Parent Bulletin

This newsletter is additional to the weekly information provided in the Parent Bulletin emailed each Monday.

Your continued support to ensure your children are not bringing incorrect clothing items to school helps the college reduce unnecessary conflict between students and staff who are expected to implement our school council and Department of Education policies. As always it is important for every child to wear the college uniform with pride whilst at school, to and from school, and whilst representing the college in the community.

Parent Teacher interviews

It was wonderful to see so many families attending our parent/teacher interviews at the end of term one either in person or online so that our staff were able to share the progress of students and together set learning goals within Individual Education Plans to support all students to continue to develop. I hope the guidance and support from teachers will help students to improve and reach their full academic potential. Feedback is very important along with a growth mindset and endeavour, so that improvement is possible.

The college continues to offer families ways to communicate with classroom and tutor teachers and Year level staff to ensure a successful term two. This can be done via Compass email and by visiting or by telephoning the college. As we know when parents/carers are actively involved in conversations with their sons/daughters about their education the outcomes are far more positive. When this is combined in a three-way partnership with teachers the outcomes and opportunities are far better.

Currently our Years 7 and 9 cohorts are completing their NAPLAN tests using the online format and it is important that students continue to try their best to show how they have grown in their knowledge and skills in reading, writing and numeracy over the previous two years. Students are reminded to always have their fully charged school laptop at school to support their learning. Naplan results will be available to families in term three.

Students from years 7 through to 12 are also currently completing the Attitudes to Schools opinion survey in an online format over the coming weeks. The College values the input of all students and will once again be using the survey results to ensure that we continue to improve our programs and whole school learning environment. We have always valued student feedback, and we encourage our students to continue to provide feedback throughout the school year via the Student Representative Council (SRC) and via our teaching and learning classroom surveys called PIVOT. Students can give direct feedback to their teachers about the learning occurring in their classrooms which will support the continuation of best practice in teaching and learning in all our classrooms.

Good luck to all students from years 7 through to 12 as they prepare for the examination period during May and June. Home study and homework club is available to all students where our staff are available to individually tutor and support in conjunction with our in-class Tutor learning Support program, Quicksmart and MYLNs program.

Students are also reminded to use all of the skills they have developed using their AVID strategies when studying and completing their exams.

Helping to reduce the spread of flu and COVID-19 during term 2. Students and staff with cold or flu-like symptoms are asked to take a COVID-19 test and stay home until their symptoms pass. If a student becomes ill at school, our school nurse will call to arrange for the student's family to collect them and we ask that they stay home until fully recovered.

We also encourage all staff and students to:

- wash and sanitise their hands regularly
- avoid touching their eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands
- cover their nose and mouth when they cough or sneeze
- get tested for COVID-19 if they feel unwell (RATs provided)
- get vaccinated for flu and COVID-19.

Flu vaccinations can be booked through GPs and pharmacies, many of which can also provide COVID-19 vaccinations. Flu vaccination is recommended for everyone aged 6 months and over. Some people are more at risk of complications from flu and are eligible for free vaccination as part of the National Immunisation Program. COVID-19 vaccines are available and free to everyone aged 5 years and over in Australia. They can be booked through the COVID-19 hotline on 1800 675 398 or through participating GPs, pharmacies, and community health services.

State Schools' Relief

Please find attached a copy of a flyer from State School's relief.

Families are asked to support your child to follow the mobile phone use policy and to support your children to become safe and responsible technology users. This is a Victorian Government regulation.

Please ensure your child follows the Mobile Phone Policy for All Schools Students

Victorian schools implemented a mobile phone policy in, 2020. This policy continues in 2022.

It helps focus students' attention on learning in the classroom by providing them with:

- (a) a safe environment to learn without inappropriate mobile phone use (including cyberbullying) or distractions
- (b) greater opportunities for social interaction and physical activity during recess and lunchtimes.

 The use of technology is important, but the risks and benefits from its use needs to be carefully managed. A summary of research articles is available via the resources named below. It provides the reason for the policy, including concerns about the impact of overuse of mobile phones on thinking and learning, health and wellbeing.

Students will still be able to bring a mobile phone to and from school, but it will need to be turned off and stored securely away in the school supplied lockers for the entire school day. Parents or carers can still contact their children through the school office in emergencies.

Staying COVID safe

Vital COVIDSafe steps

- Social distancing
- Limit mixing with other year levels
- Maintain physical distancing
- Limit to non-essential visitors and density limits in common areas
- Wash hands regularly and at key points
- Get a test even with the mildest of symptoms
- Isolate until you receive your test results

Rapid Antigen Test Kits (RAT tests)

RAT tests continue to be distributed to all students. It is highly recommended that your child takes a test on a **Monday and Wednesday morning** and continues to do so weekly. As you will have notices from the daily COVID Case information, there has been an escalation of COVID cases at our College. If there is a positive case at home, students need to test daily. If you need more RAT tests, please pick up a box from the front office. Thank you for your co-operation.

If you are positive

If your child receives a positive result at any time you must report this to the school and Department of Health immediately.

You must report a positive result to the Department of Health via their system (Rapid antigen tests | Coronavirus Victoria) (link) or via the coronavirus hotline at 1800 675 398.

Students (or their parents) must also report a positive result to their school, either through the COVID Test <u>portal</u> (link) or by phone on 97417911 or written notification. This is so the school can support students, record that they will be absent while in 7-day isolation, and let the rest of the school community know there has been a positive case onsite and that they should monitor for symptoms.

Please note that a student will not be identified when communicating with the school community.

Any student who has tested positive for COVID-19, and has completed their 7-day isolation period and are subsequently asymptomatic (no symptoms) do not need to undertake surveillance testing for 30 days.

All students and staff who return a positive result from a rapid antigen test should also follow the latest advice at https://www.coronavirus.vic.gov.au/rapid-antigen-tests. (link)

Attendance / Non Attendance Process – Reminder

Please report all known absences to the Attendance Officer, Ms. Carol Mills by:

If your child has been absent please send a note with your child including their name, tutor class and reason within three working days to explain his/her absence. For further information please see the Attendance Policy on Compass or the Department of Education parent website.



Fact sheet for parents/carers from the Department of Education

If your child is sick or absent, you are required to notify their school as soon as possible **on the day of absence** using one of the following methods:

- 1. Online: log the absence directly using our school's IT platform Compass
- 2. **Telephone:** the school's Attendance Officer, Mrs. Carol Mills on 9741 4911 (Option 1 for attendance) and let her know your child's name, class, date of absences and reason.
- Email: your child's tutor teacher, via Compass and provide the staff with your child's name, class, date of absences and reason. Notifying the school of your child's absence either prior to, or on the day that they will be away, helps ensure the safety and wellbeing of children and will fulfil your legal responsibility.

Why do I need to notify the school if my child is absent?

Schools need to know when and why a child is absent and you need to know if your child isn't at school.

From the end of Term 2 2018, all Victorian government schools are required to contact parents/carers as soon as practicable on the same day of an unexplained student absence. If your child is absent on a particular day and you have not contacted the school to explain why, the absence will be marked as unexplained.

This system also promotes daily school attendance. Going to school every day is the single most important part of your child's education, they learn new things every day – missing school puts them behind.

What is your responsibility?

You are legally required to ensure your child attends school every day or you must provide an explanation for their absence. You should let the school know in advance of any upcoming absences or let them know in the morning if your child won't be at school. In order for schools to implement the same day notification requirement, it's essential that you provide the school with your most up-to-date contact details.

Generally one notification will be sent per family. Should there be circumstances that require both parents and carers to be notified, please contact the school to make the necessary arrangements.

What is the school's responsibility?

The school must notify you of an unexplained absence in relation to your child as soon as practicable on the same day. Schools will let you know either by your school's online communications app, SMS, phone call or email. If you can't be reached because the school does not have your correct contact details (i.e. changed phone number, SMS/email failure notification received etc.), the school will attempt to make contact with any emergency contact/s nominated on your child's file held by the school. Where possible, this contact will be made on the same day of the unexplained absence.

Where can I learn more about the process for managing student absences?

Ask your school for a copy of the *Attendance Policy* which outlines the school's processes and procedures for monitoring, recording and following-up of student absences.

Students on school premises Before School & After School

Please see below an extract from Wyndham Central College's Supervision and Duty of Care Policy

Supervision will include the following:

- Monitoring of entry or exit points and/or designated pick up and drop off areas
- Supervision of the arrival and departure of school contract buses

At Wyndham Central College yard duty supervision at the beginning of the school day will commence at **8.30am**. This supervision will include **Buses Location 1 and Buses Location 2**.

Yard duty supervision at the end of the school day will be provided until 3.30pm for all students. This supervision will include Buses Location 1, Buses Location 2, Shaw's Road near the Gate Location 7 each until 3.30pm.

DET – Detention Duty until 3.40pm.

Supervision is provided if students are needed for CAT/SAC resits until 4.15pm.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) drops off or otherwise arranges for a student to be on the school premises before supervision commences at the beginning of the day, the Principal or via the Assistant Principals or the Year Level Leading Teachers will, as soon as practicable, follow up with the parent, guardian and/or carer to:

- advise of the supervision arrangements before school, and
- request that the parent, guardian or carer make alternate arrangements.

If a parent, guardian and/or carer (or other authorised person) has failed to collect the student after school, the next steps may include some or all of the following:

- Attempting to contact the parents, guardians or carers
- Attempting to contact the emergency contacts
- Contacting the Victoria Police and/or the Department of Human Services (Child Protection) to arrange for the supervision, care and protection of the student.

Thank you in supporting our students to remain safe by following this policy.

School Nurse

A reminder to ensure all <u>medical plans</u> for your children are up to date. Please feel free to contact Ms. Claudia Jara, the School Nurse on 97414911 to discuss any medical needs. If students are unwell at school, they are required to attend First Aid and the school nurse will then contact the family if it is deemed necessary. If your child calls you directly, please tell them to go to First Aid for medical attention. If your child is being tested for COVID 19 please notify the college immediately and a clearance letter from the doctor needs to be sited before the student returns.

School Gates

The school gates are closed at 8.45 am to facilitate students arriving to class on time. Students must report to the administration area after 8:45 am, to obtain a late pass. Consequences for lateness may apply. Your child should have a note to explain a known lateness.

Bike storage at school

It is important that all bikes are locked onto the racks with a bike lock or padlock and chain. This message has been communicated to all students however we would appreciate it if you could remind your son/daughter of this requirement. A bike helmet is also a legal requirement. Please note: Skateboards and scooters are not allowed in the school grounds.

Emergency Management Plan

The Wyndham Central College Emergency Management Plan is tested regularly to ensure the safety of all students, staff and school visitors in the event of an emergency situation. As part of this plan we conduct four emergency drills per year, two lock down drills and two fire drills and students are made aware of when a drill is scheduled.

Secondhand Uniform

We are asking for your assistance with donations of any items of uniform that your child/children have grown out of or not using anymore. If you can assist, please drop off secondhand uniforms to the front office and we will issue to other students within the college as necessary. Thank you for your support.

YEAR'S 10, 11 & 12 REPORT

A reminder that students need to study for their upcoming exams and I encourage all students to commence a revision and study plan. Extra support is available for students if they would like to attend Homework club, on Mondays and Wednesday after school, which will assist with their exam preparation.

Year 11 and 12 Students are only required to attend school to sit their timetabled exam and are to remain at home for study purposes at all other times.

Year 10 students will remain at school throughout the entire school day during the exam period as they have revision sessions to assist them.

Please encourage your child to set aside a time each day to complete their homework and study.

Below are some study tips that may assist students:

- Use a school diary for planning (provided to all students).
- Create 'to do' lists don't leave things to the last minute.
- AVID questions & summary
- Draw up a home work timetable using a calendar to plan activities listing study requirements, SAC's, exams and deadlines for assignments.
- List exam dates and other commitments.
- List due dates for essays and work backwards to set mini deadlines for each stage.
- Prioritise each task to help achieve goals, to avoid being overwhelmed by what has to be done and then rushing at the end.
- Maintain a balance between study and recreational activities.
- Use a clear flat space for regular homework and study not a bed or a couch.
- Organise your equipment and be prepared.
- Keep your school work in an easily accessible spot.
- If possible, choose a space away from distractions, such as television and social media.

Year 10 students have just undertaken one week of compulsory Structured Workplace Learning/Work Experience placement, as part of their studies. This will provide each student with an opportunity to develop an awareness of work-place skills and competencies and support the students studying Industry and Enterprise.

There were a wide range of placements that students undertook and I hope that this was a valuable experience for them and that it will benefit them not only with their studies but also in the future.

A reminder that in accordance with the Education Department's Mobile Phone Policy issued by the Minister for Education, personal mobile phones must not be used at Wyndham Central College during school hours (8.50am-3.04pm), including break one and two and need to be stored in lockers.

YEAR 10 REPORT

The conclusion of the term one seen students begin their Career Action Plans (CAPs) program during tutor learning time. Careers and Pathways Leader Mrs. Kathy Karlovic presented to students at assembly, outlining the opportunities and resources readily available for students looking to plan their pathway into tertiary study and/or future employment. Students will explore and investigate their skills, interests and strengths throughout the term and identify where these characteristics will take them into adult employment or tertiary study. Accompanied with the CAPs program are various experiences that will support students into their Year 11 transition including the WRICA Careers and Employment Expo that will be taking place on the 19th of May and the Straight Talk Presentation hosted by The Smith Family Foundation, where students will be provided with opportunities to talk and listen to various mentors and Alumni from the College about career and study pathways after high school.

At the commencement of term, Year 10 students were provided with the opportunity through MultiSkills Training to obtain their White Card. The one-day intensive course is the mandatory requirement for work health and safety prior to undertaking construction work. Some Year 10 students were able to secure this prior to work placement, whereas others are looking to broaden their scope for future employment in the trade and construction industries. Wyndham Central College's Community Engagement Leader Kristy Gray facilitated the training day with MultiSkills and demonstrated to our students the importance of networking in our local community. We thank Kristy for her efforts and supporting our Year 10 students. It's exciting times if you are in year 10 at Wyndham Central College. As I write, our students are learning the ropes of the workplace. The work experience program is an opportunity to experience what it is like to get up everyday and go to work. We know our students will be building on their knowledge from the classroom and in turn, will bring untold skills back into the classroom upon their return. It is important to acknowledge that these programs can't take place without the willingness of our local employers to take on a few fresh-faced teenagers.

Students have secured work placement in various industries including hospitality, automotive, horse and rider education, teachers' aides, horticulture, brick laying and many more. We wish our students luck in their work experience endeavours and look forward to hearing some wonderful stories and potential career/study defining moments.

Thank you also to families and students who had to show tenacity and determination to make those phone calls to arrange work experience. Also to our staff at the college who have worked hard to ensure that students unable to find a placement this year, have had a comparative range of tasks at school.

This term students will be starting to think earnestly about what careers and pathways they would like to explore in 2023 and beyond. The college has a range of programs and information evenings to support students and families in making these important decisions. Some upcoming events are the WRICA careers expo, subject tasters, faculty presentations and much more. Thank you to our Careers and Pathways team for their work.

Year 10 examination period is approaching and will be held between Monday the 30th of May and Thursday the 2nd of June. Students will complete an exam for each subject they have undertaken in semester 1 except for Physical Education. Exams are compulsory.

If students are absent from school, they must submit a medical certificate and will be provided an opportunity to then resit the exam missed in Exam Catch Up time. Any Year 10 students doing a Year 11 subject are to go to the Year 11 examination as a priority. Students are then to attend the 'catch up' exam timeslot that must be pre-arranged with Mr Brown and the subject teacher. Students are not permitted to leave the exam before the stated time. Any concerns are to be directed to your tutor teacher or Mr. Brown.

Lastly, in the coming weeks students will undertake the annual Attitudes to School Survey. The Attitudes to School Survey is offered by the Department of Education and Training to assist schools in gaining an understanding of students' perceptions and experience of school. Wyndham Central College values student voice to improve student engagement, wellbeing, and quality instruction. Our school will use the survey results to plan programs and activities to improve student's schooling experience. Students from Year 7 to 12 at our school will participate in the survey during school hours. All survey data that is made available in reports are for groups of students only so that no individual student can be identified.

YEAR 11 REPORT

Students will have the opportunity to engage with University and TAFE vendors, as well as employers in regards to their career and pathway options for next year. This is a great opportunity for students to be curious about their passions and gain an insight into what is available within their pathway of choice.

ATHLETICS CARNIVAL

We had our annual Wyndham Central Athletics Carnival and it was great to see Year 11 students participating and dressing up in house colours.

EXAMS

All Year 11 students will be sitting their mid-year exams from Friday the 27th of May to the 2nd of June. All students must attend their exams and be prepared prior to the exam. Students are only required at school for their exam time, otherwise they are at home studying and revising for the exams. An exam timetable will be sent out to all parents and students.

UNIT 2

A reminder to all students and parents that teachers have been relaying 'At Risk' levels to students and parents regarding your child's progress within each subject. I will be making contact home to students who are 'At Risk' for two or more of their subjects and will be looking at having parent meetings to ensure your child regains an S (satisfactory result) for each of their subjects. It is extremely important that you as the parent are supporting your child where possible to gain an S (satisfactory completion), as your child will not be able to go into Unit 2 with outstanding SACs/ or incomplete task work.

Exams

The Year 12 mid-year Exams will begin for all Year 12 VCE students on Friday 27th and will go through until Thursday 2nd June. All VCE students are to attend the exams following the VCAA exam rules and expectations. Please be sure that students arrive 20 minutes early to each exam to make sure they check in, find their seat numbers, line up and are ready to do the very best they can. All students must also be in full school uniform to attend their exam and make sure they plan their study time as part of their preparation. **Normal classes will not run during this time**, but teachers will be available to assist and support the students.

An exam timetable will be sent out to all guardians and students within the next couple of days. We will also have a Year 12 assembly to outline the rules and expectations of the exam process.

Please also be aware, it is a student free day on the next day after the exams, Friday 3rd June, and we start our Unit 4 content when the students return on Monday 6th June.

At Risk

Please make sure you are having conversations with your students about any outstanding work or SACs. All students are required to have a minimum of 16 Units across Units 1 – 4 to be able to pass their VCE, but must also have the correct sequence for their Year 12 studies. Please support the students at home with their work following missed or failed SACs and with their report information to make sure they are able to be successful in Year 12. If you have any questions about your student and their VCE status, please contact Mr Cook.

WRICA Careers Expo

On May 20th we head to the WRICA careers expo. This is the first real opportunity the students have had in the last couple of years where they can interact with representatives of higher educations, TAFEs and employers from many different areas. Students need to make sure they ask questions about what may interest them next year and about what they need to do. The students often come away with a lot of clarity about what they want to do next year, and also some show bags, pens and lollipops.

We will also follow up WRICA with a day visit to the Melbourne Careers Expo in the first week of Term 3.


Wellbeing support

Victoria is celebrating Education Week 2022 from Sunday 22 May to Saturday 28 May 2022. The theme, '150 Years of Public Education', commemorates the past, celebrates the present and imagines the future of education in Victoria. Education Week 2022 will provide an opportunity for Wyndham Central College, to showcase our journey in education and be a part of Victoria's education story.

To celebrate Education Week and the 150 years of education students will be participating in classroom activities to commemorate this wonderful milestone. We will also be holding a community event the WCC Education Week Morning Tea. Please refer to the invitation and letter attached to this newsletter.

EXAMS

Exams will be occurring again this year in semester 1 and 2. It is important for students to be prepared and to develop the skills needed to undertake exams in their senior secondary years and beyond. Year 7 and 8 students will have exams in English, Mathematics, Science and Humanities only. Years 9-12, exams will have exams in all of their subjects. Families will receive an exam timetable for their child in subsequent correspondence.

Exams will be held as during the following period:

- Year 12 Exams: 27th May 2nd June
- Year 11 Exams: 27th May 2nd June
- Year 10 Exams: 30th May 2nd June
- Year 9 Exams: 30th May 2nd June
- Year 8 Exams: 1st June 2nd June
- Year 7 Exams: 1st June 2nd June

Students will work on revising the Semester 1 work in the weeks leading into exams. It is important for student success that students develop good work and study habits. All students are expected to develop a homework and homestudy plan so that they revise on a regular basis and review knowledge and skills learned. Part of the homestudy program to support your child's learning must include the Cornell note taking system. The study timetable should be reviewed in the weeks leading to exams to ensure that it provides your child with the opportunity to be well prepared for the exams ahead. This will allow your child to experience success and build confidence in their learning.

CORNELL NOTES

Students are expected to continue to use the Cornell Note taking format and complete all steps of the note taking system. Completion of Cornell notes must be part of your child's regular homework and home study program.

Cornell notes are a proven focused note taking method for students to improve learning. When all steps of the note taking system are completed, students are guaranteed to increase their knowledge and raise their grades in any given class. The Cornell note taking system includes:

- Topic, date and Essential Question at the top of the notes
- Notes in the right-hand side with key words circled and important information underlined
- Questions relating to the notes in the left-hand column
- A summary at the end of the notes

Students are expected to use the Cornell Note system and complete all steps using the 10- 24-7 method. That is, review and revise their notes 10 minutes or the night after they first receive the notes. Complete questions related to the notes 24 hours later and write a summary of the notes seven days later. The completion of Cornell notes must be part of your child's regular homework program. Parents can support their child by encouraging them to use the repetition strategies and review notes regularly as this will help them prepare for, and improve, their test and exam results.

Homework club

A reminder that Homework club continues on Mondays and Wednesdays from 3:10pm to 4:00pm in the Monash Building. Homework Club is supported by teachers and tutors at the College and is a valuable way for students to access additional support.

PARENT PAYMENT ARRANGEMENTS

Parent payment arrangement sheets are available at the administration office. The college offers various payment options including cash, EFTPOS, via the Compass payment portal, BPAY (details provided on request), and Centrepay. Please return the parent payment arrangement sheets to the administration office when making payment or contact the office if you have any queries or require assistance.

LAPTOPS

From 2022 onwards, Wyndham Central College is implementing a Managed Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) program for all new laptops. This change is in line with the Department of Education and Training's Parent Payment Policy and will involve a partnership with Learning with Technologies. A Managed BYOD program is where the school chooses a supplier to provide laptops directly to students, while working together with the supplier to support the device through the school's Information Technology department with regards to technology issues and providing assistance for warranty/insurance claims. Details about this program are available at the administration office.

CHANGE OF CONTACT DETAILS

If you have recently changed your contact details, living arrangements etc., please update them either through COMPASS or at the school, to ensure we can work together to support your child.

CAMPS SPORTS & EXCURSION FUND (CSEF)

Please note that if your financial circumstances have changed and you now have a Health Care Card you may be entitled to the Victorian State Government funding to families of up to \$225 that can be used towards costs associated with camps, excursions and sporting events. These funds will be paid directly to the college and can only be used for these types of events/activities.

Eligibility Criteria

Camps, Sports and Excursion Fund (CSEF) application forms are available to:

- a parent/carer who holds either a Centrelink Health Care Card, a Pensioner Concession Card, or a Veterans Affairs Gold Card; or
- · a temporary foster carer; or
- a parent/carer of a student who is 16 years or older and who holds a valid concession card (such as a Youth Allowance Health Care Card or Disability Support Pension Card).

To be eligible for these funds in 2022 you must complete the application form (available from the administration office) and attach a copy of your eligible card which must be current as of the 31st of January 2022.

Families who applied at our college for this in 2021 will NOT need to complete a new form as it will be an automatic process.

A new application will only be required in the following situations:

- · If a family has a change to their financial situation and are now eligible
- If you are a new family to Wyndham Central College and are eligible
- If you are an existing family who has a new child starting in 2022

All applications are validated by CentreLink and if there is a discrepancy, families will be required to contact CentreLink directly.

VISITORS TO THE SCHOOL

For the safety of staff and students, all visitors to the school must report to the front office (including parents) and log into Compass. In case of an emergency, we need to be aware of who is on site. Visitors will also need to check in via our QR code at the front office. Please follow social distancing rules and wear your mask when entering the College.

STUDENTS LEAVING SCHOOL EARLY

If your child needs to leave school early for an appointment, parents are required to send their child with a note in their planner advising the reason and time they need to leave. The student must take the note to the Attendance office (located next to First Aid) in the morning to receive an early leaver's pass. This pass can then be shown to the teacher at the time they are leaving class and then also to the Attendance Officer.
