussed.

All students were given a college planner (diary) at the commencement of the year and I encourage all parents to look through this planner and support your child to use it for writing in important dates and homework. Please also use and check the planner for two-way communication, between the school and home.

I would like to remind parents about the College promotion policy and that students must maintain a satisfactory attendance of 100% in all subject areas, unless ill. If senior students are absent on the day of a SAC, then they must provide a doctor's certificate to be able to re-sit the SAC for a scored assessment.

In the best interest of students' academic progress, please note that it is not possible to make subject changes this far into the year. We have an informative course selection process that we involve students and parents/carers with which also involves parents in signing off on the subjects offered.

Please assist the College by ensuring that your son/daughter wears the correct school uniform. It is the policy of the College that all students wear our school uniform with pride. This is in keeping with our aim of developing in students a feeling of belonging, respect and a sense of identity. The positive image that the College presents to the community is important to us. Students must wear the uniform on each school day, to and from school and the uniform must be always presentable.

In accordance with the Department's Mobile phone policy, issued by the Minister for Education, personal mobile phones must not be used at Wyndham Central College during school hours (8.50am-3.04pm), including break times unless an exception has been granted. As we draw to the end of the term, its perfect timing to remind students and families that there are clear guidelines in place in regards to VCE promotion. We have just implemented a new 'Senior At Risk Process' that will support students in taking ownership of their learning, a way for myself to track students who may be struggling and a way for parents to be informed as to how your child is progressing. The At Risk is broken into 3 levels; At Risk Level 1, At Risk Level 2 and At Risk Level 3.

At Risk Level 1 is when your student has not completed the course work for the outcome. A list of the outstanding coursework will be emailed to the student and parents.

At Risk Level 2 is when your student may not have completed the work from At Risk 1 or a practice assessment has been completed and has indicated that the student is not progressing towards a satisfactory result.

At Risk Level 3 is when the student has not passed the SAC/or SAT this will be followed with an opportunity to redeem with a satisfactory result.

In order for students to progress from Year 11 to Year 12 they must satisfactory complete at least nine units including the two units of English. They also must have satisfactory attendance.

You will be receiving reports soon, and it's very important that you have discussions around your students progress to make sure they are satisfying all requirements. I encourage families to make appointments during Parent Teacher Interviews coming up, to discuss any concerns with your students teachers.

Year 11 students will receive holiday homework across the next break, it is important students stay on top of all work. It is important to have a break as well, but VCE is a demanding year, so please make sure all work is completed.

I hope you all have a great Easter Break and I look forward to what Term 2 brings for our Year 11 students.

TEACHING & LEARNING REPORT

Learning catch up and extension

The College teaching and learning focus continues to be on learning catch- up and extension. Teachers have been focusing on ensuring all students have the essential skills and knowledge in each of their subject areas. Teachers are also monitoring students and supporting them to make the next steps in their learning.

We support students in a number of programs to assist learning catch up and extension. Among these are the MYLNS program, Year 12 external tutors, the Enhancement Program, the Tutor Learning Initiative and the Quicksmart program, all of which support the focus on learning catch up and extension. Furthermore, Homework Club provides learning support for students every Monday and Wednesday from 3:10pm to 4:00pm.

Students have been working with their classroom teachers over this term and have completed assessment tasks in all their subjects as part of their learning program.

The term 1 reports will be available online via Compass from 6th April. Hard copies of reports will be distributed to students on Wednesday 6th April as part of the Student's Report Reflection session. Please ask your child for their report after school on Wednesday 6th April. We invite all parents to make interview times on Compass to discuss your child's progress. Parents can book their conferences from Friday 25th March at 3pm – Friday 6th April at 3pm.

Details about how to book your Parent – Student- Teacher Conference and how to join an online Parent – Student - Teacher Conference has been provided in a separate correspondence. Please contact the College if you have any questions or need support with this process.

NAPLAN ONLINE 2022

All Year 7 and 9 students will be participating in NAPLAN Online from 10– 20 May 2022. The NAPLAN test is used by the College to support student learning.

Exemptions may be granted to students with significant intellectual disabilities and to students who have been learning English for less than one year. If your child is eligible for support due to disability or exemption, you should discuss this with his/her teacher prior to the tests. Signed parental consent is required before exemption is granted and this must be done prior to the testing period.

Students may be withdrawn from NAPLAN by their parent or carer. This is a matter for consideration by parents and carers in consultation with the principal. If, after consultation, you decide to withdraw your child, you must sign a Student Withdrawal form before your child can be granted withdrawal. These forms are available at the school and must be completed and submitted to the school prior to the testing period.

Students will be given the opportunity to practice and familiarise themselves with the NAPLAN online test. Parents can help familiarise their child with the tests by using the ACARA website. http://www.nap.edu.au/online-assessment/public-demonstration-site (link)

Additionally, parents can support their child by encouraging their child to do their best on each of the tests so that the test is a true indication of your child's ability and reflects their strengths and areas for improvement. Parents can also support by ensuring that your child has enough sleep and a healthy breakfast so that they can perform to the best of their ability and demonstrate their true skills and knowledge in NAPLAN.

Having an accurate reflection of your child's skills and knowledge will support teachers in our work of knowing where your child is on the learning continuum and support teachers to plan educational programs to move your child along this learning continuum successfully.

Science News

Yr-10 students launched their Rockets as part of their CAT for their first unit on Force and Motion.

A big idea behind this unit, is enabling students to use higher order thinking skills. Students were challenged to create a rocket and its safe landing. They needed to be able to understand concepts surrounding Physics and Mathematics, and how to correctly apply to the creation of their Rocket.

Students completed their own inquiry-based learning which enabled them to explore different possibilities within a safe and controlled environment. They learnt about application of different types force on a rocket and principles of aerodynamics. This unit and CAT focused on the integration of science, technology, engineering and mathematics. Within the unit, it enables students to see the real-life connection between what they are learning in the classroom and what work anyone does around e.g. aerospace.

Supportive Classroom Environment with this unit of work, students were encouraged to be proactive in the completion of their own group project. For students to be able to successfully complete the task, they were required to work together being socially and academically supportive whilst keeping each other safe and motivated.

What is the Premier's Reading Challenge?



Many of our families and staff celebrated this special day. Happy Holi!




Environmental Club Request

Please note that if your financial circumstances have changed and you now have a Health Care Card you may be entitled to the Victorian State Government funding to families of up to \$225 that can be used towards costs associated with camps, excursions and sporting events. These funds will be paid directly to the college and can only be used for these types of events/activities.

Eligibility Criteria

Camps, Sports and Excursion Fund (CSEF) application forms are available to:

- a parent/carer who holds either a Centrelink Health Care Card, a Pensioner Concession Card, or a Veterans Affairs Gold Card: or
- a temporary foster carer; or
- a parent/carer of a student who is 16 years or older and who holds a valid concession card (such as a Youth Allowance Health Care Card or Disability Support Pension Card).

To be eligible for these funds in 2022 you must complete the application form (available from the administration office) and attach a copy of your eligible card which must be current as of the 31st of January 2022. Families who applied at our college for this in 2021 will NOT need to complete a new form as it will be an automatic process.

A new application will only be required in the following situations:

- If a family has a change to their financial situation and are now eligible
- If you are a new family to Wyndham Central College and are eligible
- If you are an existing family who has a new child starting in 2022

All applications are validated by CentreLink and if there is a discrepancy, families will be required to contact CentreLink directly.

VISITORS TO THE SCHOOL

For the safety of staff and students, all visitors to the school must report to the front office (including parents) and log into Compass. In case of an emergency, we need to be aware of who is on site. Visitors will also need to check in via our QR code at the front office. Please follow social distancing rules and wear your mask when entering the College.

STUDENTS LEAVING SCHOOL EARLY

If your child needs to leave school early for an appointment, parents are required to send their child with a note in their planner advising the reason and time they need to leave. The student must take the note to the Attendance office (located next to First Aid) in the morning to receive an early leaver's pass. This pass can then be shown to the teacher at the time they are leaving class and then also to the Attendance Officer.


